All methodologies possible in monitoring the project will be applied. The monitoring will be carried out on weekly and monthly basis by the senior staff based in the office in Wanlaweyn. The methodologies will include site visits, observations and interviews with the beneficiaries. The project will also ensure that the beneficiaries are listed with the support of important stakeholders and Village Relief Committees. VRCs will participate in the selection of beneficiaries. Details of the project will given to beneficiaries as well as the VRCs. This ensures beneficiaries know their entitlement. Upon exchanging their vouchers for food at the vendors, beneficiaries will sign recipient sheets. The monitoring and evaluation will measure the project against the indicators as indicated in the log frame. These indicators include: the number of households supported, the amount of food per household per month, the number of months, the number of food traders contracted and the money vendors contracted. Beneficiaries will be asked to report any irregular incident with the food vendors. Site vising, interviews with beneficiaries, with Sub-Committees and vendors can be used as a means of verification. Project pictures and reports can also be used for verification. Other documents to be produced in the process of implementation will include: inception report, interim reports and final and substantial activity and financial reports. Weekly reports will be conducted internally for the benefit of Access-Aid management. The project will produce a well documented video and pictures indicating the entire process of implementation.
