JP defined a set of 10 key competencies for lifelong learning and conducted an extensive research of "presence" of key competences in curricula, text-books and teaching practices in primary and secondary education.

16 centers for counselling, information and training of unemplyoed youth were opened in 16 municipalities, creating a systemic tool to increase youth employability.

final draft of the Methodology of migration statistics in BiH, final draft of the Strategy for migration monitoring in BiH as well as assessment of the IT needs in regards to creation of system of exchange and dissemination of data for migration in BiH, were developed.

#### **Progress in outcomes**

•Increased capacities of the education system and local communities to improve youth employability;

Everything was prepared to start increasing capacities of the education system and training of teachers and other related activities are ongoing.

•Enhance capacities of the Public Employment Services and civil society to develop and deliver integrated package of youth employability measures;

Capacities of public employment services and CSOs to deliver such packages were significantly increased given the fact that the baseline value was 0 and today there are 16 centers operating all over the country serving several thousands beneficiaries per year.

•Positive impact of youth migration maximized whilst impact of irregular migrations minimized

#### Measures taken for the sustainability of the joint programme

MoU with the Federal Employment Service and Cantonal Employment Services, Employment Service of the Republika Srpska, and District Brcko are signed to help CISO centers sustainability and its mission as integral part of the PES system and the unit for support of unemployed youth.

Meetings were held with most important local authorities to get their support for YERP activities in different municipalities (including financial support). A manual for CISO work has been drafted and approved by PESs.

Furthermore, in 2012 when governments will be in place, we will undertake steps in order to integrate YERP activities into the legal framework and State and/or Entity level framework to make sure that the budget and sustainability will be ensured once YERP is over.

Given the 1 year period without the main Govrenement, CISO sustainability measures do require the no cost extension period for YEM BiH in order to better integrate CISO centers into the system of public employment services.

Due to the liberalization of the European visa regime for BiH, all future stakeholders agreed that producing overall migration statistics, which includes youth migration statistics, is essential as a lasting product for BiH.

YERP is covering the entire country, all cantons as well as all major cities.

Due to the complex political and administrative local set up there is a multitude of decision makers to involve for all relevant areas (education, labor, migration, and statistics).

Briefly describe the current difficulties the Joint Programme is facing



#### Briefly describe the current external difficulties that delay implementation

Elections: 14 months after and still no government in place. The new decision making structure at state, entity and cantonal level will influence the decision making structure in local level. Complex and fragmented administrative structure in education with 14 ministries/ depts. for education leads to delays in decision—making and approval processes. The lack of a state level government also is preventing progress in the initiation of bilateral agreements on labour and migration.

Economic crisis and limited capacity of local partners: Public employment services have very limited resources in terms of finances, human resources and management. The situation is even more complicated because of the existence of a similar Youth employment project (YEP) implemented by other donors and by the existence of 2 other employment related projects that work with the same beneficiaries as YERP. Implementation of the project might be a bit delayed in Republika Srpska and all Cantons due to change of management structure-appointment of new directors.

New Slovenian legislation has slowed the implementation of a planned temporary and circular labour migration schemes as the Slovenian Embassy in BiH and the Slovenian employment services grapple with implications of the new laws: the specific issue is the type of contract that BiH youth would need to sign. If it is a standard labour contract, then the minimum wage would make the scheme too expensive for the project budget.

#### Explain the actions that are or will be taken to eliminate or mitigate the difficulties

Elections: Generally, in order to overcome the potential negative effects of general election all agencies need to:

- -sign own strategic documents with governments;
- -connect activities with old and new development documents of BiH;
- -establish effective cooperation with assistant ministers at all levels. They are experts and our most important partners in daily communication.

Change in management structure in Public Employment Institute will be overcome with organized meeting with new director and presentation of project activities (starting in January 2012).

Lack of state level government: With regard to bilateral labour migration agreements, the last meeting of the working group that focuses on this segment of the program agreed to at least begin convening meetings of technical staff to coordinate labour-related emigration activities.

Every month at least one common trip, field visit and project presentation is realised commonly.

- •Virtual (online) Diaspora exhibit organized in coordination between IOM and UNV.
- •Documentation and dissemination of MDG-F YERP / CISO volunteer employment stories by UNV.
- •Three agencies (UNDP, UNV, IOM) have participated in providing training to CISO staff.

In terms of coordination and decision making mechanisms three main aspects are to be underlined:

- -Needs based interagency working group meeting where representatives of different participating agencies meet to discuss and to be informed about the project.
- -Weekly staff meeting, every Friday morning, where all YERP staff is together in order to present activites and to share information with colleagues from other agencies.
- -Needs based individual meetings, on average on a monthly basis, where the NPMC meets with heads of participating UN agencies and shares information while taking into account their point of view.

In several cases, sucessful implementation by one of the participating UN agencies is the precondition for sound delivery for the other agencies as well (For ex. UNDP/UNV should establish CISOs in 16 municipalities, in order to enable IOM to realise youth migration related activites).

#### **Current situation**

In relation to ownership, with government at all level it is increasing so is their level of interaction and presence in different activities.

Governments so far have been be involved through the PMC and by attending the inception workshop and related meetings. This is the same for the civil society members. Ad hoc meetings, whenever needed, with governments and CSO members are also organized in order to better explain YERP and in order to better involve them.

Citizens as benficiaries and stakeholders percieve this JP as the most useful and you can see it in their comments and visits of YERP Facebook page and on Facebook pages of all CISO centers (more than 7 000 000 visits!).

Many of the JP components have established working groups within which relevant government and non-governmental entities (civil society and the private sector) fully participate in developing and implementing program actions including the development of policy, strategies, and procedures. As JP implementation continues, monitoring of results will also be part of the working groups' mandate

16 CISO Facebook pages are active with more than 7.000.000 hits, that provides up-to-date information about labor market requirements to unemplčoyed youth. More than 12 hours of electronic media programme was dedicated to CISO activities and a number of newspaper articles published.

Over 1,500 community members have been reached by a range of community outreach activities conducted by the 20 national UN Volunteer Youth Counselor-Advisors (working within the CISO Centres) promoting the services of the CISO centres, and role and value of volunteering in enhancing employment horizons. The reach of these activities includes at least 110 schools and 40 local NGOs across Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Documentation and dissemination of MDG-F YERP / CISO – volunteer – employment stories by UNV through UNV.ba website and with local partners. In order to highlight the reality that many young people are desperate to leave the country, while also showing that young Diaspora want to return and are a great potential resource, the YERP organized a live, televised talk show. The CISOs were centrally featured as a resource for young people. The show – called Zabranjeni Forum (or the Forbidden Forum) received so many calls and emails that systems were blocked and the show was ad hoc extended for an additional hour

1.2 Please briefly provide some contextual information on the law, policy or plan and the country/municipality where it is going to be implemented

Related to youth main intention of the BiH is to facilitate participation in employment and access by all to resources, rights, goods and services; to prevent the risks of exclusion; to help the most vulnerable and to mobilize all relevant bodies. In order to do that it is necessary to intervene in education and make better link between education and labour markets. BiH has by and large adopted necessary laws but their implementation is not satisfactory. The project should support better implementation of the laws, employability and strengthening of M & E.



Two Entity-level Youth Work Experience Task Forces will be established in order to investigate and reach consensus on the policy options and develop Youth Work Experience Policy for introduction and formalization of youth work experience schemes. The Youth Work Experience Tasks Forces will also work on development and preparation for adoption of necessary regulatory framework that will be completed and sent to the Parliaments for adoption at the end of the Programme.

PES will start working on the changes of their rule books/internal system regulation and recognize CISO as part of PES system.

Lack of coordination between all relevant institutions dealing with migration flow monitoring, combined with no methodology on migration data collection and as insufficient professional capacities within Statistical institutions in BiH, focused our activities in producing overall migration statistics, which includes youth migration statistics. This intervention is in line with Statistical program for the 2009-2012 of the Agency for Statistics of BiH and will create a legal basis and national coordination mechanism for monitoring migration flows including youth migration, based on EUROSTAT regulation 862/2007.

The YERP has indirectly also contributed to the revision of BiH's Migration and Asylum Strategy (2012) by advocating for a wider array of stakeholders to be involved in it completion. For the first time, the Ministry of Security (the lead institution in the migration strategy development process) is including institutions and issues related to Diaspora and labour emigration and not focusing narrowly on border security and immigration.
