Quantitative achievements against objectives and results					
Output 1: Increased institutional capacity of IHEC to independently carry out elections.	No activities were implemented during the reporting period. However discussions were conducted with the IHEC on the recruitment of international electoral experts to support the planning and implementation of the Kurdistan Region Governorate Council elections which are scheduled for 27 September 2012. This support will also be extended to the implementation of Governorate Council elections for the other 15 provinces in Iraq which are expected to take place in early 2013. The international experts will be responsible for the provision of technical advice and operational support.	% of planned N/A			

Qualitative achievements against objectives and results

During the reporting period, UNDP and IHEC agreed on the need to have international experts, mainly to support the planning and implementation of the KRG electoral process as well as the capacity building programme of the IHEC. In this regard, the recruitment process following international experts was initiated:

- 1. Procurement Advisor
- 2. Media Advisor
- 3. Public Outreach Advisor

The recruitment process for these three positions will be finalised in the second quarter. UNDP will continue to discuss with IHEC on other specific areas of technical assistance that may be required during the implementation of the electoral process.

The following positions have also been earmarked for recruitment:

- 1. Database Development Advisor
- 2. Senior Operations Policy Advisor
- 3. Voter Registration Advisor

UNDP will continue to discuss with IHEC on specific areas of technical assistance that may be required to be provided by the international advisors during the implementation of the electoral process.

Main Implementation Constraints and Challenges

The security factor remains the main obstacle to the deployment of additional staff in Iraq. However, the staff ceiling has been slightly raised to accommodate additional UN personnel to support the electoral process. For the same reason of security some international electoral experts (who are limited in number) are reluctant to take positions in Iraq; nevertheless, UNDP continues to seek qualified personnel and identify them for recruitment.

An important aspect of the UN's electoral support is the close relationship with the IHEC and daily presence in Baghdad, working directly with IHEC counterparts. In January, there was limited access into IHEC National Office, thus reducing face-to face time with IHEC counterparts. However, from February to March 2012, access of UN personnel to the IHEC National Office had improved, with new measures in place to increase UN access to the IHEC facilities.
