Qualitative achievements against objectives and results

Regarding the studies:

- The Growth Diagnostics component is finalized on the basis of the comments received from PSSU.
- The Value Chain Analysis study is sent to PSSU for comments.
- Trade volume study is finalized with current data.

The Investment Climate Review is outsourced to UNESCO for the components related to the conduct of the survey in Iraq. The Agreement with UNESCO has been signed by mid-September.

- The Labor Survey is outsourced to UNESCO. The Agreement with UNESCO has been signed by mid- September .
- Training on Growth Diagnostics& Agricultural Indicators, Value Chain, Trade Volume and Investment Climate has been completed.

To ensure the successful completion of the project, I-AGES staff will prioritise the following objectives over the coming weeks:

- Start immediately with Phase 2, finding an effective way to do that, given that most of it should happen in Baghdad. UN has decided not to extend any project funded through ITF, including I-AGES, which has created an immense time pressure on the project.
- Evaluate the constraints of the PSSU and support it a.s.a.p. to improve its efficiency.

Main implementation constraints & challenges (2-3 sentences)

Extreme time pressure on the project, due to past delays from the Iraqi side and impossibility to extend the project implementation time. On the conditions of under-performance of PSSU, due to their constraints (institutional) that are recurring, the challenge to complete the project on time is accentuated.
