1. Progress towards expected Results

The South Sudan Recovery Fund (SSRF) initiative is intended to build the capacity of local NGOs in delivering services to the people of South Sudan through quick and high impact services. The small grants extension was made to ensure that communities in Jonglei and Northern Bahr el Ghazal would benefit, following the termination of AMURT and the Stromme Foundation. In making the extension decision, the SSRF Steering Committee considered the duration and coverage of projects and the level of fund balance, deciding to continue similar arrangements for a livelihoods implementation model, where existing national community-based NGOs with a presence in the two states would be selected to implement the projects.

The international NGO BRAC South Sudan was selected to coordinate the grants and be responsible for the disbursement of funds, also taking responsibility for the capacity development of the ten selected national NGOs in Northern Bahr el Ghazal and Jonglei states in project management and monitoring of activities in order to ensure effective utilization of the funds.

This report covers the third quarter of project activities, from 1 July to 30 September 2012.

1.1. Progress toward Expected Results

During the reporting period, BRAC completed the disbursement of grants to the ten selected national NGOs; six based in Northern Bahr el Ghazal State and four in Jonglei State. The NGOs completed a number of activities in the following areas: agricultural production, mainly by farmers and vegetable growers; completion of school libraries and youth cultural centres; enrollment of street children and orphans in schools; provision of vocational skills training; income generation activities; and healthcare services for children.

Beneficiaries targeted in the activities include children, youth, women, and men from disadvantaged backgrounds from those communities.

BRAC closely supervised activities through regular monitoring missions to each of the ten selected community-based NGOs. The first round of visits was conducted following the disbursement of funds in order to ensure proper utilization, while the second visit was conducted prior to reporting of activities.

Key Achievements I: Completed by BRAC

- **Grants Disbursement to NGOs:** BRAC disbursed a total of SSP 874,113.96 (equivalent to USD 296,309.82 at an exchange rate of 2.95). The level of grant disbursement to each national NGO varied, with a maximum amount of SSP 100,000 in various approved projects.
- **Capacity Building for NGOs:** The ten selected NGOs from the two states have received training on project management, report writing and microfinance/income generating activities.
- **Project Progress monitoring:** BRAC closely supervised the activities of the NGOs. The monitoring team conducted several monitoring visits to ensure proper and effective utilization of the funds provided.

Key Achievements II: Completed by NGOs

• Capacity Development /Skills Training:

A total of 50 young men were trained in brick-making, while 30 young women were trained in carpentry and joinery in Kongor youth centre and Uror, in Twic East County, Jonglei state. A total of 780 women were trained in small business management: 480 in Bahr el Ghazal State and 300 in Jonglei State. The training was followed by the disbursement of grants to the value of SSP 87,000 to participants to enable them to start small businesses: SSP 48,000 for women's groups in Northern Bahr el Ghazal and SSP 39,000 for women's groups in Jonglei. A further 200 men participated in skills training in Jonglei State and were supported with fishing nets and other fishing materials.

• Agriculture/Vegetable production:

During the period of project implementation, various types of agricultural tools and seeds were distributed to beneficiary farmers. More than 1,335 seedlings were distributed to 250 families in Northern Bahr el Ghazal, while in total at least 6,000 people benefited from agricultural support provided by the projects in the two states.

• Education /Child Protection Support Areas:

132 street children and orphans have been enrolled in primary school, levels one to eight, while 50 children have received health services.

2. Project Management

2.1. Audits

The 2011 annual NGO audit carried out by Ernst and Young in April 2012 did not result in any follow up issues for BRAC for the third quarter of 2013.

2.2. Monitoring

During the reporting period, two monitoring visits were carried out in Northern Bahr el Ghazal and Jonglei States. The national NGOs were observed as continuing to demonstrate strong project management, while communities are actively making personal contributions to complement project allocation, such as providing land for project sites.

4. Lessons Learned

As discussed during Q2 reporting, involvement of the State Steering Committees in joint planning has continue to helped identify obstacles in Q3 ahead of project implementation, enabling preventative actions to be taken by BRAC.

5. Sustainability

In order to encourage project sustainability, BRAC trained the selected NGOs/CBOs in project management, report writing, microfinance and income generating activities. The NGOs/CBOs have carried out several small projects over the past six months and have been able to develop their project management skills and techniques. Training in project implementation has increased their capacity in efficient management as well as in conducting project activities. This improved efficiency will help the NGOs/CBOs sustain their work in long-term, ultimately contributing to positive change in the two states.
