Project Description	This Programme is conceived and designed with Iraqi stakeholders (public and private), various UN organizations and other international stakeholders in an effort to create and enable an effective, coherent, and comprehensive framework for private sector development in Iraq at both the national and governorate levels in three priority Governorates. It is a means of achieving: i) sustainable and increased employment opportunities; ii) poverty reduction; iii) the enhancement of the legal and regulatory framework which will allow an increase in sustained domestic and international investment; iv) the development of a legal and regulatory framework designed to perpetuate an overall rational, coherent, and economic environment; and v) the diversification the basis of future economic growth in Iraq in a gender inclusive and environmentally sustainable manner.
