Project Summary	<p>With CHF funding, UNICEF will facilitate family reunification through the provision of air transport, provide on-the-job technical support for national family tracing and reunification (FTR) partners, carry out FTR follow-up missions for unaccompanied and separated children (UASC) identified during Rapid Response Missions, and procure essential FTR documentation supplies. At least 1,200 girls and boys who are already identified and in urgent need of reunification services will benefit directly from this emergency project as UNICEF will continue to support increased follow-ups and tracing action and will organize and fund flights transferring children to be reunified with their parents/primary caregivers.. .</p> <p>A total of 8,765 unaccompanied, separated, and missing children (50% girls) have been identified to date, and only 16 per cent of these children have been reunified with their primary caregivers. The highest caseloads of unaccompanied and separated children (UASC) are in Unity State (2,219 cases), Lakes State (1,241 cases), Jonglei State (1,042 cases), and Upper Nile State (966 cases). A number of areas within these states remain difficult to access, which likely means that additional separated children have not yet been identified. By fast-tracking the family tracing and reunification for UASC in the most vulnerable situations, including children with disabilities, unaccompanied children, girls affected by sexual assault and exploitation, and boys at risk of abuse and recruitment, UNICEF will reduce the time of separation, thereby decreasing their vulnerability to a multitude of physical, social, and psychological threats. UNICEF will partner with national organizations in remote, emergency locations to deliver and expand critical family tracing and reunification services, including identification and registration of UASC and missing children using innovative mobile phone technology for more rapid registration, tracing, and reunification. UNICEF will provide technical advice, coaching and mentoring to strengthen adherence to minimum standards and implement gender- and age-sensitive interventions, emphasizing timely follow-up visits, referrals, appropriate interim care for unaccompanied girls and boys, and coordinated tracing action.</p>

Link with the Allocation Strategy	<p>The SRP notes that girls and boys affected by family separation are at greater risk of abuse, exploitation, neglect, psychosocial distress, and recruitment and/or use by armed forces and armed groups. In order to ensure that all children, including those in the most vulnerable situations and hardest-to-reach locations benefit from crucial FTR services, UNICEF is committing to identify and respond to separated girls and boys where no FTR partners are currently operating and where local partners who are new to FTR can be provided with technical and on-the-job support to improve service provision. As the provider of last resort for the Child Protection Sub-Cluster, UNICEF has an obligation to ensure critical child protection gaps are addressed in locations where there are inadequate emergency FTR services. This directly responds to the Protection Cluster response strategy objective to ensure that displaced and conflict-affected people facing protection risks and threats are provided with timely protection response and prevention services. More efficient registration and tracing action through the RapidFTR online platform, supported by UNICEF, links directly with the SRP to increase and improve follow-up, tracing action, and reunification rates across the three most-affected states of Jonglei, Unity, and Upper Nile States. Only 25 per cent of registered UASC are documented as having ever received one follow-up visit, so UNICEF is focusing support with local organizations to systematically ensure proper documentation and accelerate follow-up visits and tracing action taken. As noted in the strategy paper, UNICEF is emphasizing and prioritizing this action with all partners so that more children and families begin to feel the positive effects of increased follow-ups, tracing news, and reunifications in the three most affected states. Additionally, UNICEF and its partners have identified and registered over 4,300 unaccompanied, separated, and missing children through Rapid Response Missions (RRMs) and new partnerships are needed to manage the ongoing FTR work in these areas. With respect to the second round allocation paper parameters: This project capitalizes on momentum among FTR partners supported by UNICEF to increase the rates of follow-up, tracing action, tracing verification, and reunification by ensuring functionality and user-friendliness of the RapidFTR system, partnerships with local NGOs in remote areas, and assurance of essential FTR supplies and follow-up missions within three months of RRM. This project directly addresses life threatening needs as family tracing and reunification falls within the CHF's lifesaving criteria, and Child Protection in Emergencies cluster has prioritized areas that are consistent with the heat map (as also identified in the locations for this project).</p>

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BACKGROUND INFORMATION

1. Humanitarian context analysis..

Humanitarian context: Describe the current humanitarian situation in the specific locations where this project will be implemented

The conflict in South Sudan continues to pose a multitude of physical, social, and psychological threats to children's protection and well-being. Out of a total of 1.6 million internally displaced, approximately 53 per cent are children (855,000 girls and boys, disaggregated data unavailable). Massive population displacements have resulted in 8,765 unaccompanied, separated, and missing children identified (50% girls), and, of these, 15 per cent are unaccompanied, 58 per cent are separated, and 27 per cent are reported as missing children. Only 16 per cent of registered children have been reunified to date; however, the monthly reunification rate for the period of April – June reflect an average of 241 reunifications per month, which indicates 60 per cent growth as compared with previous monthly averages. Rapid Response Missions (RRMs) have identified over 4,300 cases within the current caseload, and recent reports from Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM) missions show between 15 – 30 new reports per mission of separated girls and boys who are yet to be reached. While family reunifications are higher proportionally than new registrations, UNICEF and its partners are still identifying an average of 200 new cases per month. The highest caseloads of unaccompanied and separated children (UASC) are in Unity State (2,219 cases), Lakes State (1,241 cases), Jonglei State (1,042), and Upper Nile State (966 cases). Half of all children registered are girls, which places them at even greater risk of abuse, exploitation, and forced marriage as compared with their peers due to their separation status and lack of a caregiver legally responsible for them. Finding appropriate interim care for many unaccompanied adolescent boys, including those in contact with the law, is challenging due to negative social perceptions about male youth. Additionally, it is estimated that over 13,000 boys, in particular, and some girls are at risk of recruitment or use by armed groups and armed forces. Over thirteen per cent of current registered unaccompanied and separated children (UASC) in Unity and Upper Nile states have been unable to receive follow-up support as agencies have temporarily suspended activities while waiting for fighting to subside, placing these children at greater risk of secondary separation and delayed reunification. Once insecure areas become safer, accelerated follow up and monitoring visits will be crucial to ascertain the situation of children in those areas and subsequently review and update the caseload of children. With upgrades to RapidFTR, an innovative online platform rolled out by UNICEF for quicker registration and fast-tracked tracing, as well as improved tracking and accountability FTR tools, it is anticipated that additional children separated from their caregivers will be identified and require prompt care and tracing and that the rate of reunifications will continue to rise. While UNICEF collaborated with the Government to release 1,755 children (99 per cent boys) associated with armed groups in early 2015, these children along with countless others who are affected by conflict, must receive continuous attention to prevent re-recruitment, identify remaining children associated with armed groups, and reunify them with their families. In the absence of urgent and critical family tracing and reunification interventions, the impact of continued armed conflict and displacement will have devastating immediate and long term consequences on both girls and boys.

2. Needs assessment.

A total of 8,765 unaccompanied, separated, and missing children (50% girls) have been identified to date, and only 16 per cent of these children have been reunified with their primary caregivers. The highest caseloads of unaccompanied and separated children (UASC) are in Unity State (2,219 cases), Lakes State (1,241 cases), Jonglei State (1,042 cases), and Upper Nile State (966 cases). A number of areas within these states remain difficult to access, which likely means that additional separated children have not yet been identified. Against this backdrop, many areas have been affected by ongoing conflict, resulting in displacement and secondary displacement. Partners in these areas have been required to relocate on multiple locations and some areas have not been covered by FTR partners since the conflict began in December 2013. Many of the existing FTR partners do not have extensive experience in FTR, and coupled with high staff turnover, technical support is required to ensure that minimum standards are understood and inform programme design; and are adhered to during implementation. As noted in recent Protection Trends Analyses, rates of follow up and reunification are gradually improving, in part, due to increased coverage (with the introduction of new national CBOs/NGOs, improved adherence to minimum standards and improved coordination in the national response. Many identified UASC still require interim care and tracing services; and will require support to return to their families.

3. Description Of Beneficiaries

At least 1200 girls and boys already identified and in need of reunification services will benefit directly from the project as UNICEF will continue to support increased follow-ups and tracing action and will organize and fund flights transferring children to be reunified with their parents/primary caregivers. Those children with special protection concerns and in extremely vulnerable situations, such as children with disabilities, children without adequate family-based care, girls affected by abuse and exploitation, and boys at risk of neglect, abuse, or recruitment, will be fast tracked for tracing and reunification. UNICEF and its partners will ensure temporary caregivers and community members are supported to identify protection risks for children within their care, provide immediate care, and refer children for more intensive care and treatment as necessary. Using complementary funding, FTR supplies, including laptops, RapidFTR technical support, and documentation materials, will be procured for use by UNICEF and its partners carrying out follow-up missions and routine FTR work. Additionally, local organizations, typically based in remote locations where international organizations have been unable to operate, will benefit from on-the-job technical support provided by UNICEF FTR Specialists at the state and national levels.

4. Grant Request Justification.

UNICEF is the primary Child Protection Sub-Cluster organization implementing quality FTR services on RRMs but aims to strengthen the capacity and expand the catchment area of local organisations to provide such quality services in locations with the highest demonstrated need and fewest child protection actors. Given low follow-up, tracing action, and reunification rates, UNICEF, at both national and state levels, has taken technical lead for FTR to promote timely documentation, accuracy of records, and systematic follow-up and tracing, in collaboration with Save the Children. With 18 FTR partners, including many new to FTR work, UNICEF's technical contribution is essential to ensure separated children receive the highest quality of care and timely feedback, tracing action, and reunification and UNICEF is concurrently seeking to mobilise additional resources to cover its technical assistance costs. UNICEF facilitates and funds an average of five to ten reunifications per week in collaboration with partners to ensure children are back with their parents as quickly as possible (at a minimum cost of \$600 per reunification to cover flight costs). UNICEF, as the Child Protection Sub-Cluster global lead, is the provider of last resort for areas in which there are no child protection partners or where partners are unable to respond to FTR needs; therefore, UNICEF is obligated to ensure quality and timely FTR response for children, through partners and where necessary, through direct service delivery.

5. Complementarity.

Explain how the project will complement previous or ongoing projects/activities implemented by your organization.

UNICEF is the co-lead of the FTR Working and has selected partners which are existing FTR lead agencies in their respective locations or who are in the process of establishing partnership agreements to cover gaps. UNICEF also works with other FTR service providers who are to be funded directly by CHF, including NP and CINA and will work with these agencies to support adherence to common SOPs across both CHF and UNICEF partnerships. Many of the same organisations are also delivering other child protection services, including Psychosocial Support and all activities are reported into the common 5Ws system.

State if, when and how you plan to evaluate your project .	15 technical support visits are planned, which will be undertaken by Child Protection Specialists, during which partners will receive onsite coaching and mentoring; and programme implementation will be monitored. In addition, partners will submit weekly reports to the 5Ws (from which we can draw analysis to report against SOIs), monthly reports to UNICEF and quarterly review meetings will be conducted to review progress (which will include progress against SOIs). UNICEF will also implement standard HACT assurance processes to support partners to effectively utilize funding. Additional support will be provided by the CPSC (Coordinators and IMO) who will be providing onsite technical support to partners where specific M&E challenges are identified.
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OTHER INFORMATION

Accountability to Affected Populations	UNICEF technical support to the FTR activities will place special emphasis on adherence to agreed SOPs and minimum service delivery standards, including gender-sensitive provisions and requirements to ensure that the most appropriate response with regards to sex and age. For example, both sex and age are considerations in existing vulnerability (and prioritization) criteria. UNICEF will also continue to implement using a human rights based approach which requires dedicated and specific programmatic considerations based on gender, equity and child rights. All activities in this project will be planned and implemented based on the recommendation of IASC gender-handbook in humanitarian actions. HIV/AIDS will be included in the life skills for the child friendly centers and community based psychosocial activities. Whilst no specific environmental issues are addressed directly in this project, UNICEF makes special efforts to procure and appropriately dispose of environmentally friendly materials and supplies. An assessment of NGO partnerships currently underway is exploring possible methodologies for implementing beneficiary feedback mechanisms in UNICEF supported programmes. When finalized, the recommendations of which will inform responses under this grant.
Implementation Plan: Describe for each activity how you plan to implement it and who is carrying out what.	This funding will complement existing resources to both provide financial and technical support to NGO and CBO partners. Through these sub-granting relationships, UNICEF will ensure that new partners that do not have extensive experience in child protection (and in particular, FTR) are equipped with knowledge, skills and resources to deliver in line with international minimum standards; and are supported to build sustainable capacity that will enable them to receive and absorb direct funding in the future. Family tracing and reunification services will be provided through NGOs and CBOs, complementing broader service delivery outcomes which are supported by non-CHF grants. UNICEF will also support partners to adopt and use efficient and effective innovations, including RapidFTR to enable greater reach and quality of services. UNICEF will use its convening power to work with government structures in areas under government control and other structures in the rebel control areas to leverage operating space for partners and ensure coordination within the CP Sub-Cluster.

Justify Chosen Gender Marker Code	UNICEF child protection programs are designed to reach girls and boys who are most at risk of, or who have experienced violence, abuse, exploitation, or neglect. Beneficiaries include 50 per cent girls and 50 per cent boys, and program activities are specifically designed to assess and meet the unique needs of both girls and boys and their caregivers to ensure the most appropriate care and child friendly services. While girls and boys may share some negative consequences of separation, UNICEF recognizes and makes sure to address concerns related to forced marriage, sexual violence, exploitation, and abuse among young and adolescent girls. Additionally, many boys in South Sudan face numerous challenges, including coerced or forced recruitment into armed groups, child rights violations when in contact or conflict with the law, arbitrary detention, and difficulties in foster care placement due to societal perceptions about male youth. 	UNICEF utilizes local and national advocacy, parental support for temporary caregivers, routine monitoring visits, and other community based mechanisms to prevent abuse and neglect and intervene to reduce girls' and boys' vulnerability. All program strategies align with internationally and nationally agreed upon minimum standards, and UNICEF has adopted explicit age and gender sensitive strategies as aforementioned. UNICEF collects and analyzes data disaggregated by sex and age to track trends and modify programming as often as necessary.
