This project was designed to reduce childhood mortality and morbidity related to malnutrition by supporting the provision of preventive, curative and promotive services as per the Basic Package of Health Services (BPHS) in 42 locations (2 Juba IDP Protection of Civilian (PoC) sites, 22 health facilities in Aweil West, 16 health facilities in Aweil North, and 2 OTP sites in Koch County). As set out in the project proposal, Concern's (CWW) activities have been implemented according to the work plan, with the exception of Koch County, which has remained largely inaccessible during the lifespan of this grant.

In 2013, prior to the submission of this project proposal, CWW opened a new base in Koch County in anticipation of expanding its Nutrition activities in this area. This was in addition to its traditional programme areas of Aweil West and Aweil North, Northern Bahr el Ghazal (NBeG), and its more recent Nutrition interventions in Juba (UN House and Tongping PoC sites). In view of its plans for expansion in Unity, CWW recruited 10 Nutrition staff for 2 OTP sites in Koch County. However, following the outbreak of violence in December, CWW was forced to abandon its base after its office was looted and vehicle commandeered. This resulted in a sudden suspension of CWW's activities in Koch County. While CWW has since been an active agency in Bentiu UNMISS PoC sites, the operational context in Koch County has not been conducive for returning. Concern has undertaken coordination with World Relief for it to take responsibility for OTP services in all seven PHC facilities in Koch County, meaning that Concern no longer needs to provide nutrition services in Koch.

The suspension of Concern's activities in Koch County due to on-going insecurity forms the basis for a reallocation request and a NCE request. CWW is requesting CHF to allow for funds intended for Koch County under this grant to be reallocated to Aweil West and Aweil North Counties, where Concern has been operational since 1998. This reallocation combined with a NCE of three months would enable these funds to be channeled towards the alarmingly high rates of malnourished women and children in NBeG, which remains one the highest risk states for child malnutrition and mortality in South Sudan. In April 2014, Concern conducted SMART surveys in Aweil West (AW) and Aweil North (AN) Counties show GAM and SAM rates above emergency thresholds with 16.9% GAM and 1.7% SAM in AW and 15.9% GAM and 1.4% SAM in AN. The surveys also show poor health, WASH, and IYCF indicators contributing to high malnutrition rates.

Concern is forecasting that total budget expenditure will reach 70% by June 30th. This reallocation and NCE would enable Concern to sustain support for an additional 3 months with regards to the following activities in NBeG:

- OTP in 38 sites
- TSFP in 38 sites
- BSFP in 38 sites
- SC in 3 sites
- · Capacity building of Home Health Promoters for MUAC screening and referral in 29 sites
- In-patient SAM management training
- Mother support groups
- Barrier Analysis

If this No-Cost Extension request to continue nutrition services in NBeG for a further three months will be approved, Concern proposes to remove the corresponding costs from its new CHF second round standard allocation Nutrition application just submitted to the Nutrition Cluster. All remaining proposed activities in Concern's second round Nutrition application remain unchanged, subject to a new award.

Explain the rational to endorse or reject the request

Koch county has remained inaccessible due to security constraints until very recently. Nutrition programming in Koch county will now be covered by World Relief (activities started in the last two weeks with recent RRM mission), therefore a re-allocation of CWW Koch funds is necessary. As described above, CWW have removed Aweil North and Aweil East from their round 2 standard allocation CHF application. Therefore funds are needed to continue supporting these nutrition programmes in the two counties. Both counties are considered priority counties for the nutrition cluster given their high acute malnutrition caseloads and historically high rates of GAM. The nutrition cluster therefore supports a NCE and re-allocation of CHF funds to support CWW nutrition activities in Aweil North and Aweil East.
