### A. Humanitarian Context Analysis

Briefly describe (in no more than 300 words) the current humanitarian situation in the specific locations where CHF funded activities will be implemented. Provide evidence of needs by referencing assessments and key data, including the number and category of the affected population<sup>1</sup>

Both states where INTERSOS plans to operate under this project (Jonglei and Unity) are routinely affected by recurring cattle raiding in dry season; for example, Inter-agency Needs Assessment team estimated that, as a result of cattle raid on October 2013 in Twic East, Jonglei state, 16,735 individuals were displaced (source: *Twic East County Cattle Raid Vulnerability Assessment, 24 October 2013*). In addition, due to its natural landscape of being Nile river basin area, floods in rainy season continuously displace hundreds of thousands of individuals every year; UNOCHA reported that as of November 3<sup>rd</sup> 2013, more than 223,000 individuals affected in flood season 2013, nearly 40% of them in the two states (source: UNOCHA). Also, especially in Pibor county in Jonglei state, conflicts and clashes between Non-State Armed Actors and the SPLA are causing widespread displacement; between 2013 July and November 2013 alone, Shelter/ NFI cluster provided life-saving NFIs (including plastic sheets as emergency shelter item) to more than 20,000 households, with prospect of reaching to at least 5,000 households more in the area (source: INTERSOS).

Furthermore, South Sudan is receiving continuous flow of returnees from Sudan, which requires assistance in counties like Bor South (Jonglei) and Rubkona (Unity). Even though number of returns in 2013 are so far reduced from numbers in previous years (source: IOM), an unexpected political situation may at any time trigger massive returns of returnees, either organized movement as it happened in May 2012 or unorganized movement through northern borders. As a part of border states, Unity state may at any time receive large influx of returnees.

Then again, on 15<sup>th</sup> December 2103 a violent fighting erupted between Dinka and Nuer elements of SPLA in Juba. As a result, 500 were reportedly killed and an estimated number of 40,000 persons mostly from Nuer ethnic group were forced to flee their homes and seek safe haven in the UNMISS compounds namely Tongping and UN House. In response, INTERSOShas deployed its NFI team in UNMISS Tongping and its Child protection team ub UN House to provide quick assistance to the IDPs in coordinating emergency response activities.

### **B. Grant Request Justification**

CHF funding is vital for sustaining INTERSOS' emergency operation capacity in above two states, as much as coordination role on behalf of the Cluster in Jonglei State which INTERSOS has been filling since May 2012 for now almost one and a half years. Due to its high volume of NFI activities in the state (from January to December 2012, approximately 28,000 households which amounts to more than a third of beneficiaries in South Sudan/ Abyei were from Jonglei State – source: IOM), strong leadership by INTERSOS as State Focal Point organization in Jonglei is necessary for which we need this funding.

INTERSOS has seven years of experience in life-saving and immediate response in the rural areas of the South Sudan. INTERSOS has skilled staff experienced in quickly respond to emergency situations providing immediate relief to the civil and natural disaster affected populations. Proposed activities contribute to the agreed Shelter and NFI Cluster priorities of coordination, including capacity-building, storage and stock management, assessment, and distribution in geographical hotspots prone to on-going emergencies and in need of quick assessment and response. INTERSOS's continued presence in Unity state covering areas specifically requested by State Focal Point organization World Vision, will surely ensure even fuller geographic coverage by the Cluster partners, especially given number of active Cluster partners in the state is very much limited.

CHF funding will ensure frontline field-based and mobile response capacity in the two critical states (Jonglei and Unity), including field coordination in Jonglei State as State Focal Point in the state. It also ensures front line transportation (especially in Bor with International Logistic Officer) and assessment/ emergency shelter/NFI provision with Emergency Response Team in Jonglei State.

Objective of this project is to ensure timely provision of emergency shelter and basic NFI materials in acute emergency (including supply, prepositioning, and distribution). This CHF application supports the overall CAP project, except sustainable shelter/ DRR component (Activity 6 in CAP 2014, "Shelter for Work" activity) and Shelter-survey (Activity 7 in CAP 2014, "Shelter Survey") due to its strict focus on life-saving activities in CHF 2014 first round.

About Gender, INTERSOS will ensure use of Cluster-standard reporting format which will record all data in gender and age disaggregated ways. In Jonglei State, as State Focal Point organization, INTERSOS will also ensure Cluster partners will also use these reporting mechanism and formats.

**NFI PM** will supervise activities, provide technical oversight and manage key NFI staff in Jonglei, Juba and Unity states. PM will also lead on routine Monitoring and Reporting as well as plan and lead PDMs (he will not be directly in charge of distribution).

State Focal Point for Jonglei, in close communication with IOM Cluster Coordinator, will be in charge of distribution, cluster coordination and implementation of activities as INTERSOS in Jonglei state and will supervise the Emergency Response Team. Logistic Officer will manage all logistic arrangements and support emergency response from logistic aspects. Emergency Response Team (3 full time national Emergency Response Team members based in Jonglei) will be deployed all over Jonglei State on demand to participate in assessment, verification, registration and distribution.

**NFI expert in Unity** will supervise all activities in Unity, including distribution.

Cluster-standard formats for assessment/verification, registration, distribution narrative report and also stock and distribution will be used to ensure implementation of activities, quality assurance and accountability to beneficiaries and donors. INTERSOS NFI Project Manager, Jonglei State Focal Point and NFI Expert in Unity will supervise so that 2 logistic assistants and 3 ERT members will collect all data and compile into report, in principle within 5 working days, which will be obtained from registration and/or distribution on the ground. NFI PM will directly report to senior management who will provide quality assurance on all reports. State Focal Point in Jonglei collects data from other partners, compiles stock and distribution data into state-level format, and sends them to the national cluster coordinator. NFI PM and NFI Expert in Unity report the data to SFP in each respective state, so that s/he will send information to national-level cluster lead. These data will be used for the preparation of mid-term report and final report. All data will be stored in 1 dedicated PC in each Bor and Bentiu offices, so that other staffs can have easy access on key staffs' leave.

Monitoring of project implementation will be carried out by INTERSOS Head of Mission and Administration staff through regular project review, such as reviewing INTERSOS' own internal monthly reporting mechanism called PAT (Project Appraisal Tool, (in which PM will
