GOAL requests a change to its original allocation of CHF funds by extending the project duration for an additional two months until 30 November 2013. The major reasons for this request are programmatic delays that emanated from delays in procurement of supplies, the delayed onset of rains and also from the impacts of insecurity and inaccessibility of project locations. Between April – September 2013, the situation in Twic County and Abyei Administrative Area was challenging and fragile to operate in, despite GOAL's best efforts to utilize its strong experience to plan activities accordingly.

In Abyei, following the attack by Misseriya group on a convoy led by the United Nations Interim Security Force for Abyei (UNISFA) which resulted in the death of Abyei's Ngok Dinka Paramount Chief, Kuol Deng Kuol¹ the already fragile situation worsened resulting in thousands of Ngok Dinka taking to the streets of Abyei, burning down Misseriya-owned shops, and causing damage to the mosque. The prevailing situation was not suitable to continue with the planned interventions and GOAL had to halt the movement of staff to areas north of the River Kiir for a month to allow for the heightened tensions to cool down. This had a direct impact on the supervision of sites for livelihood activities and the movement of staff and supplies. At the same time small scale disruptions were experienced in Twic County following cattle-raiding incidents in Ajakuac and Aweng payams which also limited the movement of staff and subsequent supervisions in these Payams.

The rainy season started quite late than expected and due to sensitivity of agriculture to rain fed situation, the start of activities were delayed. Thereafter, the rainy season has commenced leading to floods in some counties of Warrap State and neighboring Abyei Administrative Area². So far about 6365 people have been affected by these floods. The implication is that any pending work must be delayed for some time to allow for water to recede for effective operation and to optimize benefits among the intended beneficiaries.

Specifically, inaccessibility due to flooding and insecurity has severely impacted on the final stages of this CHF-funded project, in which the training of farmers and Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry (MoAF) staff was specifically planned. 800 farmers were proposed to be trained on improved agricultural practices and crop production and crop husbandry practices (600 of these at demonstration plots). As of mid-September, 456 have been trained (211 in Twic and 245 in Agok, of these 65% are female), with the training of 344 farmers outstanding. The timing of this activity is essential to contributing to increased household production as training is required on post-harvest handling. Given that both GOAL and beneficiaries have identified the significant post-harvest crop loss in their areas, GOAL strongly advocates for additional time to implement this. In addition two farmers field days to share good practice and skills and were scheduled for end of September when crops are fully matured and close harvesting. Since crops are at vegetative stage there is need to delay the activity till harvest time rather than carry out the activity at a time when the intended impact cannot be realised.

In Twic County, of the six Payams where GOAL implements food security and livelihood interventions, three (Wunrok, Panyok and Akoc) have been affected by flooding and we are unable to reach 269 farmers with the necessary support. In Agok, of the three payams under coverage two (Rumamer and Mijak) are severely affected with a total of 195 farmers being inaccessible GOAL therefore proposes to postpone these interventions until October when movement between the sites will be possible. Training of 32 MoAF staff has also been pushed forward.

The remaining activities are essential given the severe food insecurity in these two areas. Between June – December 2013, Abyei and neighbouring areas such as Twic County are predicted to remain in a 'Stressed' state of food insecurity according to the IPC v2.0 Acute Food Insecurity Phase classification³. Given further the threat of insecurity that may arise in October due to the pending referendum for Abyei, the two months extension will enable GOAL greater flexibility to re-orient itself and finalize these activities effectively.

Explain the rational to endorse or reject the request

Twic county is projected to remain under stressed food insecurity phase that will negatively affect the welfare of many people. While the agricultural harvest may alleviate the situation the current flooding incidence is likely to lower the expected harvest and hence available food to needy population. Flooding has disrupted a number of operations including those planned by GOAL. Given the fact that it is neither possible nor practical to intervene during floods, the FSL cluster supports the request for extension in order to allow the partner intervene at an opportune time as flood water recedes. The implementation of the remaining activities may provide a boost for those affected by floods to re-engage in production utilizing residue moisture. Again with the Abyei referendum likely for October the additional month of November will provide a leeway for GOAL to intervene whatever activity that may be disrupted by the political process.
