Nile Hope is an Indigenous NGO operating in Jonglei, Upper Nile and Unity States. Following insecurity in South Sudan and following the events of 15 December 2013 the implementation process became interrupted for several weeks and some of the teams engaged to undertake some of the activities evacuated from the field. For example, a contractor that was hired in Ulang to lead in construction of latrines and TLSs had to evacuate following hostilities between government and rebel forces in Ulang. Indeed, our speedboat was hijacked for a while and used by the rebel forces. This information was shared with the Cluster in the course of reporting. Again, prices of construction materials (timber, nails, iron sheet) as well as for transport sky-rocketed (read poor forex exchange) as we did procurement in Gambella in Ethiopia. According to our records, the 2nd tranche of CHF 2013 2nd Round was disbursed on the 20th of March, 2014 and this interfered with resourcing the activities on time. Fortunately, calm has gradually returned since then.

Responding to Education in Emergencies Needs in Akobo and Pigi Counties in Jonglei State and Ulang in Upper Nile State Through Multi-Faceted and Timely Set of Inter-Linked Activities targets up to 2,990 direct beneficiaries in both Ulang (40%) and Akobo (60%) counties. Nile Hope envisages realizing these targets if more time is made available as this will help to realize the project's objective, more so ensuring that 2,440 (1,000 girls and 1,140 boys) in both counties have access to EiEs, life-saving messages and skills and psychosocial support.

Nile Hope is requesting for extra time for up to 15 May 2014 at no additional cost (no cost extension) to deliver on the remaining set of activities, especially establishment of temporary learning spaces.

Owing to the insecurity since the end of last year/beginning of this year as aforementioned, access to Akobo and Ulang was a challenge and some of the project staff could not access the implementation sites on time as scheduled as UNHAS cancelled the flights. It is also instructive to note that in Ulang, Nile Hope's boat (that was used to mobilize the community for local resources (such as poles..) as well as transport staff and materials to the field sites was hijacked by the rebel group thereby disrupting the intervention for some time. Moreover, some of the local staff evacuated from the field sites due to the ethnic dimension of the conflict. We have, however, since restored the situation and engaged local staff who are busy with implementation of the activities in both counties.. We have managed to fast-track the activities to ensure achievement of activities within the new timelines.

We have taken steps to realign our staff to ensure implementation of the remaining set of activities happen smoothly and become fully reported by 31 May 2014.

Last but not least, funds were disbursed late (our records indicate the 2nd tranche of CHF 2013 2nd Round did not happen until 20th March, 2014 (therefore, procurement delays have been experienced especially for the Akobo sub-region as TLS materials had to be acquired from neighboring Gambella in Ethiopia) and this has occasioned delays in resourcing the project activities on time as envisaged.

Nile Hope's Offices in Juba, Bor and Malakal were all looted and this significantly disrupted coordination and administrative tasks and for a moment communication could not be sustained with the field team; this is not to mention that up to now, there is no working telephone network and communication is either through satellite (Thuraya) phone and or internet (connectivity sometimes slow/erratic and or unavailable).

List activities that were implemented during project period:

- Conducted rapid pre-implementation mapping/rapid needs assessment exercises in Ulang and Akobo to objectively determine and confirm the actual and relevant emergency response activities required in both counties;
- Established and or rehabilitated 20 TLSs/safe and protective learning spaces (6 were tented classes set up in Ulang County) to benefit up to 1,560 children (624 girls and 936 boys); 801 children (356 girls and 445 boys) benefitted in Ulang County.
- 3. Construction of 5 latrines (2 in Ulang and 3 in Akobo) completed as envisaged. This is in line with the intervention's strategy to provide WASH amenities in the schools. We are working closely with the WASH Department on this activity;
- 4. Advocacy: We have routinely indulged in advocacy work to ensure that information is shared in regard to schools occupied by armed and or other groups. To this end, we

- We are working to ensure a better harmonized intercluster coordination at the County level to ensure the quality of outcomes;
- Proper state coordination is gradually taking place in Bor; Our state coordinator evacuated at the height of the conflict, but has now gone back to Bor to carry on with coordination work;
- III) Will continue to offer technical support to, and coordinate closely with,

have been able to liaise with the CED in Akobo and relocate the 10 IDP families that had settled at the Akobo Girls B school;

- Continued to offer technical support to, and coordinate closely with, the County Education Departments (CEDs) in both Ulang and Akobo counties to realize the project objectives;
- In Ulang, we managed to distribute EiEs scholastic materials consisting of 10 SiABs, 4
 recreation kits, 94 blackboards and 92 dictionaries. These have benefitted 801 children
 (356 girls and 445 boys);
- We have reached 256 education actors with EiEs trainings including Teachers' Code of Conduct¹, life-skills and PSS. 109 are females while 147 are male and the methodology has included peer training;
- 8. 836 persons (390 female, 446 male) have been reached with awareness campaigns in Ulang County while 935 (435 female, 500 male) were reached with the same in Akobo; these were very instrumental in making the intervention a success (mobilization for local awareness, dissemination of life skills messages...etc);
