# Section 5 - Revision Description and Justification

The Project "Strengthening the Choice and Resilience of Livelihoods Options" is implemented by Oxfam GB together with a local NGO Sudanese Disabled Rehabilitation and Development Agency (SDRDA) in Rumbek North County of Lakes State. The project was designed to address the issues of food insecurity and support food production and increase household income.

Project activities include training of beneficiaries in creation and rehabilitation of their own assets and most importantly, training in basic agronomic practices to equip farmers with improved agricultural skills to increase agricultural productivity as well as to have surplus crop produce for marketing in order to increase their income levels. Implementation of the project activities started in April 2013 with sensitization of community and State Ministries about the project, followed by identification, selection and verification of beneficiaries and their training. Usually, onset of rain falls in April however this year, there was only insignificant rainfall in May -July, whereas from August rainfall intensified. Most roads have become inaccessible, with the Rumbek North's road being the worst in the state in terms of inaccessibility. The partners and Oxfam staff are unable to conduct regular field visits to monitor progress and implementation of the activities. Cash for Work component of the project is affected the most, as the soil is highly saturated with water and even the road construction equipment cannot get through the mud, given the nature of clay soil, work is prohibited. The massive rainfalls have stalled progress of all the project activities. As such the road and market creation must be halted until dry spells are experienced from the end of September to the start October. Crop production has also been affected partially, as cases of flooding on farms have been reported thus, affecting growing plants and routine farm operations. Previously, rainfall patterns were much more reliable, with August having minimal rains and the roads could be accessible. However, the phenomenon this year is complex and the rain continues to fall rigorously, with no variation from the on-set of the rains. Proposed way forward is to have the project extended for one month until 31 October 2013, as the rains are anticipated to reduce towards the end of September and roads will be accessible to allow for project completion.

### Explain the rational to endorse or reject the request

The FSL cluster acknowledges that Rumbek North was one of the counties facing food insecurity following deficiency in production last year and numerous cattle raids during the dry season that disrupted the economic and livelihood activities. While this response was meant to cushion the vulnerable households from continued food insecurity through own production and other livelihood activities, the climatic pattern this year was quite unusual with delayed start of rains which delayed the start of cropping season. This had implications on planned activities and scheduled timelines. To ensure that the project objectives and results are obtained there is therefore need for more time to allow the partner implement the intended activities. The FSL cluster supports the NCE to allow for finalization of project activities.
