# Description and justification of requested change

This project was designed to provide lifesaving emergency onward transport assistance for vulnerable stranded returnees in the event of a sudden onset emergency whereby the returnees are left stranded en route due to lack of means to reach their final destinations on their own. Assistance may include the provision of food, water and shelter at transit sites and during the journey to their final destination. While the need to be able to rapidly provide transport assistance remains essential in the current context, a new population has been identified in need of similar support: foreign nationals stranded in priority states including Upper Nile, Unity and Jonglei.

At present IOM has identified over 90 foreign nationals Upper Nile and Jonglei state whose livelihood have been completely destroyed as a result of the ongoing crisis. This group is particularly vulnerable as a result of rising frustrations against foreign nationals as seen in recent armed actions in Unity state as well as Upper Nile state earlier this year. This caseload has expressed their willingness to return to their countries of origin but do not have the means to do so independently.

IOM is working with the relevant embassies of these foreign nationals to identify solutions to support their voluntary return to their countries of origin. The embassies of Uganda, Ethiopia and Kenya have expressed their willingness to cooperate in this initiative, and can provide temporary travel document, temporary assistance to their citizens upon arrival in Juba, and reach out to their families back home to facilitate transport support to arrive at their countries of origin.

In the next three months, IOM anticipates that over 500 foreign nationals will be in need of emergency transport assistance to leave insecure areas, arrive at Juba and, through the support of their respective embassies, arrive at their countries' of origin.

Towards this end, IOM is requesting a reallocation of \$100,000 to support the transport of these foreign nationals to Juba where they will be assisted with onward travel by their respective embassies.

This initiative will not only ensure the needs of this vulnerable group are met but will also contribute to decongestion efforts in PoCs where many of these foreign nationals are seeking shelter. It must also be noted that while in the PoCs conflict between South Sudanese and foreign nationals is also a significant concern with limited options to address the issue.

With this modification, \$100,000 will remain as an emergency reserve to immediately provide emergency transport assistance to stranded returnees should the need arise.

Project duration remains the same 12 months up to 31 December 2014.
