The security situation in South Sudan has limited MAG's ability to access beneficiaries in the planned locations and forced it to revise its plans. As a result, the provision of Mine Risk Education (MRE) and Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) has been delayed. In order to allow for the full completion of the project and the achievement of the objectives, MAG respectfully requests a one month no-cost extension to the end of August 2014.

A. Modification of operational locations

The security situation in Unity State still precludes the safe entry of our teams and hinders their ability to provide MRE and conduct EOD activities in the region. As a result and before the security situation is fully assessed, MAG will deploy one Community Liaison (CL) team to Malakal to provide MRE to IDPs. Malakal falls within the Cluster geographic priorities 1 for this CHF round and this location will facilitate quick access to northern Unity security permitting.

Regarding the second MRE team and EOD activities, both teams will deploy to Rumbek where they will have direct access to Lakes and displaced people in the area. The CL team will accompany the EOD team and provide MRE to at risk people and report Hazard Areas (HAs). This location has been strategically chosen to allow for the quick deployment of the teams to southern Unity, security permitting.

Outputs, key activities, number of beneficiaries and the budget will not be affected by these modifications.
