## Qualitative assessment of progress

For each intended outcome, provide evidence of progress during the reporting period.	Outcome 1: People in Maryland, River Gee and Grand Kru (Hub 2) and Grand Gedeh and Sinoe (Hub 3) Counties have increased access to fair and accountable justice services
In addition, for each outcome include the outputs achieved. (500 words max.)	The Board's decision to relocate hub services to town center locations for easy access to justice gave rise to the approval for UNOPS to renovate the dilapidated Telecommunications Building in Harper (Hub 2) for the provision of security services in its 28 <sup>th</sup> March 2014 meeting and the instruction to identify town land to construct the court facility for the provision of justice and judicial services.
	17,212 community members in eight counties of three hub regions received information on current and future services to be provided at each Hub. Awareness on hub services was led by seasoned public outreach officers from Hub 1 (x3) in addition to the newly hired, trained and deployed PSO officers (x5) of hubs 2 and 3. Community meetings and interactive radio talk shows were the methodology used to enable community dwellers an opportunity to seek clarification on how the services provided at the Hub could be accessed.
	The recruitment, training and deployment of five public defenders, five public outreach officers/coordinators, nine legal counsels and 10 human rights monitors to augment the strength of existing personnel in the counties was accomplished. The deployment of these personnel will improve the representation of indigent persons, increase prosecution and reduce human rights violations within the criminal justice system, thereby enhancing access to justice at the regional and county levels.
	Output 1.1: Justice sector institutions have adequate human capacity to provide key justice services
	Four of the six priority services approved by the Board in May 2013 for roll out into Hubs 2 and 3 have been rolled out. In addition to Public Outreach officers (x3) and Coordinators (x2), Public Defenders (x5), legal counsels (x9) and human rights monitors (x10) have been recruited, trained, deployed and are currently providing services in Hubs 2 and 3. The recruitment process and development of pre-deployment training for staff required for the roll out of services through the SGBV Crimes Unit is currently ongoing. Although deployed during the May 2014 term of Court, the presence of legal counsels assigned in Maryland was notable, as in conjunction with the resident County Attorney, they ably prosecuted and won three cases to include one rape, one criminal attempt to commit rape and a burglary and theft of property case.
	Four of the six priority services approved by the Board in May 2013 for roll out into Hubs 2 an rolled out. In addition to Public Outreach officers (x3) and Coordinators (x2), Public Defender counsels (x9) and human rights monitors (x10) have been recruited, trained, deployed and are coproviding services in Hubs 2 and 3. The recruitment process and development of pre-deployment staff required for the roll out of services through the SGBV Crimes Unit is currently ongoing. deployed during the May 2014 term of Court, the presence of legal counsels assigned in Maryla as in conjunction with the resident County Attorney, they ably prosecuted and won three cases

Output 1.2: Infrastructure and operational arrangements in place to provide key justice services
Several key decisions were made by the Board during this reporting period that affected the move to implement phase II of hubs 2 and 3. In the 31 <sup>st</sup> January 2014 meeting, the Board approved the division of responsibility regarding the construction – dedicating the construction of Hub 2 to UNOPS and using Government of Liberia "seed funding", the Ministry of Public Works to lead the construction of Hub 3. Due to reduced funding and the need to improve access to justice by providing services from town centers, the Board also approved that UNOPS renovate the dilapidated Telecommunications Building in Harper to provide dormitory facility for LNP PSU officers, regional offices for BIN and LNP and offices for other services to be provided from the Hub at its 28 <sup>th</sup> March meeting. In its 6 <sup>th</sup> June meeting, it was confirmed that land identified in the town center, opposite the Telecommunications Building be surveyed and purchased by the Judiciary for the construction of the Court Facility.
Draft construction plans were developed by UNOPS for the renovation of the Telecommunications Building, vetted with receiving agencies (BIN and LNP) and approved by the Board at their 28 <sup>th</sup> March 214 meeting. The Ministry of Public Works provided draft preliminary plans for Hub 3 to the Ministry of Finance for funding.
The procurement of mobility and logistical equipment required for effective service delivery is underway.
Output 1.4: Justice and security community based justice & accountability services available to citizens
Newly recruited, trained and deployed public outreach coordinators/officers for Hubs 2 and 3, joined forces with seasoned PSO Coordinator and officers from Hub 1 to conduct awareness on hub services in 240 communities in all three (3) hub regions to 17,212 community members and criminal justice actors. Of this number, 9,214 (53.5%) were males, while 7,998 (46.5%) were females. Additionally, 18 interactive radio talk shows were held in the eight counties (Bong, Lofa, Nimba (Hub 1); Maryland, Grand Kru, River Gee (Hub 2); Grand Gedeh and Sinoe (Hub 3) reaching an unspecified number of residents who called in to discuss services provided by the Hub. Through the provision of information on hub services, citizens are now empowered on how to access services and report complaints in the justice system.
Output 5.2: Justice advisory, human rights monitoring, advocacy and support services provided by CSOs to communities in hubs 2 and 3 Counties

	The legal education and justice advisory project was challenged during this reporting period due to delays in procuring needed logistics and releasing of funds by UNDP.
Do you see evidence that the project is having a positive impact on peacebuilding? (250 words max.)	With the rolling out of priority services in Hubs 2 and 3 during this reporting period, already citizens are benefiting from information on hub services and how to make complaints about justice and security actors who may go against their ethical obligations. It is reported that the strengthening of the Country Attorney office through the provision of additional legal counsel in Maryland successfully increased the number of cases prosecuted and assisted with the maintenance of peace as citizens received redress faster through the prosecution of their cases.
Were there catalytic effects from the project in the period reported, including additional funding commitments or unleashing/ unblocking of any peace relevant processes? (250 words max.)	SIDA (Swedish International Development Agency) contributed an un-earmarked amount of US\$ 1.5 million to the Justice and Security Trust Fund. This funding will be used to support different projects in the sector.
If progress has been slow or inadequate, provide main	The reporting period has experienced some delay in implementation relating to the infrastructure component of Hubs 2 and 3. Two factors drove the delay – access to justice and limited resources.
reasons and what is being done to address them. (250 words max.)	In hub 2, both factors played an important role, as the Board decided that building on the hub land provided by the Government would decrease access due to its distance from the town center and owing to limited funding, it was important that existing, unused buildings be renovated to cut cost.
	To address this delay, the Board approved the renovation of the Telecommunications Building for the provision of security services in Harper and the Judiciary is in the process of finalizing negotiation for the purchase of private land opposite the Telecommunications building so as to capitalize on resource sharing, thereby limiting cost and providing improved access to justice to citizens of the county.
	Hub 3, on the other hand, experienced its delay due to the late engagement of the Ministry of Public Works, who was designated by the Board as the Government lead coupled the budgetary shortfall regarding the provision of "seed" funding by the Government. In solution to this problem and using the joint letter sent by the Assistant Secretary General of the UN and the SRSG of UNMIL, the co-chairs of the Board have written to

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	the Vice President's office for resolution to this matter.
	Therefore, resolutions and speedy implementation of these projects are expected to resume in the third quarter of the calendar year.
What are the main activities/expected results for the rest of the year?	Several projects are expected to be implemented during the course of the year. However, the main activities include the following:

Through the strengthening of institutions to provide improved access to justice, the recruitment, training and deployment of staff for the Sexual Gender Based Violence Unit; the procurement and delivery of mobility and logistical equipment for criminal justice actors and the procurement of (BIN) uniforms.
	Similarly, it is expected that the construction of hubs 2 and 3 infrastructure initiates, as the need for these key infrastructure is required to provide much needed security presence in the regions.
	The combined delivery of these services or construction will collectively improve access to justice and security services in the 3 hub regions.
Is there any need to adjust project strategies/ duration/budget etc.? (500 words max.)	The project did not start at the 1 <sup>st</sup> September 2013 as was originally scheduled. Funding to start the implementation was made available to national partners only in March 2014, a six month delay. Equally, giving that Liberia is experiencing a health crisis with the outbreak of Ebola and most people are curtailing their interactions with others, thereby minimizing meetings, the recommendation is that the project be extended (non-cost extension) at least to 31 December 2015, as this will allow for this situation and also take into account the delayed start date.
Are there any lessons learned from the project in the period reported? (500 words max.)	One main lesson learned from the implementation of projects in hubs 2 and 3 is the timely procurement of mobility and logistics for those deployed to the region. Reports have been forwarded that personnel deployed are unable to effectively perform their respective tasks due to the absence of much needed equipment and mobility.
