Qualitative achievements against outcomes and results:

Outcome 1.1 Inclusive map of CS stakeholders by district established and updated

1.1.1 Mapping civil Society stakeholders

In collaboration with WFP, UNICEF and REACH consultant, a template including the core nutrition actions to be mapped by stakeholders has been prepared, discussed and approved by MOH and the National Food and Nutrition Technical Working Group in different meetings during the quarter. A stakeholders list has been updated and reviewed and the tool has been sent to each of the listed stakeholders for completion.

In addition to the mapping at national level, the mapping of nutrition partners at district level is being conducted. This mapping will cover all small local organizations acting at district level, including the CBOs, FBOs and WBOs working in nutrition

1.1.2 Review of Civil Society Alliance Terms of Reference that incorporates membership criteria, roles and responsibilities of the alliance and official registration of the SUN alliance as a Rwanda civil society organization

The final TOR was validated by 59 CSOs who committed to be member of civil society alliance during the first General Assembly. During the first General Assembly meeting, CSOs proposed to the SUN civil society elected committee to proceed to official registration as a Rwandan Civil Society Organization with the Rwanda Governance Board (RGB). CRS supported this process in collaboration of the executive members by:

Reviewing the legal status of alliance according to RGB requirements,

Preparing all request documentation including the SUN work plan and budget

All official registration documents of SUN members

The agreement on the legal status by all members.

The process is still ongoing and will be finalized by notification of registration of the SUN CSA by Rwanda Governance Board

Outcome 1.2: CS Alliance coordinating mechanisms established and functional

1.2.1.: Organization of learning event for the district SUN focal point

The elected focal point of civil society in each district leads civil society engagement from their district in the alliance and represents the district in national coordination efforts. The purpose of the event was to learn about the nutrition situation in Rwanda and its consequences and learn about the role of the SUN focal point and RNS focal point in the district in scaling up nutrition. RNS focal points, SUN focal points and representatives of 13 districts were invited in the event including Kirehe, Gakenke, Nyamagabe, Musanze, Burera, Muhanga, Kamonyi, Nyanza, Gatsibo, Kayonza, Rwamagana and Kicukiro. During the meeting, it was found that DPEM committees (committees to spearhead and coordinate implementation of District Plans to Eliminate Malnutrition) are in place but are not functional in all districts. In order to scale up nutrition, SUN CSA with the help of SUN focal point in all districts need to advocate, sensitize people on nutrition through civil society, and activate DPEM committees at all levels. Participants in the meeting proposed CRS and RNS team to plan to meet the governor and mayors and sensitize them on SUN objectives and activities in the district.

1.2.2. Organization of District competition on organizing a district mobilization event around nutrition in the district

Following the establishment of the national-level CSA, CRS has collaborated with RNS and district staff to organize civil society sensitization meetings at district level. During these meetings, a district-

level SUN Civil Society Focal Point has been elected. The SUN Civil Society Focal Point has the mandate to lead civil society engagement from their district in the Civil Society Alliance. To date, 13 districts have been mobilized.

<u>Objective of the Competition</u> is to support district-level efforts to scale up nutrition and to continue to mobilize civil society organizations in a district competition for a small grant to hold events that mobilize district-level civil society actors around nutrition.

Types of activities to be supported: Public events on nutrition-related topics (workshops, conferences, community discussions, theatrical events, concerts on topics such as 1,000 Days, methods for promoting dietary diversity at the household level, household budgeting for good nutrition, growth monitoring, linkages between good hygiene and nutrition, male engagement in household nutrition, government actions on nutrition including DPEMs, recommended complementary feeding practices), advocacy to district governments around nutrition, particularly around DPEMs.

Each project from the district will be awarded by an amount between \$500 - \$1500 for district-level community mobilization events and advocacy activities around nutrition.

During the quarter, CRS received applications for the small grants competition and at quarter's end was screening recipients.

Outcome 2.1: Civil Society Alliance strengthen national and multisectoral partnership toward scaling up nutrition

2.1.1 CSO members Organize and conduct interpersonal communication (IPC) sessions at community level through (CBOs cooking demonstrations)

10 IPC sessions planned during this quarter with a maximum of 25 participants have been organized in 10 sectors of 6 districts and reached in total 250 persons. The audience groups of these IPC sessions were caregivers of children under five years of age and pregnant women. Key messages provided were:

- Nutrition during pregnancy
- Exclusive breastfeeding for six months
- Importance of hygiene
- Children immunization
- Balance diet and composition of complete diet all the time
- Infant and Young child nutrition

During the IPC sessions, nutrition knowledge gaps were identified and these gaps created a learning opportunities.

2.1.2. Organize Mobile Video Unit (MVU) to support 1000 days campaign

MVU is used to educate more people on nutrition using films showed to educate population on nutrition: how to prepare well balanced meal and promote the 1,000 days campaign. The mobile video increases the knowledge of caregivers on good nutrition and health.

During this quarter three session of mobile were conducted in different areas of the country. One session conducted in May was done in Ruhango District, Byimana sector and reached up to 300 people, another two sessions were done in June one in Rwamagana district, Mwurire sector and reached to 267 people, and the last session was conducted in Kicukiro district Gahanga sector where 250 people where reached.

Before the mobile video, mobilization events communicating the messages on nutrition, and sessions informing the audience about the time and venue of the MVU session were carried out during the day and MVU in evening of the same day. The key points in implementation of all these activities involved community based organizations, local stars or artists and stakeholders including participation of local leaders in the event.

2.1.3. Organize and conduct meetings at community level to engage CBOs, FBOs, women's organization and Right to Food groups on scaling up nutrition movement

During the quarter, eight meeting sessions were done at district level and ten meeting sessions were conducted at community levels. The objective of these meetings was to sensitize local leaders and other stakeholders about the 1,000 days campaign and prevention of child stunting as well as to mobilize and bring together nutrition focused Civil Society Organizations in scaling up nutrition. The meetings conducted at community level targeted CBOs leaders, FBOs, women's organization and Right to Food Groups on scaling up nutrition. Meetings conducted at district level targeted alliance members. Other participants in these meetings were staff in charge of nutrition at health centers, hospitals and local leaders. In total these meetings reached 175 persons at district level and 212 persons at community level.

The message delivered during these meetings focused on working together to scale up nutrition. The presence of local leaders and health centers nutritionists facilitated the discussions about new cases of malnutrition reported in the area as well as different strategies that can be used to prevent malnutrition such as working together in educating Rwandan population especially pregnant women and caregivers of children under five years old. These coordinated meeting sessions have contributed to improve the coordination without duplicating efforts. It has also ensured that nutrition civil societies, stakeholders and other involved members of the community understand the needs and priorities of communities and collaborate effectively regarding scaling up nutrition.

Outcome: 3.1: Alliance members participate in SUN Learning Network with other SUN CSAs

3.1.1. Communication with SUN Global Movement

Regular communication by online correspondence during preparation of the Global Nutrition report was done in order to share with the SUN global on the achievements in establishing the Rwanda SUN Civil Society Alliance.

3.1.2. Participation in the Global Nutrition report launch meeting for East Africa organized in Tanzania, Dar Es Salaam

Three members of the Executive Committee of the Rwanda SUN Civil Society Alliance participated in the East Africa Global Nutrition Report Launch meeting held in Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania, May 2015. The meeting was attended with other SUN representatives from different East African Countries including Uganda, Burundi, Malawi, Kenya, and Tanzania. The objective of the meeting was to share the achievements, challenges, and mode of action for the Global Nutrition cases specifically in East Africa. The discussion focused on the SUN civil society strategies used to prevent malnutrition and child stunting in East African countries. Each represented country shared their methods used, challenges and action to be taken regarding nutrition. For Rwanda, there is a need to strengthen the SUN CSA and establish it as an independent organization, have a permanent

coordinator to follow up regularly on SUN activities and operations; and to continue to collaborate with other stakeholders locally and internationally.
