#### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

For many years, the human rights situation in Cote d'Ivoire was marked by serious and widespread violations, including targeted sexual violence again women. A UN assessment mission in January 2010 concluded that the absence of a comprehensive strategy to address the consequences of sexual violence was inhibiting a fully effective response by the government, UN system and NGO partners. The situation deteriorated rapidly after the contested elections in January 2011. Due to escalating insecurity in Abidjan, the UN Action network was unable to deploy an Adviser to assist UNOCI and humanitarian actors to respond more effectively to the sexual violence related to civil unrest.

Instead of deploying an adviser to CDI, UN Action sent an advisor to the Central African Republic in 2010. Conflict-related sexual violence was perpetrated by all sides to the conflict in the Central African Republic and in provinces where rebel movements were active. In March 2011, UN Action sent an Adviser to undertake a situational analysis, and advise on how the network could provide strategic support to the Special Political Mission (BINUCA) and the UN system. The adviser concluded that most of the UN's programmes reassess their approaches, and that the UN Action network assist BINUCA to develop a strategy to guide the UN's response to conflict-related sexual violence in CAR.
