2. National Programme Progress

2.1 Narrative on Progress, Difficulties and Contingency Measures

2.1.1 Please provide a brief overall assessment of the extent to which the National Programme is progressing in relation to expected outcomes and outputs and the opportunities and challenges. Please provide examples if relevant (300 words).

Although the inception workshop of the programme was held in late 2012, shortly after signature, the inception process had to be completed, and this took a few months that cover the reporting period (January-April 2013). As part of inception, a national implementation modality for UNDP components was agreed between governmental counterparts and the UNDP, on the basis of an internal assessment of capacities coupled with additional financial & administrative training provided by UNDP during the reporting period. This will increase enormously the level of national ownership and management of the programme, but required some months of ensuring this transition.

The first programme steering committee was help in April 2013 and was successful. It comprised UN-Nigeria management, Nigeria governmental management, UN-REDD staff and Nigerian civil society representatives, who deliberated in a very collegial spirit.

The recruitment of key personnel is a crucial factor to allow a smooth implementation of the programme. During the reporting period, the terms of reference of the key personnel were finalized, and the recruitment process, initiated.

2.1.2 Please provide a brief overall assessment of any measures taken to ensure the sustainability of the National Programme results during the reporting period. Please provide examples if relevant. (200 words)

The inception process extended over the reporting period, to ensure the key implementation arrangements were in place. In particular, arrangements for national implementation were crafted and agreed, which will increase the degree of national ownership and management of the programme and hence speed up implementation. The programme steering committee, held in the middle of the reporting period, served to confirm common priorities. In particular, the recruitment of key personnel was deemed indispensable and a priority, and therefore the reporting period ended with advancements in such recruitment process.

The programme has had a slow start in this period, in which the inception phase was completed with the first UN-REDD Nigeria project steering committee meeting, held in April 2013 (which was the inaugural meeting). In addition, the federal government requested UN-REDD rapid support for the crucial drafting, consultation and submission of the R-PP in order to access the last financing window of FCPF for REDD+ readiness; this support was made available and just after the reporting period, in late July, the federal government was able to make its first submission of the R-PP to the FCPF (this was also aligned with advancing implementation of outcome 2.3 of the UN-REDD Nigeria programme).
