At the national level, the project through the Highlands Joint Programme Steering Committee engaged with the Department of National Planning and Monitoring. At the sub-national level, the project established a Grants Awarding Committee composed of the Southern Highlands Provincial Administration, UNDP (RUNO) and CARE PNG (IP) to review and approve community peacebuilding grants. The inclusion of the provincial administration aimed at engaging the government for their buy-in and oversight of the grants as well as ensuring the projects are aligned with the government's provincial and district peace and development plans. The project and government (provincial, district and local level) jointly conducted field missions to monitor implementation of community projects, such as community resource centres and water points supported by the project. IOM (RUNO) jointly planned, and launched with the communities, partners and government (provincial, district and local level), the CPDPs in Southern Highlands (4) and Hela (3).



The project supported the establishment and capacity building of five inter-denominational mediation teams led by the Catholic Diocese of Mendi and the United Church to mediate eight conflicts identified in Hela and Southern Highlands provinces. The heads of the mediation teams were sent out for intensive training at Mindanao Peacebuilding Institute, Philippines, to enhance their capacity in mediation and conflict resolution skills. The mediation team members are selected from the communities in conflict who are neutral but well-informed of the root causes of the conflicts to ensure local capacity is built to resolve the conflicts. Additionally, the mediation teams regularly followed up with the four communities in Hela that have been through violent conflicts and have previously agreed to a ceasefire, providing accompaniment to avoid relapsing of conflicts into violence. The project supported communities in conflict and recovering from conflict with community peacebuilding grants, which included projects such as agriculture and livelihood projects, community halls, skills training, and water projects. The peacebuilding grants aimed to promote peaceful coexistence, social cohesion, and mutual respect by strengthening cultural, social, and economic relations between communities. Community Facilitation Team (CFTs) upskilled by the project on peacebuilding and development co-facilitated the 5-day community planning sessions with the project and local authorities, including the finalization and launch of the CPDPs. A coordination platform has been established between LEP Centres, VCOs, churches, councillors, and community leaders. This platform has a basic understanding of the referral pathways, how to conduct referrals and which service providers are involved and available in the provinces to support GBV and SARV-related issues. These service providers are St. Francis Care Home for SARV survivors Mendi, Family Support Centres, and Family Sexual Violence Unit (Police). Ongoing engagement of this coordination platform is critical to ensure collective action and ownership of peacebuilding efforts. A network of peacebuilders decided to observe elections-related conflicts locally. Such community initiatives will provide additional capacity and insights into the current peacebuilding and continue to monitor post-election-related incidents in the community. This group plans to reconvene to provide their observation on the election and how women effectively participated in the election.

The project provided two (out of five) community peacebuilding grants to women groups in Kumin and Yami communities in Southern Highlands province to help generate funds and venture into business or community enterprises resulting in improved livelihood and encouraging women and girls' engagement in community peacebuilding initiatives. The gender inclusive CFTs helped in building the capacity of members of their communities, including women and youth, on peacebuilding and development planning with knowledge they acquired from the training. There is an emerging cadre of potential women leaders who display quality leadership attributes. Increased awareness and understanding by men of the importance and benefits of gender equality, and equal participation in program and service delivery is observed through the project's efforts.

The project's capacity enhancement activities aimed at enhancing the knowledge and skills of traditional and nontraditional leaders in conflict-sensitive leadership, conflict transformation, and conflict analysis start to show promising results. An example of how participants of a training programme is a woman leader and conflict mediator from North Koroba, Hela, who has shifted the traditional approach of conflict resolution – of finding fault and setting compensations of pig-killing and cash-paying – to a more faith-based resolution that will greatly decrease the hefty penalties usually set by conflicting sides. She has successfully resolved several family disputes; her interventions specifically help protect women from retaliation and violence. Many community people have praised her positive engagement in their communities. The project has also trained 231 Community Mobilizers (women and men, including young men and women) in leadership and conflict management. There is a disconnect in the reporting process between grassroots-led peacebuilders and mediators with the formal structure (i.e. village courts). In many instances, data collected by the grassroots-led builders and mediators are simply reported to their internal structures, such as the churches and community leaders and do not reach the local authorities (Government). This project is bridging this gap by promoting the coordination and engagement of actors.

In a very traditional society such as Hela province, where only men exercise leadership, the project is encouraging engagement of women at the leadership level particularly for their role in conflict prevention and resolution. The project has trained seven (7) women leaders and help them emerge a role model in their communities. They have reported gaining the attention of their community because their problem-solving approaches focus on a win-win solution, and their interventions help protect women from retaliation and violence. The project has also supported the improved understanding of the importance of addressing conflict in a peaceful manner without resorting to violence. Many community members lack an understanding of the correlation between peaceful communities and how they facilities positive development and changes. The peace messaging focused on the theme "why peace matters for development and positive change" for behavioural change campaigns targeting mainly the youth population as future leaders of their respective communities. On many occasions, conflicts are solved in silos without the engagement of the many stakeholders present in the communities, such as churches, women and youth leaders, village courts and local leaders, peace officers or traditional leaders. There is a growing recognition of the need to utilise existing networks in conflict management

The project has developed a Tableau-based conflict tracking platform for collecting baseline data. The conflict tracking dashboard allows the government and development partners to maintain a common situational picture of known conflicts in Hela and Southern Highlands provinces. The project also supported the UN Country Team in developing and maintaining an internal electoral violence incident tracking platform during the 2022 elections. The project supported capacity building in DTM improved the knowledge and skills of local authorities, communities and partners to respond in a timely manner to the needs of at-risk, and conflict-affected communities. Those equipped with the DTM skills continue to share relevant data or information with IOM and local authorities regarding the situation in their communities. Many of the stakeholders reached through the intervention pointed out that despite several service providers' presence in the province, they have little knowledge and connection with these service providers affecting their accessibility. They can confidently do referral services with improved knowledge and understanding from the trainings delivered by the project.

There is limited analysis of the core drivers of conflicts among peacebuilding actors, including CSOs, and political and church actors. Peacebuilding responses tend to be reactive in nature with limited use of longer-term peacebuilding approaches. There is a gap in understanding of possible peacebuilding solutions, that practitioners do not necessarily have all the tools and capacities, in particular analysis tools, to work on longer term approaches that aim to resolve conflict issues.

The communities have reported to UNDP that their leaders play a more proactive role in identifying potential triggers for conflicts and violence and their positive interventions in violent prevention.

The communities attribute the positive role of the leaders to their increased capacity to analyse and identify responses needed to address key conflict challenges they face.

Guala community in Hela province

What were the challenges/problem they faced prior to the project implementation?

Guala community was affected by tribal conflicts and is now working towards sustainable peace with the support of the project.

The community healthcare facility, Guala Sub Health Centre lacked lighting after its generator broke down a few years, and the staff had to resort to using candles and battery powered torches when working at night. Failing to respond to patients during the night largely because of no lighting would get the healthcare blamed or harassed by the patients' relatives, including triggering conflicts.

What has been the impact of the project on their lives

With the technical assistance from IOM, members of Guala community are working together to implement their Community Peace for Development Plan (CPDP), a live document that brings together women, men, and youth to tackle issues they face.

Guala's CPDP empowers the community to sustain peace and advance sustainable development through a bottomup approach.

The women, men, youth, and children in Guala listed various CPDP interventions for implementation, and these include installing lighting around the community, especially in strategic locations, which will significantly improve the safety of women and girls, in particular.

IOM responded to this need, supplying the community with solar lighting kits that were installed at the healthcare facility, primary school, and church.

The church host the transit facility that helps displaced persons who seek refuge in Guala while awaiting stabilization, or peace reconciliation to be done in their communities.

Churches continue to be on the forefront in peacebuilding and reconciliation efforts, and the Christian Brethren Church provided the venue that was used for CPDP planning, and also gave inputs to the plan. The solar lighting kits that IOM provided will also be installed at the Christian Brethren Church.

1. "I felt unsafe and would get stressed while working at night because we had no lighting here. Failing to respond to patients would make us get blamed or harassed by the patients' relatives. We improvised and used candles and torches when responding to emergency and deliveries at night," highlighted Nolin Kenowa, of Guala Sub Health Centre.

"These solar kits are a tremendous help to us and the patients. I feel safe and relieved, and can better perform my duties," she added.

2. Monica Ipanda, a women leader from Guala welcomed the assistance saying, "This assistance will enable women to continue with our sewing at night," she said. "Women from neighboring villages that are affected by violence receive skills training in sewing and baking while taking refuge here," added Monica.

"It is with great joy to receive support from various organisations to drive our peacebuilding and restoration efforts."

2. "I am part of the CPDP work from the time it started here because I want our community to embrace peace and development." – John Puni, Ward councillor for Kikita 2.

3. "A number of people, especially women and children, sought refuge in Tigibi when they were confronted by conflict and tribal violence. The Tigibi community continues to assist displaced mothers and children and work towards promoting peace. It is fitting to have a Community Resource Centre for the benefit of many of our people," said Malingi. "This is a great model to build and maintain peace, and I will continue to engage with the government and partners to pilot this approach in other council wards," he added.

He pledged PGK 50,000 (USD 14,000) for each community on behalf of the provincial government, highlighting that the funds will be used to support the delivery of community projects identified in the CPDPs.

UNDP: There is a limited local capacity in the highlands to deliver on project sub-activities. UNDP needs to provide technical support, training, and continuous mentoring to enable implementing partners to deliver the results. UNFPA: The volatile security situation in both provinces, poor internet, and power outage in Mendi and Hela adds to the challenge of implementing the project's intervention in the project location.
