The development of the project proposal was done having consultations with the Ministry of Territorial Administration and Local Power, and the definition of the target areas and tabancas in which the project should focus was determined jointly with them. Additionally to those kick-off meetings, through the project team held 2 formal meetings with Governmental Representatives (July and October 2022).

Several governmental organizations were represented in the 1st steering committee meeting held on the 04th November 2022 namely, the General Directorate of Territorial Administration, the General Directorate of Local Power and the General Directorate of Administrative Decentralization of the Ministry of Local Administration and Local Power, the National Land Commission, counting with the presence of the partner agencies, UNDP and WFP and representatives from various Civil Society Organizations with a relevant role in project implementation and its donor - the United Nations Peacebuilding Fund. Although invited, the Institute for Biodiversity and Protected Areas did not attend.

Additionally to the above, there was the ongoing and complete engagement of the Focal Point of the Ministry of Territorial Administration and Local Power in all stages of the project, including the 2 weeks Intervention Mapping Mission in the target-regions held in August 2022 and in the CBPP training of Trainers held in the Quinara Region in November 2022.

The kick-off of activities of this outcome was severely affected by the delays in terms of hiring of the project coordinator, who only started the assignment in mid-June 2022. This situation had a negative impact in preparatory stages of project, including the selection of implementing partners. Despite the initial challenges, the project team is now almost complete and an effort to compensate the initial delay is ongoing.

UNDP and WFP consulted with the Ministry of Territorial Administration and put together a list of 15 tabancas in the three targeted sectors which are particularly vulnerable to climate-related conflicts. This selection was based on partner consultations at the proposal stage, and the target pertinence confirmed in the field mission of August 2022. The mission allowed also to understand that the project needed to broaden the targeting to the 3 sub-communities in Lagoas de Cufada: Tira Camissa, Atché, Cufada – due to their strong connection (including a common Association) and to mitigate conflicts that could arise from the selective support.

The attribution of a low-value grant agreement to Tiniguena, one of the project's major implementing partners, is finalized and this IP has supported the UN agencies in carrying out the Intervention Mapping Mission. The creation of community-based monitoring structures (activity 1.2.3) was launched in a mission to Buba (November'22), and the training activities for traditional and religious leaders and local CSOs, especially Women Civil Society Organizations (WCSOs) (activity 1.1.2) is in the process of recruiting trainers, preparing session plans and training materials, and should be deployed in 2022.

A Call for Proposals for WCSOs is under preparation and will be launched soon for implementation of the outputs 1.1 and 1.2, as well as community radios to support the implementation of output 1.3.

The ToRs for the recruitment of the International Consultant to develop the gender-sensitive civic awareness products and awareness campaigns on climate security risks (activity 1.1.1) and will be launched soon.

The Intervention Mapping Mission held in August 2022 allowed the project team to gather very relevant, practical and useful information to support the development of the project's Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment strategy, as well as to develop a Gender Sensitive implementation approach. The information was collected through the facilitation of focus groups with the Regional and Sectoral Local Authorities and Civil Society Organizations (especially Women's CSOs), as well as through the application of a data collection instrument/questionnaire in each of the targeted communities in sex-segregated groups.

The Intervention Mapping Mission allowed to collect relevant information regarding:

• the women's role in each region/tabanca in all issues addressed by the project - conflict, climate change, and resource management

• mapping of local women CSOs with whom the project can liaise to implement its activities

• main civic spaces to promote, considering the need of building the capacity and empowering of rural women.

• main strategies and approaches to be adopted to successfully promote women's participation and engagement in the project's activities (gender perspective) and to promote men's sensitization to the need for women to participate in the decision-making spaces.

This Outcome was severely delayed by the late kick-off of the project and by the lengthy process of selection and screening of the implementing partners. In July 2022, a call for interest was published to allow NGOs to submit their proposals for the implementation of resilience activities in the three targeted regions. The proposals were screened by WFP's Programme Review Committee, and three NGOs (NGO AD in Cacheu, Guiarroz in Gabu and ANCOPF-GB in Quinara) were selected. The contracts are currently being finalized and will be signed by the end of November 2022. However, the NGOs have already begun to prepare the activities, and will attend the WFP liaised with its regional office in Dakar to organize a training in November 2022 on WFP's methodology called "community-based participatory planning" (CBPP). The CBPP brings together communities, partners, and local government to jointly analyse local livelihoods, vulnerability profiles, land use and landscapes, exposure to specific shocks, and the main problems affecting people, including gender inequality. Based on the information collected, the CBPP then generates a practical plan to address underlying causes of food insecurity and undernutrition, and to strengthen livelihood resilience in the medium-term. WFP wishes to use this methodology in each targeted village to identify, together with the communities, the resilience projects to be implemented in the context of Outcome 2. A training for facilitators will take place on 7-12 November 2022 in Buba. It will gather around 15 participants, including staff from WFP Guinea-Bissau and representatives of UNDP, project implementing partners (ONGs AD, Guiarroz, ANCOPF-GB and Tiniguena) and representatives from the national and local government. The key objective is to train WFP's partner NGOs to use the CBPP methodology, so that they can apply it to select a resilience project in each target village. The first day of the training will cover the theory, while the following four days will take place in the field, where the participants will apply the CBPP methodology to draft an action plan with one of the targeted villages.

The contracts with the implementing partners clearly highlight the project's focus on Gender Equality and Women Empowerment and binds the NGOs to achieve the project's results in terms of GEWE. Moreover, the CBPP training is organized in a gender-sensitive way. The project team will make sure that the participants in the training are at least 50% women. Similarly, the team will make sure that women are well represented at the community-level during the practical part of the training in the field.

- The sea level rise makes it impossible for people of Djobel to remain on their territory, and this situation deepened the pre-existent conflict between Djobel, Arame and Elia.

- Loss of arable land and salinization of bolanhas was also reported in the remaining communities by all the communities visited. The lack of access to fresh water in the dry season hinders horticultural production and forces communities to travel long distances to find water.

- Climate change increases the communities' dependence on cashew on disputed land and increases conflicts.

The focal point of the Ministry in the project activities has been fully involved in every stage of the project implementation, including the 2-week intervention mapping mission held in August. - A participatory management of the park should be in place, but it is not happening.

A joint initiative mapping intervention mission implemented in the 3-target regions between UNDP, WFP, full participation of the Ministry of Territorial Administration, Civil Society Focal Point, Tiniguena, and AOFASS. During the mission, kick-off meetings and data gathering initiatives were rolled out with Local Authorities, Civil Society Organizations (especially WCSOs), local radios and 14 out of 15 targeted tabancas (1 tabanca, Tebe, was not possible to reach due to the road conditions).

The mission allowed to gather relevant data regarding: the main conflicts, root-causes and actors involved in each region/sector; to better understand the main vulnerabilities to climate change present in each region; enhance the perception of the different degrees of vulnerability to conflict and climate change within each region and sector; generically determine possible mitigation/resilience measures in each sector (a dedicated activity to determine which resilience activity will be implemented in each tabanca will be rolled-out in the beginning of November 2022); better understand role of women in all issues addressed: conflicts, climate change and resource management; determine which are the main civic spaces to be energized in each target-region; the main risks and precautions to take during implementation, including precautions regarding articulation among implementing partners; determine the main strategies and approaches to adopt for project implementation.

After the mission, debriefing and reflection sessions were held counting with the participation of all involved stakeholders to create a common and shared vision of the gathered information and strategies to have in consideration while preparing/revising the project's work plan.

The Terms of Reference for the baseline study were jointly prepared and the hiring process is currently being rolledout.

The creation of community-based monitoring structures to closely follow-on the impact of climate change over the use of land, water, and other natural resources (Activity1.2.3) is under preparation, having the main groups of stakeholders to be involved been identified and the selection of people from each tabanca to be involved rolled-out in the 2nd week of November 2022.

The project's sustainability strategy sits in five main pillars:

1. Increased stakeholder capacity, mainly Rural WCSOs in terms of climate change, resilience, mitigation, and participation in the decision-making. It is hoped the increased knowledge will enable the target communities and other stakeholders, under women's leadership, to continuously seek new adaptation solutions after the project ends.

2. Resilience activities based in the CBPP methodology is a key tool to ensure the full ownership of the resilience activities. Thanks to its participatory nature and in-depth exploration of the communities' challenges and needs, the methodology ensures sustainability of the resilience assets built in the context of the project and opens the way to dialogue within the community on climate change resilience.

3. Facilitation of dialogue forums at all administrative levels – community, sectoral, section and regional levels – with the active participation and leadership of WCSOs, and including all relevant stakeholders in the targeted areas, will allow the development of common agendas and commitments (action plans and monitoring strategies) to follow-up action in terms of mitigation of climatic risks;

4. Synergies between this and other projects working in the same areas/topics. These synergies will allow to capitalize the project results and ensure the sustainability of the initiatives implemented in the scope of the project. Concretely, the project will foster synergies with the following PBF projects:

a. Transhumance and Land conflict, in order to create the common agendas for solving the land conflicts between pastoralists and farmers in Gabú;

b. Political Stabilization – Phase II, in order to create connections between the common agendas created in the scope of the dialogue forums facilitated under the Women in Civic Spaces project, and the Citizen's Convention or other national agendas and action plans fostered under this project.

5. Pilot initiative of Microinsurance (project's catalytic effect) that, in case its efficacy is proved, will grant the ability of the communities to continuously find the financial means to fund the resilience initiatives as well as to be financially compensated in case of significant losses due to extreme climate change impacts and events.

Are there any other issues concerning project implementation that you want to share, including any capacity needs of the recipient organizations?

In the period of 8 months until the planned end of the project, there are several situations that may pose difficulties for the proper implementation of the planned activities as well as the measurement of their results, such as: - the cashew harvest season (March-April), the campaign period for the national assembly elections, scheduled for April 2023 (date yet to be confirmed) and also the Ramadan scheduled for March-April 2023, will force a slowdown of activities in the field. Additionally, in the Cacheu region, the cashew season is a time when conflicts are heightened due to the fact that the plantations are on disputed land;

- consequently, the timeframe to implement the resilience projects in a very participative and articulated approach between the implementing partners of both agencies in order to maximize the impact of the actions, will be constrained. Moreover, the choice of resilience initiatives to implement will also be negatively conditioned by having to be implemented exclusively during the dry season.

- the short term to implement the strategy for stakeholder capacity building, community, sectoral and regional dialogue forums in a conflict and gender sensitive manner, and to develop strong common agendas and related monitoring plans;

- short term to implement the strategy to articulate and create synergies with other projects as foreseen in the sustainability strategy;

- With an expected end in mid-July 2023, it will also be difficult to measure the impact of the project activities, namely the effectiveness of the resilience initiatives in both seasons, and the capacity for autonomous action by the consultation spaces and women's organizations.

- Finally, the Pilot initiative of Microinsurance/Microsavings (project's 200.00 USD catalytic effect funded under NCE Funding Window- Flexible Funding Opportunity) will be implemented between Dec-22 and Dec-23 in one of the target-regions, and the possibility to create synergies and multiply the impact of both initiatives will be severely affected by the short time to cooperate.

Therefore, the project team is considering the request a no-cost extension in order to maximize the intervention's impact and sustainability.
