Integrated Security Approach and Human Rights Defenders

Kvinna till Kvinna conducted ToT and refresher training on the Integrated Security (IS) Approach for WHRDs, LGBTQIA+ HRDs and the Independent National Commission on Human Rights (INCHR) staff. The result of this training has shown that participants are now having less burnouts because they now have the knowledge and skills to detect and address stress.

Human Rights Based Approach

The HR Groups work closely with the Human Rights Monitors to support with monitoring and follow up on human rights abuses in the communities. As a result, there is increased awareness of HRBA and human rights issues and a coordinated approach to address human rights violations. In addition, HR Groups are now recognised by local authorities and are referred to in case of human rights violations.

Two dialogues were facilitated in each of their respective communities. Partner Organisations conducted HBRA Training, Basic Sexuality Education, Importance of Protection of Women & Rights Defenders, and access to security referral pathways to report abuse or violations cases to, Influential Community Leaders. As approaches differed from community to community, through cross partner organisation collaboration, harmonized strategies or approaches of implementations of activities to ensure sustainability and involvement. Partners also worked during reporting period to finalise activities and create exit plans in hopes to ensure community structures could continue activities after the end of the project. All the forums talked about skills training, under skills training, were Liquid soap making, Clorox production. It was realized that the training has empowered most of the participants to provide funds for community HRGs.

INCHR held a training to bring key stakeholders on speed to build networking with LGBTIQ, youth, and Women Human Rights Defenders (WHRDs) Groups to enhance collaboration and strengthen coordination ahead of the mid- term Universal Periodic Review (UPR). The specific 3-day training provided awareness, education around discriminator conditions affecting those from marginalized communities and key entry points for national level advocacy for Human Right Defenders.

During the reporting period, the Head of Office working in collaboration with the Liberian INGO Forum as the chair of the Coordinating Committee had meetings with government entities. This included meeting with the Ministry of Finance and Developing and Planning's Hon. Augustus Flomo. This high-level consultative meeting with the Deputy Minister Flomo; took place with members from the Coordinating Committee members. Also in this reporting period, there was a localisation technical working group established within the INGO Forum. The Gender Department under INCHR held a 3-day training providing a summary of INCHR engagements in promoting and protecting the rights of individuals from the LGBTQI community. Though, INCHR is a government funded Institution, it does not under either the Executive, Judiciary or the Legislative and it is in partnership with the Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GANHRI), Economic Community of West African States(ECOWAS) and African Union(AU). Discussions of the Human Rights Based Approach took place which covers the basic principles of Human Rights irrespective of their sexual orientation and identification. The objective of the training was to increase awareness and education surrounding the current discriminatory conditions affecting LGBTIQ in Liberia, human rights defenders, and especially for emerging youth Human Rights Defenders. The training ended with SOGIE issues

This shows that there are opportunities in the future in restoring the lines of communication and trust between leaders/influencers and community members and re-establishing community members' ability to recognise each other as 'human beings' regardless of gender, sexual orientation or health conditions, so that issues of joint concern to community members can be resolved peacefully. Though the evaluation showed that total acceptance of LGBTQI rights was not adopted; the foundation of the beginning steps of treating individuals from this population humanely were adopted. The evaluation also found that in general the project was very relevant though different partners implemented activities using different approaches depending on the approach, community dynamics and previous experiences. Future recommendations highlighted the importance of working on community-level advocacy efforts rather than national level advocacy. It was reflected that changing the mind-set of constituents is the first step to ensure national level advocacy can be accepted for individuals of the LGBTQI community.

Therefore, it is likely that the training on a human rights-based approach and the positive relationship between Kvinna till Kvinna and its partners contributed to the positive outcomes achieved at the community level. Multiple factors contributed positively to the outcomes achieved. The project, through CSOs, responded to communities' basic needs for healthcare and the project was implemented in respect of and actively used the existing networks and power structures within communities to spread their message. Though the evaluation found 'Informal governance systems differ from one community to another. A good analysis and understanding of the community governance systems are key to identifying the key influencers and to ensure that all key influencers are on board to deal with the key community challenges, including those of violence and discrimination.' This in turn shows that despite challenges at the community level, key influencers can and if provided with adequate resources can continue to support peacebuilding interventions at a local setting".

Kvinna till Kvinna is intentional about addressing women's empowerment, gender quality, and human rights-based approaches to ensure that project participants are reached. Partner organisations were supported to ensure that 80% of the rights holders benefiting from the intervention were women. All of the structures established/strengthened have women as participants and in leadership positions. The Integrated Security Workshops (both ToTs and refresher) targeted a cross-section of women considering intergenerational discussions on women human rights defenders. Additionally, community women were part of the workshop to ensure women's empowerment. The Women Human Rights Defenders session had over 55% of the younger generation, while the LGBTQIA+ session had over 85% of the young generation. For the engagement with WHRDs, older women (40 and above) made up 55% of participants, while young women (28-35) made up 45%. The network's leadership structure did consider both the young and older generations and targeted non-binary people.

It is through this engagement, that Kvinna till Kvinna was more involved with the two (women and LGBTQI) networks. Furthermore, it was this project that catalytically launched the formalisation of the Women Human Rights Defender's Network. This network is now established and had an official launch after the close of the project. Finally, a small continuation of this project will continue in partnership with the Irish Embassy. This initiative will work with two civil society partners to continue community level Human Rights Based Approach dialogue sessions with community leaders and influencers. It is the expected outcome of this project to be transferred to a local civil society actor at the end of this project.
