#### I. Situation/Context for the Proposed Joint Programme/ Project:

The UN Secretary-General's Call to Action on Human Rights (February 2020) reiterated the importance of ensuring that human rights are placed at the center of sustainable development and encouraged Member States to make "full use of human rights mechanisms, including the Universal Periodic Review, the human rights treaty bodies and the special procedures, as well as national human rights institutions to contribute to SDG implementation, particularly at the national and local levels". Within this context, engagement by UN Country Teams (UNCTs) with national and international human rights mechanisms and integration of their recommendations in UN programming is crucial to ensure that the support provided to national efforts to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) integrate a human rights-based approach.

Since 2018, UNDP and OHCHR have started implementing joint initiatives bringing together UN and national actors to create synergies between SDG implementation and monitoring processes and the follow-up to the recommendations of the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) and other human rights mechanisms. These initiatives convened UNCTs, national SDG implementation and monitoring structures, national mechanisms for reporting and follow-up (NMRF)², national human rights institutions (NHRIs)³ and other stakeholders on a regional basis and yielded important lessons learned and opportunities for further UN engagement at the country level.⁴ In addition, UNDP and OHCHR have worked in several countries to develop integrated national planning mechanisms and promote the use of existing global tools linking human rights recommendations with SDG targets and indicators⁵.

In 2020 and 2021, a large number of UNCTs will develop their Common Country Analyses (CCAs) and UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Frameworks (UNSDCF), which will frame their assistance to Member States' efforts to achieve the SDGs. Within this context, the Secretary-General will be issuing a

They constitute a fundamental pillar of national human rights systems. Support for the establishment and strengthening of NHRIs as Paris Principle-compliant national institutions has been an important element of the UN system's country engagement strategy as well as a mandated activity provided for by UN General Assembly and UN Human Rights Council resolutions. NHRIs are also indicators of sustainable development as per the SDG global indicator framework (SDG 16.a.i).
