Briefly describe the main activities carried out by the Implementing Partner Please limit your response to 175 words ILRAJ first organized a series of community engagements with approximately 150 people including ward councilors and women leaders to discuss SGBV challenges and identify victims and survivors. Consequently, ILRAJ has established a network of SGBV survivors for experience sharing and to make context-specific recommendations for overcoming SGBV challenges. The members are aged 13-30 years old and are mostly school-going young women. ILRAJ staff includes a counsellor with experience in providing psychosocial support to SGBV survivors, in addition to a gender expert. They have identified community animators (1 per community) with expertise in sexual health and sexual and physical abuse. They have begun work on simplifying and translating relevant provisions of the Sexual Offences Act 2019 into local languages, and providing education on reporting SGBV, and accessing support and justice.

Briefly describe the main activities carried out by the Implementing Partner Please limit your response to 175 words FEDURP will be facilitating multi-stakeholder engagements in the targeted communities, to further investigate water issues and to agree solutions, building support for the project among the communities. Stakeholder support is crucial, as there are competing and overlapping interests to contend with. However, this is on hold as the design will be informed by the final Peace and Conflict Analysis. Given the community-led approach, these engagements will lead to final decisions regarding exact water kiosk locations, with the buy-in of currently-marginalized community members, primarily women. Following this, FEDURP will train women on business skills to ensure they can adequately and equitably manage the water kiosks.

Briefly describe the main activities carried out by the Implementing Partner Please limit your response to 175 words WANEP surveyed 500 community members as well as worked with 200 community members in focus groups to inform the Peace and Conflict Analysis that is currently being finalised. In four out of the five communities, WANEP has conducted three-days conflict management training with 40 community members (160 total). The training focused on four types of Alternative Dispute Resolution, positive and negative peace, and de-escalation. The participants also considered cultural beliefs and practices on gender and women which can contribute to and/or exacerbate conflict, including water-related conflict.

The Project Board is in the process of being established, with the UN Resident Coordinator, the Regional Minister and the Mayor of Freetown. The Board has not formally met yet due to the main stakeholders not being available. The first meeting is expected to take place in December to update on progress so far and the workplan for 2023. However, in June the UN RC, the Minister and the Mayor met with UNCDF, ILO, implementing partners and community members to be briefed on the project. The Project Technical Committee is also being established and will hold its first meeting in November, with both the Regional Ministry and Freetown City Council represented by technical focal points, along with UNCDF, ILO and implementing partners. The Technical Committee will continue to meet quarterly throughout the project. There are additional meetings between the UNCDF Project Coordinator and the FCC water specialist as and when required, and the UNCDF Project Coordinator also participates in coordination and information sharing meetings with colleagues from the UNCDF Blue Peace initiative. The Project Board will meet annually and receive regular updates from the Technical Committee meetings.



All preliminary activities have been completed. The convening agency, UNCDF, recruited the Project Coordinator in October, in addition to ILO's earlier recruitments of a National Project Coordinator and a Finance and Administrative Assistant in June and August respectively. This project team receives support from UNCDF and ILO regional offices and from colleagues working on the UNCDF SL Blue Peace initiative, which complements W4WP. The project was officially launched on 15th June by the UN Resident Coordinator, the Minister of Western Region and the Mayor of Freetown, with key stakeholders present, including councillors, women's groups, implementing partners and UN colleagues.

Following workshops with the implementing partners in March, April and June, UNCDF has signed implementing agreements with ILRAJ and FEDURP and funds have been released for the first set of activities. ILO has signed implementing agreements with WANEP and SLLC. WANEP conducted a survey among community members to inform the development of a Peace and Conflict Analysis that is currently under review and will be finalised in November.

WANEP conducted a survey in September 2022 to inform the indicator baselines and the development of a Peace and Conflict Analysis that is currently being finalised. Respondents confirmed that sometimes experience water shortages (94%) and that water shortages lead to community conflicts or local disputes (87%).

To address sources of water-related disputes, WANEP is working with women-led community-based organisations to form inclusive platforms in each of the communities to discuss issues around water, environment, employment and peace. Conflict management trainings conducted by WANEP in each community are complementing this activity. SLLC is mobilising women's groups to raise awareness on issues regarding peace and social cohesion, within and between communities.

With city councillors, ILRAJ conducted preliminary engagements in all target areas, and consequently ILRAJ established a network of survivors and victims of water-related violence, including SGBV. This network is a space for experience sharing, but also for community members, primarily women and girls, to develop methods and solutions to overcome challenges related to water-related SGBV. ILRAJ has also identified community animators with expertise on sexual health and sexual abuse who they will work with to tackle SGBV and other challenges. The ILRAJ activities focus on access to justice, awareness-raising and attitude and behaviour change relating to gender-based violence, and support for survivors. Following the finalisation of the Peace and Conflict Analysis, ILRAJ will work with WANEP on how the survivors' network feeds into community conflict resolution mechanisms, in an appropriate and sensitive manner.

Whilst still a work in progress, the activities under this Outcome have strengthened community support for this project, building on the core theme of GEWE. Women, especially survivors of SGBV, are often stigmatized and marginalized in the target communities. The survivors' network is providing the space for experience sharing and to learn how to access support and justice and will further engage community members on justice. Furthermore, the members are being empowered to tackle SGBV and to challenge the existing harmful structures of power and control in their communities. By working with community animators and leaders, the network members are no longer isolated victims, but become agents of change. Civic spaces for all community members will empower women and girls to be active decision makers on water issues. The civic spaces are for all community members, so that women and men are working together to tackle water conflicts, especially regarding management and distribution, in their communities, which will contribute to gender equality in the long term.

Whilst it is still too early to report on this outcome, work is underway to support women who have been survivors and victims of water-related violence to form a network which will work to tackle attitudes and behaviours which are drivers of conflict and violence in their communities. A joint workshop in October with all the implementing partners, city councillors, women leaders and community members developed key messages and methods of communication (social media, flyers, dramas, etc.) which will be rolled out through various community activities. Women will play an active role in behaviour-change communications and awareness raising in their communities. Site visits with women community members identified the locations of the water kiosks which will become their livelihood. In addition to the Peace and Conflict Analysis, a conflict-sensitive and gender-responsive water value chain analysis in targeted communities is about to be conducted to determine inclusive, sustainable, and decent business and livelihood opportunities. The water kiosk designs are complete and the request for proposals will be published in November, with construction due to begin early 2023. These will inform how the water management system will be structured, accounting for the payment capability and the inclusion of marginalised groups in each community.

First, the business cases and plans developed with and for the women who will manage the water kiosks will include cost recovery and maintenance, and provide sufficient incentives for vendors to guarantee continuous operation. The water value chain analysis includes the payment capability of the local community. Additionally, the kiosks use solar energy to remove the reliance on fuel for generators, which is particularly important given the extreme increase in global fuel prices. Most importantly, the water management plans ensure an appropriate and equitable distribution of quality, affordable water into the long term, which will significantly reduce water-related conflicts within and between communities. From conception, through design, implementation and exit, this project has engaged, consulted and supported community members to take ownership and decisions regarding this project, and this ownership and belief in the model will sustain the established mechanisms into the future.
Are there any other issues concerning project implementation that you want to share, including any capacity needs of the recipient organizations?
Since July 2022, Sierra Leone has experienced rising tensions, exacerbated by the global economic climate, inflation and the rising cost of living, in a country where even a marginal increase can have a grave impact. Added to this, Sierra Leone will have presidential, parliamentary and local elections in June 2023, and historically, elections have proven to be a time of disruption and sometimes conflict and violence. Freetown, the capital city, is under particular focus with the main political parties very active. Conflict in Freetown is consequently increasing, as seen in August when public demonstrations led to violence between the police and the public, resulting in fatalities. The temperature of the political climate will continue to increase as we get closer to the election date, which could impact project implementation. Considering this, we will request a no-cost extension of 6 months (up to end of December 2023), with a budget revision, to ensure that the project is fully implemented, and the results are delivered.
