



Since the 25th of October 2021 military takeover, the country has been in a prolonged political crisis, coupled with a considerable delay in implementing most of the provisions of the Juba Peace Agreement, many of the original planning assumptions of this project have been challenged. It is now clear that certain outputs will not be possible to achieve/implement in the remaining time of the project's duration. At the same time new needs in several of Sudan's states with a view to supporting peace infrastructures and peace processes at the local level are arising. Therefore, UNDP and UNHCR request for a project reprogramming and 6-month no cost extension to reconfigure outcomes, outputs and activities in aligning with the new MPTF/ PBF Strategic Results Framework.

The project has successfully recruited two International United Nation Volunteers (IUNV), one National United Nation Volunteers (NUNV) and one national officer. During this reporting period the project, only the NUNV and the national officer are still working on the project, and recently a national senior peacebuilding officer had joined the project team to ensure smooth implementation of the project within the remaining timeframe.

The project succeeded in contracting three implementing partners to date. Additional partners and project beneficiaries will be identified within the new scope of the project if the reprogramming and no cost extension are approved by the PBF.

The project did not conduct a baseline survey as the dynamic and fluid political landscape imposed uncertainty regarding the direction of the project.

UN Joint Conflict Analysis and Peacebuilding Programming:

In complementarity with the PBF Secretariat project, and in partnership with UNITAMS, the project has implemented UN Sudan joint peacebuilding assessments, an extensive exercise involving qualitative and quantitative data collection and analysis in seven states (North, West, and South Darfur, Blue Nile, South Kordofan, Red Sea, Kassala) in cooperation with local partners (University of Khartoum and PDCs in the regional Universities). The assessments are provided an evidence base for peacebuilding programming and for the implementation of the UN Common Approach in Sudan, a UNITAMS/UNCT jointly agreed framework on priorities and critical gaps. The assessments are intended to support the UN in Sudan, and its partners, to develop a joint understanding of the causes, drivers, and consequences of conflict, to support evidence-based conflict sensitive peacebuilding programming, to inform policy recommendations and the implementation of the UN Common Approach utilizing inclusive, participatory and community-based approaches. A full report was prepared and shared with UNITAMS and UN partners.

Sudan Early Warning System:

The lack of conflict early warning information and systematic updating of conflict/context analysis to inform early actions that can prevent escalation of violent conflict is one of the major gaps in Sudan. In complementarity with The Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office (FCDO) fund and PBF Secretariate project, the project supported advancing analytics of conflict forecasting and analysis through the Crisis Risk Dashboard (CRD) in partnership with Peace Research Institute (PRI) of the University of Khartoum and PDCs from the regional universities. The system will offer UNITAMS, UNCT and peace partners in Sudan with regular and systematic analysis of conflict indicators to enhance joint planning and early response.

Building National Capacities for Peace:

The project contributed to capacity building and development of peacebuilding materials in Sudan, that are contextualized and adapted to the Sudanese realities and guided by global and regional experiences through the Conflict Sensitivity and Peacebuilding Programming training modules in partnership with United Nations System Staff College and PBF (complementing on the PBF Secretariate project), and Hate Speech curriculum in partnership with UNDP Accelerator Lab. The training materials offer an easily available opportunity to strengthen national capacities for CSOs and peace partners to effectively support and promote social, cultural, economic and political peace, in which all parties and stakeholders contribute to non-violent societies.

Support to Juba Peace Agreement Implementation:

Acknowledging that the JPA is very contested by different local communities, it is still the legitimate framework for achieving durable and sustainable peace in Sudan. The project provided pre implementation support to the JPA, including support strategic communication of the agreement to explain to and popularize it with the public, providing technical and advisory support to the Peace Commissioner and Darfur Permanent Ceasefire Commission (PCC) - two entities provided for in the JPA to advance implementation, nationally as well as with regard to the Darfur Track security provisions - to enable both entities to better serve their mandates while advocating for full support to the implementation of the agreement among UN agencies and the donor community.

While it is not yet clear what the new political dispensation means for Sudan, and when a new government will be formed, it seems clear that there will be no return to the status-quo-ante and there may be considerable impact on the implementation of the JPA including the commitment to establish a neutral, accountable, and effective JPA structures and mechanisms. The project provided support to the Peace Commission to advocate and raise awareness on JPA, secondment a communication specialist to support the commission outreach, and developing the PC website - a digital tool that would effectively enhance the PC visibility, information sharing and engagement with the public and peacebuilding actors at local, regional and national levels.

In addition, in response to a request from UNITAMS, the project provided support to the Darfur Permanent Ceasefire Committee established in September 2021 under the leadership of UNITAMS. The project supported creating a logo and overall visual identity for the PCC and produced branding visibility (vehicle stickers, vests, T-shirts, caps and wrist band) in coordination with JPA signatories and the government. It was deemed critical as the PCC assumes its functions that PCC members and patrols are easily recognized as PCC by the local population; at the same time the visual identity also serves to support the common identity of members of the PCC.

In the absence of a formal/government action to advance a national peace architecture, CSOs are emerging as key actors in efforts to reduce violence and facilitate the conditions necessary for building a sustainable peace especially at the community level. The project conducted two dialogue sessions organized by Peace Research Institute, Khartoum University in September and October 2022, bringing 22 actors including representatives from Sudanese Revolutionary Front, CSOs, academic institutions and members of government JPA negotiation team to discuss challenges and entry points for peace and security agenda and priorities.

13 out of 22 invitees for the two national dialogue's conducted under outcome 1 were women. The discussion emphasized the importance of full inclusion and equal participation of women and youth in the CSOs peacebuilding spaces and mechanisms and the peace representatives pledged to it.


The Peacebuilding Assessment in 7 states adopted the gender-responsive questionnaire and was carried out to assess the situation related to gender-sensitive issues and barriers to women participation in peace processes. 7 joint field missions had been organized with UNCT in the peacebuilding assessment areas and all had included gender dedicated consultations with women leaders.

In partnership with Peace Research Institute (PRI) and Peace and Development Centers (PDCs) in the five Darfur states, West and South Kordofan, Blue Nile, and East Sudan States of Kassala, Gedarif and Port Sudan, the project conducted a series of inclusive and participatory peace dialogues and confidence building fora during the period from September to November 2022, to strengthen social cohesion and build consensus around JPA and local peace issues utilizing initial data and issues highlighted in the peacebuilding assessment (where applicable). The dialogue fora had mobilized 204 local peace actors including but not limited to community reconciliation mechanisms, native administration, youth and women groups. The regional recommendations will be used to guide formulation of community led action plans. The plans will be shared with the community-based reconciliation mechanisms for follow up on implementation.

An Advisory Committee composed of peacebuilding experts from the PRI had been formed to ensure that the regional PDCs apply conflict sensitivity in their work and to facilitate inclusion of youth and women groups priorities in the peace process at national and sub-national levels. This is also intended to create national structures to ensure sustainability of technical support and continued engagement.

Under Output 2.2, UNHCR has supported displacement affected communities in North and West Darfur through information campaigns to claim and exercise their housing land and property rights and enjoy improved access to services and protection, including access to legal documentation, information on HLP rights, and collaborative resolution of disputes over land and natural resources.

- In 2022, 602 individuals in Abu Shouk and Zamzam IDP camps in North Darfur received information through community group information sessions, of which 42 individuals self-identified and received counselling on HLP issues. 886 individuals in IDP camps and gathering sites in West Darfur received information on the types of and requirements for legal identity and civil documents.572 individuals in WD received counselling services on registration and issuance of marriage, death and birth certificates.
- NRC will conduct trainings on legal identity and civil documentation in November and December 2022, targeting Mazoons (traditional marriage officiants) and midwives."



UNITAMS together with the UNCT in February 2022 initiated a peacebuilding assessment exercise to generate an evidence base for UN Sudan engagement around peacebuilding. The work consists of six state-level peacebuilding assessments, analysing the conflict-affected states of North Darfur, South Darfur, Blue Nile, South Kordofan, Red Sea and Kassala, as well as updating an existing peacebuilding assessment on West Darfur.

These Peacebuilding Assessments aim to:

- Contribute to a shared understanding of the causes, drivers, and consequences of conflict, as well as of opportunities for peacebuilding
- Serve as a basis for deliberations around prioritization and sequencing, as well as for discussions with other peacebuilding partners and the wider international community
- Underpin the implementation of aspects of the UN Common Approach though an integrated analysis
- · Offer a substantive basis for more streamlined funding to increase agility and avoid overlap.

The assessments constitute an inter-agency exercise undertaken by UN Sudan within the context of integration and under the guidance and leadership of the Deputy Special Representative of the Secretary-General and the Head of Integrated Office.

The project provided support to the peacebuilding assessment through liaison with local partners om the ground, participate in the data cleaning and analysis, and providing substantive support to the research.

The project has conducted an analysis on available reliable secondary data sources offered by UN agencies in Sudan for the CRD with the aim to identify data gaps and ensure cost effectiveness measures to direct data collection. The system in its current state provides conflict monitoring tool and data related to incidents from the 18 states against political, economic, environmental, social and security dimensions. An automation plan for data integration from the identified open sources had been developed and process is ongoing. Consultations with UNITAMS and UN agencies on developing joint data integration and protocols is undergoing and the predication module had been applied to the political and security dimensions with ongoing effort to apply for other dimensions as well.
