The project has been completed with a No Cost Extension extending the end date of the project to 16 February 2023. The 6-month no-cost extension allowed Search to conduct all activities initially planned for the project that were delayed because of the following issues:

hindered movement due to covid-19 and October 2021 events

fuel shortages and the devaluation of the SDG by the Central Bank of Sudan in February 2021
Search's partner in Gadarif (MAMAN) faced a critical turnover, as both the project coordinator and the project manager left the organisation for different reasons.

The activities that remained included a new element of women's livelihood initiatives, which were added under Outcome 3, Output 3.2. This initiative was added based on the recommendations of recent evaluations that indicate that women's social and political empowerment requires an aspect of economic empowerment as well. The economic empowerment, through small livelihood initiatives, was intended to strengthen participating women's resilience and build their confidence.

The extension included an updated risk matrix to reflect the current context, which evolved since the original project document given the political transition and consequent protests. The extension also included an updated results framework to reflect revised activities and the inclusion of baseline indicator values.

The final evaluation is partially completed. The revised version is delayed due to the ongoing conflict on the ground. At this time, Search is waiting to hear from the consultants on the completion of the evaluation.

The project continued to empower an intergenerational and diverse group of women leaders from the peripheral, conflict-affected states of Sudan to meaningfully engage in peace, security, and advocacy at various levels: as advocates for community concerns at the local level as well as candidates for prospective transitional bodies. The project continued to engage young men to act as leaders and champions for women's inclusion and active participation in the complex political landscape. Retrospectively, the project made significant and sustainable gains for women's improved political participation in Sudan through the induction of different beneficiaries into formalised decision making platforms and increased public participation, reaching approximately 6,427 beneficiaries. Women Leader Networks, whose members have independently conducted various cascade grassroot awareness-raising sessions in West and South Kordofan on topics related to women's rights, GBV and UNSCR 1325. At its final stage of implementation, participants engaged at the earlier stages of the project are beginning to manifest the result of different hard and soft interventions under the project. This is seen through the independent conducting of coffee ceremonies to raise awareness by members of the Women Leaders' Network, the inclusion of 5 members under a women's network into the Reconciliation Mechanism in South Kordofan and the participation of the West Kordofan Women's network in celebrating the International Women's Day by conducting technical training on farming and pest control. This is evidence that the women reached through the project are applying the skills they have gained, are willing to and capable of bringing these gains to others in their home communities. The project has successfully empowered a pool of women and young leaders who continue to participate within their local communities through the conducting of independent cascading awareness raising sessions. This activity demonstrated the leadership capacities of women and youth to participate in the civic space and earned their recognition from local structures. Evidence of this is the inclusion of 3 members who participated in the Community Peace Forums that attended the state-wide dialogue in Kadugli, South Kordofan in March 2022. Leadership capacities of women and youth have also been actively highlighted through Search's various multimedia campaigns which showcased their leadership in socio-political and economic affairs. Through a partnership with an individual local influencer, a comedic and informative social media video on Facebook debunked famous Sudanese gender-biassed sayings.

This outcome contributed to the overall objective of empowering a diverse array of women to meaningfully participate in Sudanese peace and political processes as seen by the participation of beneficiaries in local peace structures and decision-making bodies.

As a result of 3 Mentorship Reflection and Training for Established Women Leaders, 100 women leaders were equipped with the skills and knowledge to pass on their accumulated experience onto younger generations. Because of the 12 Peer-to-Peer Mentorship sessions, 61 young women were given the guidance and support they needed. A monitoring visit found that several beneficiaries of these trainings have independently conducted coffee ceremonies within their local communities to spread awareness of women's rights and other gender-related issues. This demonstrated the increased confidence and agency that young women have nurtured after these trainings. 88 young women were engaged on transitional justice issues through 3 Leadership and Conflict Transformation Training for Young Women. Members reached a consensus on transitional justice despite the different charters being proposed to protect the shared rights of women in transitional processes.

A total of 12 Community Peace Forums were conducted in South Kordofan reaching a total of over 450 community members (approximately 75% women and 25% men). The forums provided a platform for young women to lead discussions on grievances driving local conflicts. Moreover, the forums created a space for intergenerational dialogue within the community. Through one forum, the local chief (Omda) of Debebat Kinana tribe in SK vowed to induct a woman leader into his consultative council.

A diverse selection of young women were supported through 12 Young Women-led Community Initiatives, whose activities ultimately reached over 4,600 beneficiaries. These initiatives addressed varying concerns from the community such as access to drinking water, women and infant health, boosting local economies through agriculture, and human rights. These challenges were addressed through hand pump and water yard maintenance, rehabilitating gynaecological rooms, seed distribution to farmers, material needs given to female sellers in the market, and providing education around women's and human rights to university students who felt excluded from participating in the student body due to their gender.

An overt positive bias was employed to ensure women were prioritised, particularly women under 35, to bridge the knowledge and accessibility gaps for training opportunities between the two genders/different generations in traditional patriarchal societies: South Kordofan and West Kordofan. Beyond engagement, activities under this outcome were solely led by women to strengthen their capacity to lead discussion.

The final evaluation revealed that 66% of targeted young women reported feeling prepared to speak and lead on peace and security, compared to 23% in the baseline study. A young woman was selected based on merit (solid skills and contribution) to share the recommendations/outcomes from the Eastern Sudan workshop. There have been numerous instances reported in the final evaluation where women were involved in resolving conflicts, challenged the status quo and took action towards achieving a desired outcome. This is evidenced by the number of community-based peace and security initiatives led by women, which started at zero and reached 15 at endline. For example, women trained by the project held talks with the "reconciliation committee" responsible for resolving the tribal conflicts and land issues in their respective areas, which women were not part of historically, but after this project launched, they gained the skills and confidence. 96% of community members (50% in the baseline study) disclosed positively believing in women's contribution to peace and security.

Further contributing to the overall goal, this outcome promoted the objectives of increasing the capacity and confidence of women to lead efforts to advance peace and security, strengthening their advocacy engagement skills and opportunities as well as amplifying their leadership roles at all levels.

During the project implementation, 6 Common Ground Approach (CGA) trainings for Women Political Leaders engaged over 150 people. Another 2 CGA training for Women and Women Supporters were conducted reaching 43 females and 19 males. These gained skills were utilised in the formation of 6 Women Leaders Networks. CGA training was also conducted for government representatives. These 4 trainings involved a total of 59 participants from different government agencies and CSO's and utilised Search's CGA training module to build capacity for non-adversarial communication, while also building consensus.

6 Peace Agreement Forums were conducted reaching over 200 community members (approximately 67% women and 33% men) to raise awareness of the Juba Peace Agreement and its implications for women. Additionally, 6 Reflection and Planning Sessions brought together network members and male champions to align priorities for women's participation.

Prior to the no-cost extension (NCE) request, 2 Advocacy visits were conducted by women's networks. The visits led to the nomination of three women to the board, recommending the creation of a women's affairs secretariat within the council and cooperation on identification cards for displaced women and children.

This activity was adjusted to Town Hall Meetings whereby 4 Townhall Meetings were successfully conducted in three states. This was changed to ensure feedback from marginalised groups were discussed openly as a community. The meetings discussed the draft constitutional document engaging diverse women and community stakeholders to assess its gender sensitivity and gender-responsiveness. The meetings reached a total of 75 females and 26 males. During the project's lifetime, 4 Youth-led Initiatives were implemented in Khartoum and Gadarif. The latest initiative was conducted in Khartoum in collaboration with university debate clubs to organise a public debate. The session attracted 100 attendees across generations to discuss "National Reconciliation in Sudan." Other initiatives involved trainings, such as in computer skills, gender issues and organisational management, reaching approximately 94 people.

Activities prioritised young people to advocate for women's political engagement, with a particular emphasis on initiatives under A2.2.3 where strategic partnerships were formed with two popular debate clubs, attracting a diverse range of youth under the age of 35 (>70%) from various student bodies. The achievement directly attributable to this outcome was a widened pool of women who gained awareness of their political rights and increased capacity to advocate at state level (target 80%, endline 85%). The impact is directly seen in the increase of community members who believe women are key actors in political processes and advocacy in their communities (baseline 33.5%, endline 94%), as well as the increase in the percentage of women who report having opportunities to influence political processes/policy decisions (baseline 64%, endline 83%). Increased representation of youth and women among workshop participants was further ensured through the creation of diverse women leaders' networks (baseline 0, endline 7) that represented women from various backgrounds and their inclusion in capacity building interventions. Youth engaged in the Peace Agreement Forum and Reflection Sessions which advanced soft skills training initiatives. Town Halls created space for an envisioned future democratic transition that would reflect the rights/demands of women in both the periphery and centre, unlike historic agreements which had only served the needs and demands of few elite in Khartoum.

A combination of innovative offline and online interventions were conducted to increase recognition and acceptance of women's roles and contribution to the socio-political sphere, supporting the objective to amplify their voices so as to open a space for leadership through the transition. At the local level, 14 Friends of Women Luncheons were implemented in West and South Kordofan, reaching 303 male champions of women's political participation.

Women leaders' contributions were showcased through 1 Virtual Discussion on YPS with champions from Sudan and South Sudan. The similar patriarchal contexts of the two countries enabled a rich exchange of lessons learned. Additionally, an intergenerational array of 32 women were connected through 1 Workshop on Young Women's Role in Peace Processes to learn from the experiences of politicians who contributed to the previous transitional period.

At the national level, Search concentrated efforts to reach wider audiences - specifically youth - through various media channels under the ongoing Multimedia Campaign. A Peace Media Academy bootcamp for women was conducted, engaging 12 women with an interest in media (9 under 35 years old, 3 over 35 years old). After the training, the graduates were assigned by the station manager in their home states to be correspondents, to reflect on women's lives and conduct interviews discussing women issues. Additionally, a practical training on gender concepts was conducted for 15 canvas artists entitled "Art for Peace."

A short competition on Search Sudan's Facebook page encouraged the recognition of local women who were active peacebuilders. Applications highlighted real-life stories of women contributing to peace and security in their local communities. The winners received a seed grant (maximum of 10,000 USD) to support their initiatives. The best were highlighted through Search's social media platforms.

Between October and November 2022, 8 Radio Programs aired that delved into a wide range of subjects on women's roles and empowerment. Some of the topics explored included empowering women to advocate for their needs and create positive change, the importance of men's support for women in peacebuilding, and youth/women's participation in the peacebuilding process by actively advocating for their rights.

It is apparent that communities have made significant progress in acknowledging and supporting women's involvement as indicated by 95% of women respondents in the final evaluation feeling their contribution in peace, security and political processes is now recognized. Ninety eight (98%) of respondents agreed or strongly agreed with women are capable of contributing and leading on peace and security in the endline survey, marking an important pillar in the community's belief about the capacities of women in leading peace and security issues. In Gadarif, men engaged women's groups (including advocacy groups) and networks (such as Sudan Women Network and Gadarif Leaders). In South Kordofan, a participant reported their contribution (as the network) to stop a tribal conflict from growing in a neighbourhood inside Kadugli over the last few months and traced this to increased knowledge and also their improved ability to navigate the social dynamics in their community. Once they approached the community, their role was recognized and they sat with the men in the community, who accepted their intervention.

Youth's strong interest and participation in art after the December 2018 revolution informed project activities, utilising canvas art as an entry point to discuss gender roles, concepts and women's empowerment with young artists who would act as agents of change to communicate positive messages on gender equality through different mediums.

Women in Sudan have struggled with political participation as rigid social norms and traditions are overtly gender biassed. Particularly in maledominated sectors such as political and civic engagement, women are rarely at the present in decision-making circles or present with meaningful participation. Their poor representation in decision-making circles in a compound result of social norms and subsequent lack of confidence and capacity to participate in different leadership roles. Women have limited access to capacity building, economic resources and platforms which contribute to political participation and

civic engagement.

A diverse array of women have been engaged, trained and empowered through the project's different interventions. Most notably, diverse women have been given the platform to play leadership roles within their communities through leading networks, community forums and initiatives that serve the broader community.

Women (who participated in a women-led initiative to empower them in the marketplace) were satisfied by the intervention and highly appreciated that there is someone caring for them. One of women (called Dar-Alnaeem) said, "Municipality only takes from us, thank you for being the one who is giving not taking." Another women called Insaf from Alfula market who was also part of this activity said, "I used to divide my capital between buying the goods to sell and renting a table with saving box to put my goods during the work time and use it as a saver after finishing my work but, now I can invest all of my money in buying goods to sell."

	youth	Despite being a majority of Sudan's population, youth from both genders in Sudan bear the brunt of an intergenerational conflict which entails limited opportunities and narrow perceptions around the capacities of youth to lead sociopolitical affairs. High unemployment, poor political participation and lack of social acceptance are few of the many factors which hinder youth's participation in politics. Access to advanced training, platforms and capacity building on topics relevant to political processes and civic participation.	Under different youth initiatives supported by the project, youth in periphery states have gained advanced technical skills to compete in Sudan's tight employment market - improving their access to formal, stable incomes, reducing their vulnerability to political manipulation and improving their overall agency to participate in sociopolitical affairs.

Sustainability has been an integral core of the project's design by prioritising the local ownership and joint leadership of different tangible and intangible outputs achieved through the project. To ensure that the gains of the project are sustained within different communities, beneficiaries of soft skills development are actively encouraged to cascade this information to others in their network who were not direct beneficiaries. Ahead of the project's conclusion, formed women leader networks were already independently playing active roles to raise awareness within their local communities. This is a positive indicator that these same networks will increase their work with the grassroots and sustain the tangible gains made for women's rights at a local level.

To ensure sustainability for tangible gains, the different young-women and youth-led initiatives and women's livelihood initiatives were led by joint committees of diverse women ensuring that social cohesion is equally improved as recognition of women's leadership. Members of these leading committees will be equipped with a mentality of independence and associated skills such that they will be able to mobilise the community to continue the work of the different initiatives.

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Baseline Survey May 2021

The baseline assessment was conducted in Al Khartoum, Al Fula in WK, Kadougli SK and Gadarif. The qualitative data was gathered using FGDs - a total of 8 FGDs, two per each targeting areas were conducted, targeting 80 persons total. There were 10 persons in each group to allow for gender sensitivity, each discussion lasting for two hours targeting men and women separately. 32 key informant interviews were conducted targeting 2 people's male and female at each area a total of 8 persons at each targeted area were interviewed. For the quantitative survey there were 300 copies of questionnaires distributed as follows: 30 copies for women leaders, 30 copies for young women, 25 for community members (Gadarif, West and South Kordofan) and 5 copies for governments in each state, however, in Khartoum state, there were 10 copies distributed to women leaders, 10 for young women and 5 copies for community members. There were 4 well-trained data collection teams with 4 members at each targeted location. The data collection teams were supervised by the lead researcher. The research assistants checked the accuracy and comprehensiveness of the data through daily feedback and review each day.

Event 2	Monitoring Visits 9-17 October 2021	Two focus group discussions were held for 20 women to review the experience of those who received improved seeds and those who participated in the peace agreement forum. Additionally, 121 assessment forms were filled in with the participants who participated in the 4 community peace forums held in Gadarif, Alfashaga, Almafaza, and Kasab.	
Event 3	Monitoring Visits 27 November to 3 December 2021	The pre and post tests were analysed for the participants of the leadership and conflict transformation training that was held in Kadugli.
