The project encountered difficulties in coordinating with the steering committee due to the national crisis set off by the military coup of 25 October 2021 and most recently the war between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the paramilitary Rapid Support Forces (RSF) that started 15 April 2023 both of which resulted in the absence of a civilian-led government. The Steering Committee thus has not met since the October 2021 military coup.

Despite these challenges, the project ensured consistent communication and coordination with UNDP, UNHCR, the Peace Commissioner, UNITAMS Peacebuilding Unit, the Darfur Permanent Ceasefire Committee (DPCC) and PBF Secretariat in Sudan.

Please provide a brief description of any engagement that the project has had with the government over the last 6 months. Please indicate what level of government the project has been engaging with.

Since 25th October 2021, the country has been embroiled in a political crisis that has hindered the establishment of a new Prime Minister and a civilian-led government. This situation has limited opportunities for engagement with the government and has been exacerbated by the conflict that erupted between SAF and RSF in April 2023.

In spite of these obstacles, the project persisted in offering technical and advisory assistance to the Office of the Peace Commissioner (PC) prior to the current armed conflict (the national level position of the Peace Commissioner was established under the Juba Peace Agreement (JPA) and was created under the Transitional Government of Prime Minister Hamdok).

Furthermore, it maintained regular contact with UN agencies' field offices and the Wali's office in North Darfur state (in anticipation of the implementation of a reprogrammed Outcome 3 as per 10 April PBF approval). This approach ensured that the project's objectives were pursued effectively even amidst political instability. These discussions aimed to identify joint strategies to support the agricultural season in the state. Despite the recent conflict, these engagements have continued to identify emerging needs and potential solutions for supporting the winter agricultural season in North Darfur (in anticipation of the implementation of the reprogrammed Outcome 3 as submitted in September 2023 project amendment request, currently pending PBF approval) which is crucial to prevent historical conflict between farmers and pastoralists in the state.

• In November 2022, UNDP and UNHCR had to revise the original project and request a 6-month no-cost extension to align the project's outputs and activities with the constraints imposed by the October 2021 military takeover and delays in the implementation of the JPA. The reprogrammed project was approved by the PBF on the 10 April 2023 and the war between SAF and RSF broke out on the 15 April necessitating yet another reprogramming. Both the October 2021 military takeover and the 15 April war have been highly disruptive to peacebuilding programming and implementation in Sudan

• Despite some progress, the current war significantly impacts the feasibility and relevance of the reprogrammed activities and interventions approved in early April, as well as engagement with key stakeholders such as the PC and DPCC. Operational and security challenges were encountered, particularly in North Darfur where a new outcome was proposed as part of the first reprogramming and initial no-cost extension. To adapt to the new context, UNDP requested a second project reprogramming in September 2023 (reflecting also the recalibration of UNDP's footprint and staffing needs) which is pending PBF's approval. The operational context/security dynamics since April 2023 has challenged engagement with implementing partners and beneficiaries and also resulted in the absence of a baseline survey

• The Peacebuilding Assessments, a collaborative effort of UN Sudan led by UNITAMS and UNDP supported through this project, was successfully concluded in March 2023. It offers data on and comprehensive state-level analyses of conflict dynamics in North and South Darfur, South Kordofan, Blue Nile, Kassala, and Red Sea. The analysis helped UN Sudan and its partners to collectively understand the root causes, triggers and impacts of conflicts, to design evidence-based peacebuilding programmes, and to inform policy recommendations through inclusive, participatory and community-based approaches. Results of the assessments were validated through a series of regional workshops in March and early April 2023 in South and North Darfur and Blue Nile and South Kordofan states. Results remain relevant in the current context as they offer, a valuable data source on pre-war conflict drivers for the six states assessed and constitute the most recent peacebuilding focused data collection that took place in the states now directly or indirectly affected by the war.

• The project contributed to the efforts of the RC/HC and the Durable Solutions Working Group to support the development of the North Darfur Durable Solutions Strategy (2022 – 2026). This strategy aligns with normative, policy framework and international standards. It intends to resolve displacement issues by improving living conditions, fostering social cohesion, building capacities and mitigating environmental effects.

• The project supported 15,322 (10,210F; 5,112M) displacement-affected communities in North and West Darfur to access their housing, land, and property (HLP) rights, improved access to services and protection through increased access to legal documentation, and peaceful resolution of disputes over land and natural resources.

• The project also supported awareness-raising sessions on HLP rights and on legal identity and civil documentations (LCD) in various camps reaching 12,560 (8,802F; 3,758M) adults. Moreover, the project assisted 4,866 (1,882F; 2,984M) individuals to obtain their national numbers, birth certificates, and marriage certificates in collaboration with the Judiciary and the Civil Registry offices.

• The assessment report on women HLP rights in four localities of North and West Darfur state has been completed by the project. It analyzed the social and cultural obstacles and difficulties that women encounter in accessing HLP rights during and after displacement and explored possible ways to achieve durable solutions. The report also suggested some actions to enhance women's empowerment, assistance, and advocacy to challenge the discriminatory and patriarchal practices that undermine HLP rights, and to engage with the government. A summary note of five pages was also prepared and both documents will be shared with UN agencies, and humanitarian and development partners.

In addition, the project facilitated JPA talks led by UNITAMS ensuring inclusive engagement with CSOs, especially women, and leading effective communication of JPA terms and provisions to key stakeholders and the public, particularly in Darfur in collaboration with the Peace Commission. The conflict that erupted in April 2023 has made it impossible to continue the remaining activities under this outcome, which aimed to further assist the Darfur Permanent Ceasefire Committee and to establish a radio station in Blue Nile. The project has concluded six comprehensive peacebuilding assessments in conflict affected states and contributed to the development of the durable solutions strategy for North Darfur state.

The project has developed a hate speech toolkit that offers a variety of tools and resources to help recognize and effectively counter hate speech, mis/disinformation using a behaviorally informed, human-centred approach. The toolkit development was supported by Conflict Prevention and Peacebuilding and Innovation units from UNDP regional hub and reviewed by a wide range of actors including the Oslo Governance Center. The toolkit builds on the experience of the PBF Youth Promotion Initiative project in Darfur implemented by UNDP and UNHCR, where youth used Behavioural Insights and design thinking to create online solutions.

The project in partnership with the PBF Secretariat and UNSSC, developed three additional training modules on community engagement, durable solutions and Darfur for HDP Nexus actors in Sudan. These modules complemented the five modules of the Conflict Sensitivity and Peacebuilding in Sudan Course developed in 2022 and enrich the learning journey through new thematic areas. Moreover, a Training of Trainers was held on 12th – 16th March 2023 for 26 participants from UN agencies and CSOs.

Individuals who self-identified for counselling services have received advice on how to overcome structural/ administrative barriers to fulfil their HLP rights. The project utilized radio shows to spread awareness on legal identity and civil documentation to a wider audience in North Darfur in collaboration with the judiciary and civil registry office who reviewed key messages as well as the final radio show scripts.

The project conducted a mapping of dispute resolution structures and conflict analysis in North and West Darfur states to gain a better understanding of the issues and ongoing dynamics of HLP issues, actors, drivers/triggers of HLP-related conflicts in North and West Darfur. From the mapping exercise. CDR structures were identified and were provided with training and materials on HLP rights to increase their knowledge and skills on how to amicably resolve arising HLP issues within their respective communities. According to the pre and post-test evaluations, there was a 20% increase in participants' knowledge.

The project successfully conducted a negotiation skills training from March 12-14, 2023, for the Women, Peace, and Security network members in East Sudan that has been established in 2022 with the support of the programmatic activities under the PBF Secretariat project. The training was facilitated by the Clingendael Institute, a globally recognized diplomatic training academy. The training was attended by 26 women leaders from various women-led organizations, initiatives, and movements within the WPS network were 19 out of 21 reported that they can effectively participate after the training in negotiation processes. The training equipped women with the necessary skills for mediation and negotiation, so that they can play a more active role in peacebuilding, challenge the stereotypes that limit women's potential and opportunities in local mediation, and promote social change through inclusive negotiation processes.

Male youth participation across the different activities was noted to be considerably low within the IDPs camps (Alsalam, Abu Shouk and Zamzam camps) even though the lack of access to documentation has limited their chances of accessing employment opportunities, different services in addition to limiting their ability to enforce their HLP rights. The limited opportunities for male youth within the camps was noted to increase the likelihood of travelling outside the borders of Sudan to join armed groups or engage in gold mining which has resulted in the death of many. Throughout the project, NRC worked to identify alternative ways of engaging male youth within Alsalam, Abu Shouk and Zamzam camps that could also contribute to peaceful co-existence and social cohesion among the youths in the camp by organizing a football match. During the match days, information and counselling sessions were provided targeting male youth. In West Darfur, the low male participation was evident during the harvesting season as most men were reported to have left for the farms. Due to security considerations, there were limited alternative community engagement opportunities however, efforts such as door to door campaigns by paralegals were initiated to ensure engagement with all target groups.

Since the reprogrammed outcome 3 was approved by PBF on the 10 April 2023 and the armed conflict erupted on the 15 April 2023, implementation of this new outcome had not yet commenced when the war broke out and the project team could not move beyond consultations with local authorities. Most of the planned activities are now no longer viable in the current context and have been subject to another round of reprogramming (submitted September 2023, pending approval) The conflict affected the security conditions, access to beneficiaries and operational capacities in the state and Darfur region as a whole. As a result, the project team had to revise the implementation strategy and adjust the scope of the project to East Sudan, Gedarf State in the latest reprogrammed document that UNDP submitted to the PBF on September 2023. However, UNDP continued its engagement with North Darfur authorities to fulfil its commitment and explore possible solutions to continue support the agriculture season and the dire needs of communities in the state particularly farmers and nomads. Thus, adequate support has been maintained to continue support winter agriculture season in North Darfur in complementarity with PBF, Youth Promotion Initiative project in the state.

A field mission was conducted in North Darfur to authenticate the Noth Darfur Durable Solutions Strategy.

Post-training feedback sessions were carried out to assess the effectiveness of the Women Negotiation training.

The project has conducted an analysis on available reliable secondary data sources offered by UN agencies in Sudan for the CRD with the aim to identify data gaps and ensure cost effectiveness measures to direct data collection. The system in its current state provides conflict monitoring tool and data related to incidents from the 18 states against political, economic, environmental, social and security dimensions.

An automation plan for data integration from the identified open sources had been developed and process is ongoing. A prediction module has been applied to the political and security dimensions and is being extended to other dimensions as well. The prediction module had already indicated Khartoum as a high hazard area before the violence erupted in April 2023. The CRD project has provided various data and analytics for UNITAMS monthly incidents analysis that has been shared with other UN agencies. It has also provided data for informed discussions with peace partners like Data for Change.

The aftermath of the April 2023 crisis has sparked a lot of interest and concern among various stakeholders. To address this, several products are being developed to present the data on the situation in the affected areas, such as the levels of armed violence, human rights violations, civil unrest, displacement, and refugee flows. These products aim to provide accurate and timely information for decision-making and humanitarian response.
