Engage Security Sector to enhance security for female Leaders: In collaboration with Mano River Union Peace Networks, Women's Forum conducted a panel discussion with the security sector to understand policy and system gaps for women peace security. Engagements with government has also been at various phases of the project and this includes: a) The project design and planning phase – The Minister of Gender and Children Affairs and senior level management provided technical input into the project in areas related to gender statistics, policy related issues, priority areas and capacity development needs.

b) Implementation Phase – The government through the Ministry of Gender and Children Affairs are part of the Project Board and the Project Steering Committee and attend the meetings respectively. The Minister of Gender and Children Affairs serves as the co-chair of the Board alongside the United Nations Resident Coordinator with welldefined Terms of Reference. In the Project Steering Committee, the Ministry is represented by a director who provided oversight and technical input to the project. As part of the establishment of the Women Focused Coalition, the Minister of Gender provided reflections and insight into the need for a coalition that promotes peace and safety of women.

The coalition of 120 Women Focused CSOs working on conflict prevention/mitigation and meaningful participation of women was established with structures at national and district level. 218 CSOs working on Women, Peace and Security were profiled and assessed across the project districts (Bombali, Karene, Kono, Pujehun, Western Area Urban and Western Area Rural); to understand their organisational, structural needs that could enhance their coordination effectiveness. The findings revealed a myriad of gaps and needs for the functionality of the women focused CSOs including their strengths and weaknesses. As a result, a Working Together Manual, Terms of Reference for the coalition was developed and adopted by the coalition in a three-day conference held in Freetown. Launched by the Minister of Gender and Children's Affairs, the coalitions' leadership was formed, and communications platform established for all of the districts. Coalition members share a common vision of a peaceful and inclusive society for the benefit of all women and girls in Sierra Leone. Their mission, as espoused in their ToR is to work in a holistic manner to drive locally grounded and inclusive interventions that promote women and girls' participation in peace building at all levels.

WhatsApp groups have been established by the district and national executive members of the coalition to foster effective coordination. Additionally, Coalition members have held meetings in each of the district to discuss remedial action plan for initiatives that will be implemented at district and national level. To enhance their capabilities in grant acquisition and management, 50 Coalition members have acquired skills and knowledge on documentation of project outcomes and in developing knowledge product of projects using media platforms. The training targeted coalition members from all the six districts in Kono, Karene, Pujehun, Bombali, Western Area Urban and Western Area Rural. Additionally, a facilitator has been hired to develop grant acquisition and management training tool and train coalition members. One monitoring mechanism was established by the women's group to assess the level of women's participation in Sierra Leone. This constituted 125 young women groups, faith groups, market women Associations and media groups.

Under Outcome 1, the project contributed to enhancing the capabilities of women Focused groups on gender normative frameworks and in constituting a coalition that promoted women's partipation in politics and peace building.. The project empowered women focused CSOs to work in a well-coordinated and coherent manner to promote peace within their communities and lead as key change agents. This built the agencies of women's groups from various religious and cultural associations. The project contributed to the women's groups that have never participated in electoral processes before.

It is also contributed to reinforcing the women's movement and their role in conflict prevention, mitigation and sustaining peace and national cohesion, while also promoting and domesticating the country's national action plan on UNSCR 1325. The coalition provides a platform for women to articulate their needs and concerns and to influence stakeholders for policy and domestic change.

Additionally, the project outcome contributed to proportional representation of the executives of the national and district leaders; ensuring all chairs of the districts are women.

The establishment of the monitoring platform enhances local women's groups confidence and better understanding of the democratic principles and the legislation governing elections.

The project has contributed to enhancing increased representation of women in parliament (over 18%), councils (35%), and paramount chiefs' level of participation in governance. The project contributed to mitigating conflict by reaching 96,000 people through Facebook, twitter and you tube accounts of partners and UNDP.

27 engagement forums were carried out in various communities if Western Area Urban, Rural, Kono, Pujehun, Karene and Pujehun by the women focused organisations in Bombali, Karene, Pujehun, Kono, Western Area Urban and Western Area Rural. About 1,100 people in communities, market and public places were reached with peace messages. This was done by developing and sharing videos, jingles and radio discussion programs in Bombali, Karene, Pujehun, Kono, Western Area Urban and Rural.

To ensure effective advocacy, a national strategy has been drafted and a consultant hired to develop an advocacy toolkit for the women focused CSOs. As a result, women were included in local administrative structures as section chiefs, town chiefs and other positions which were essentially male dominated. A total of 70 participants were trained including 65 women led organizations, women's groups and market women on conflict prevention, mitigation, and non-violence.

As a result of the project contributions, the women situation room was established, and 31 cases of electoral violence were recorded during and after the elections. This included mob destruction of women trader's market stalls. The aim of the situation room was to collect information on electoral violence and promote enabling environment for women's participation in politics. A newsletter on women's participation in politics was published.

The project through capacity building trainings reached 98 women parliamentarian candidates and 475 local council candidates across the six project districts. Out of 98 trained parliamentary candidates 16 are now Members of Parliament; and 68 of the trained council candidates are now councilors. All the trained parliamentary and council candidates developed their manifestos and campaign strategies successfully.

Sensitization activities were conducted in the six project districts disseminating peace messages through town hall meetings, radio discussions, and various social media platforms (TikTok, YouTube, Facebook, WhatsApp) before, and during the elections reaching approximately 139,300 people.

The intervention ensured adequate representation of youth, for instance, one of the youth participants in the leadership and manifesto development workshop was successfully elected becoming the second youngest elected female parliamentarian in the history of Sierra Leone.

The capacity building and training for the group will help ensure pool of knowledge and skills that can be broker for plans and programmes among the group. This institution strengthening arrangement will ensure joint ownership, leveraging of human technical and financial resources and help scale up intervention across national and subnational levels.
