In October, the post-TRRC project supported a National Assembly legislative reform bills retreat, and shared costs with another international partner. This led to the immediate passing of key TRRC legislation in the subsequent National Assembly extraordinary sessions. The Minister of Justice was supported by the post-TRRC Project in conducting a resource mobilization and sensitization visit to the PBC (New York), Washington, Brussels, and London. This visit aimed to garner support and raise awareness about the Transitional Justice process in The Gambia. Notably, key figures such as President Barrow and Chief Justice Jallow (CJ) actively participated in the subsequent National Stakeholders Conference. During this conference, the Ministry of Justice and the post-TRRC Project collaborated closely to ensure a successful outcome.

On May 12 and 13, 2023, a Stakeholder Conference and Donor Roundtable was held in Banjul to discuss the implementation of the TRRC recommendations. The conference brought together various stakeholders, including civil society, media, and private sector representatives. The conference featured panels that discussed the role of civil society, media, and the challenges and opportunities for implementing the TRRC recommendations. A partnership platform between the government, civil society, and the private sector was launched to promote collaboration among stakeholders and ensure a coordinated and effective implementation process.

The Stakeholder Conference held in The Gambia was a significant event that marked a positive step towards promoting accountability and human rights in the country. The conference provided a platform for victims and their families, to actively engage with stakeholders, ensuring that their voices were heard and taken into account during the implementation process. One of the key issues raised during the conference was the lack of communication, which was identified as a major problem.

The National Assembly Standing Committee held a Retreat from October 27-30 October,2023. This served to facilitate an extraordinary session for the consideration and passage of key legislative bills. The Retreat provided an opportunity for a thorough analysis, discussion, and understanding of each bill. This expedited the review process and prepared the National Assembly Members for the extraordinary sessions of the National Assembly. During sessions conducted so far, three crucial bills were successfully passed by the National Assembly but with amendments: The Victims Reparations Bill, The Ban from Public Office (TRRC) Bill and The Former Presidents Bill.

The Government is planning for an inaugural inter-ministerial Steering Committee which will be an important event for establishing a structure to oversee implementation and demarcating its efforts to encourage other line ministries to fulfil the Recommendations under their responsibility.

The Project has established 2 posts within the MoJ (individual consultants under LOA modality) which are under recruitment, but which will substantially boost Ministry of Justice capacity to move the TRRC Recommendations implementation forward when recruitment is completed.

The Project team has participated in quarterly technical meetings which bring together international actors implementing Post TRRC initiatives to share experiences and explore ways of collaborating without duplicating efforts

The Ministry of Justice has disseminated important developments pertaining to the status of TRRC recommendations implementation through a monthly newsletter shared with stakeholders.

The Project allocated sufficient resources for women's participation in the National Stakeholder Conference and consulted with women groups, and stakeholders on the design and implementation of the activity.

The Conference highlighted the importance of women's participation in transitional justice and broader governance reforms even when social norms and power structures, at times impact their level of engagement in such public spaces to discuss issues perceived to be contentious.

Moving forward, the Project will urge the government to implement National Stakeholder Conference recommendations pertaining to enhancing the participation of women in Post TRRC processes. This will ensure that calls for future Post TRRC processes are fully reflective of women's experiences and add momentum to appeals that women be considered for leadership roles in Post TRRC and broader governance processes and institutions.

Outcome 2: The Justice Sector demonstrates commitment and capacity to prosecute cases emanating from the TRRC Recommendations in line with international Human Rights Standards.

The project provided support for national consultations on the justice sector, including capacity-building measures to prosecute cases arising from TRRC recommendations. This enabled the Judiciary to demonstrate its commitment to enhancing its capacity to facilitate prosecutions. The Chief Justice actively participated in the National Stakeholder Conference on 12 May, where the Judiciary presented a proposal to donors for support in establishing a 'Special Criminal Division' consisting of three fully staffed courtrooms to try those accused of domestic crimes in The Gambia, pending the establishment of a hybrid international tribunal. The project provided an avenue for the Judiciary to showcase its commitment towards improving its capacity for prosecutions. Additionally, by facilitating coordination among justice sector partners, the project fostered collaboration and synergy within the system.
Justice Aisatou Jallow-Sey and Justice Veronic Wright had the opportunity to attend a five-day induction course for newly appointed Judicial Officers of the Superior courts in Abuja, Nigeria, courtesy of the post-TRRC project. The primary objective of this training program was to instill and nurture the values of judicial ethics, attitude, and sensitization to social issues among the participants. Additionally, the course aimed to develop and enhance their judicial skills. One of the key goals of the training was to improve the knowledge and understanding of the participants regarding procedures and substantive laws related to delivering timely and qualitative justice. Equipping the Judicial Officers with a comprehensive understanding of these aspects, it was expected that their performance in terms of case management, transparency, accountability, and the application of communication technology in the administration of justice would be significantly enhanced.

The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) organized a Regional Sensitization and Popularization initiative to raise awareness on the TRRC recommendations. This initiative took place in two regions and was attended by a total of 44 participants, including 16 females, 28 males, and 2 persons with disabilities. The aim of this event was to engage various stakeholders in the discussion and dissemination of the TRRC recommendations. The participants in this sensitization initiative were diverse and represented different sectors of society. To facilitate effective communication and ensure full participation, the facilitators conducted the discussions in the local languages spoken by the participants. This approach aimed to overcome language barriers and promote better understanding among all participants.
The Multi-Stakeholder Support Monitoring Committee on the Implementation of the White Paper on the TRRC Report established by the National Human Rights Commission, is actively involved in overseeing the implementation of the TRRC recommendations. The Committee conducted two meetings in the second and third quarter to discuss the progress made by its members in implementing the recommendations relevant to their respective institutions. These meetings have proven to be instrumental in tracking the implementation of the White Paper.
The NHRC engaged with National Assembly Members on human rights obligations of the Government to push for the implementation of the White Paper on the TRRC Report and Adoption of Human Rights Bills. At that event which took place from 15-16 September 2023, the NHRC facilitated modules to enhance parliamentarians' understanding of the Gambia's international human rights obligations in the context of on-going transitional justice and governance reforms.

In proving this kind of support, we have developed a deliberate approach to working with youth as they are central to the Gambia's transition from authoritarian rule to democratic governance. Enabling youth participation in governance processes is critical to creating a sense of citizenship and participation.
The Project supported the organisation of the Gambia's first Human Rights Festival at which youth and other marginalised groups advocated for the implementation of the Anti-Torture Act and commemorated International Day in Support of Victims of Torture.
Through this activity and other youth activities such as a training event for high school human rights teacher coordinators and building students' capacity on HIV and Human Rights issues, the Project took stock of the values and role that youth play by facilitating opportunities for them to engage directly with people to whom they would not otherwise have access.
