The project has been engaged with the government, through the ministries of the Interior, Social Communication and Justice for greater effectiveness of joint actions. All three ministries appointed a focal point which facilitate the implementation of activities, including the to support the strengthening of legal frameworks and mechanisms to guarantee freedom of expression, the right to information, the safety of journalists and the development of the media, with an emphasis on combating disinformation and misleading information. Meeting also was held with the Minister of Territorial Administration and Local Power, the State Secretariat for Planning and Regional Integration of Minister of Finance, to discuss issues on administrative decentralization. After several preparatory meetings, it was held on 05 and 06 April 2023, a "Djumbai" on local elections in Gabu region with the Governors, administrators, secretaries, and technicians of both institutions. A joint activity with the Government and the European Union, trough the initiative landa Guine Djuntu! Aiming to advocate with the partners and stakeholders, the necessity of establishing regional multi-stakeholders dialogue platforms, holding local elections, discussing topics on the priority policies on decentralization, the approved legal framework on administrative decentralization. It was also included the presentation of the platform called SIPP/NA NO MON, a joint initiative with landa Guine Djuntu- which is an information system integrating the sectorial plans and community projects, with the purpose of monitoring local development sectorial plans implementation .

All three of them, is related to the electoral process of June 04 legislative elections, including (i) WANEP, (ii) National Television of Guinea-Bissau (TVGB) and (iii) Movimento Nacional da Sociedade Civil para a Democracia, Paz e Desenvolvimento.

The purpose of three organization, as part of their social role, was not only to support the electoral processes, but also to participate actively in the sensitization, engage in an inclusive dialogue with different stakeholders, including political parties, traditional and religious leaders, citizens, women, and youth, leading to a peaceful, transparent, and fair electoral process at national level.

Additionally, a punctual support was given also to two Media organizations to monitor the electoral process, including compliance with the code of conduct, counter hate speech and incitement of violence in both traditional and social media and contribute to an environment conducive to peaceful elections.

The Project has contributed to increase the level of trust among political and social actors through strengthening coordination mechanisms within the UN and between national authorities, civil society organizations and international partners, including European Union and ECOWAS, by supporting the implementation of the Roadmap of June 04, legislative elections, produced in the "High Level Conference on the Prevention of Electoral Violence: Best Practices and Lessons Learned from West Africa" organized in December 2022, which aimed to an environment conducive for peaceful elections.

The conference resulted in an action plan where all stakeholders, trough the Monitoring Cell of Electoral Process, committed themselves to support free, fair, inclusive, and transparent legislative elections in Guinea-Bissau and firmly rejected the use of inflammatory language and divisive discourse.

Additionally, the Resident Coordinator Office (RCO) and the Ministry of territorial Administration, participated in the signature of code of conduct, a commitment of honor made by political parties and coalitions of political parties of society organization, gathered in the Monitoring cell of the electoral process for of June 04 legislative elections in May 12. RC Office developed a UN Strategy on Elections and created a UN Task Force for elections where UN interventions were aligned in support of the implementation of the recommendations of the Action Plan through the electoral cycle 2023-2025.

Furthermore, the UNDP Representative, the Head of EU delegation and representative of Monitor cell of electoral process, participated in the opening session of the Electoral Monitoring operations room of June 04 legislative elections of 2023.

The Project, in partnership with the Electoral Cycle project 2023-2025 and with the National electoral Commission (CNE), Technical Office for Supporting the Electoral Process (GTAPE), as well as the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, through the Secretary of State for Communities, as held a two-day post-electoral reflection of June 04 Legislative elections for Civil Society organization, trough the Monitoring Cell of the electoral process on July 27 and 28. The two days sessions was attended by a total of 36 people, including 16 women, with the aim of identifying and analyzing successes, gaps, lessons learned and drawing up recommendations. The main purpose is to analyze post-election stocktaking, as a useful tool not only for identifying strengths and weaknesses in the organization of the elections, but also in the organizational structure of the CNE/Regional Electoral Commissions (CREs) and in liaising with stakeholders. A National post-electoral reflection to systematize recommendations, of ten thematic areas of discussion held in all regions of the country, is in preparation and scheduled for December to be organized.

The project continued to support the Youth Political Parties Forum, which conclude the presentation the first phase of the preliminary results of the study on the political participation of youth. The next phase will be the launch of study and the roadmap to its implementation, including the institutionalization of the Forum as integrated space of dialogue, building consensus, and contributing to the consolidation of peace and sustainable development.

Additionally, a participatory diagnosis of the training and capacity-building needs of Guinea-Bissau's Party Youth, based on semi-structured interviews with leaders of these organizations, focus group meetings with project partners and a survey in which 44 representatives of the following Party Youth took part, with a total of 35 young people responding, corresponding 40% women and 60% Men, ages between 25 to 35: Juventude Africana Amílcar Cabral (JAAC), Juventude Partido de Renovação Social (JPRS), Juventude da Assembleia de Povo Unido - Partido Democrátic da Guiné-Bissau (JAPU-PDGB), Juventude União para a Mudança (JUM), and the Juventude Nacional do Partido Movimento para Alternância Democrática (JUADEM).

Furthermore, the Youth Political Parties and Youth Sounding Board (YSB), supported the two days activities on the Post- Electoral Reflection of 2023 Legislative Elections which took place on 25 and 26 of July with the same representation of women and men of Political Parties mentioned before as well.

Under this outcome, the project is working in collaboration with EU IANDA Guine Djuntu! project to organize a Citizen Convention. The Citizen Convention will be a civil society organization activity to discuss thematic recommendation report of the several documents produced on topics like Media, State reforms, Justice, Youth and Women, Decentralization and local development, Citizenship, Human rights and peace culture, Health, and Education.

The support given to the Civil Society Consultation Space (CSCS) has led to the establishment of the House of Rights in the regions. The House of Rights it's a Consortium supported financially by EU, engaged in promoting the respect of the human rights. The collaboration between these two structures, has contributed to foster the civil society participation in peace and security processes and monitoring of the government action in order to achieve greater impact and sustainability of the actions promoted by the project. Thus, the CSCS and the "Movimento Nacional da Sociedade Civil para a Paz e Democracia" continue to raise awareness of the Government intervention regarding the freedom of speech and the respect of human rights, more tolerance and less persecution, demanding peace, and stability in the country as priority, as well urge the state authority to act on several cases of restriction of freedom of expression and physical integrity of peoples.

An international Mediation Expert Consultant was hired to support the implementation of the CSO initiative on view of the ECOWAS early warning system on Conflict prevention in the consultative/participatory approach involving national and regional (ECOWAS) stakeholders, to propose a system to support CSOs (the CSO Consultation Space, the CSO Movement and other selected CSOs and NGOS), in developing synergies and ensure communication with other platforms and regional networks, with the aim of contributing to regional initiatives for conflict prevention, early waning and early action.

Furthermore, the new government led by the Coalition PAI Terra Ranka expressed in the new National People Assembly (ANP), has been working to set up a discussion on reforms, including the discussion and approval on November 13, to the first plenary session starting from November 14 till December 27.

There were approved fifteen points to be discussed and three of them is related to this outcome, highlighted as follows; (i) presentation, discussion and vote on the 2023 budget bill; (ii) presentation, discussion and vote on the Proposed Organic Law and the Court of Auditors Process; (iii) presentation, discussion and vote on the draft amendment to the law on the National Elections Commission (CNE).

Additionally, on August 8, the ANP approved the eventual commission for the revision of the Constitution, made up of 15 deputies distributed as follows; (i) PAI Terra Ranka-8 Member of Parliament (MP); (ii) MADEM G-15–4 MP; (iii) PRS-2 MP and (iv) PTG (Guinean Workers' Party)-1 MP

In partnership with the Electoral Cycle project 2023-2025, the project supported, through the Leadership Academy, a training session to 11 Parliamentarian Women group and decision-makers on Gender and inclusion on the electoral process, including leadership, elections, parity law and budget. More training session will be held for 30 Parliamentarian women group. It's expected that these Women will contribute in practice to a more inclusive and diverse space of for those marginalized groups, leaving no-one behind.

The project has contributed to facilitating the interaction and the building bridges between journalists and security forces through the capacity building sessions of security officers, in partnership with the Ministry of Interior on public policing and human rights (with a focus on freedom of expression and safety of journalists). Both target groups, journalist, and security forces, composed of 120 police officer, a few numbers of trade unionists and journalist, came together to reflect on ways for better coordination. The sessions allowed the Journalist to start an open and constructive exchange with security officers, in a context where previous attempts to initiate talks between the parties have been unsuccessful. The feedback from security officers was equally positive, with many recognizing the importance of journalism as well the complementarity of security and journalists' function in preventing social injustice, promoting peace, and tackling poor governance in a democratic society.

Additionally, the project engaged in the launching of an assessment of the media landscape to support policy favorable to media development and freedom of expression. This is carried out in partnership with the Ministry in charge of social communication, the media regulatory council, and media organizations. The assessment is based on UNESCO's Media Development Indicators (MDIs).

Furthermore, following successful advocacy for the elaboration of access to information law, the project is supporting the drafting of the law under the leadership of the Ministry of Justice. The Ministry is overseeing a multi-stakeholder commission tasked with elaborating the law after their members were trained on the right to information and mechanisms for its guarantee.

In all project activities, we ensured the mandatory inclusion of at least 30% women, each theme covered also included a gendered approach to the issue. Regarding the training on the right to information, the issue of gender and access to information was covered. With the assessment of the media landscape, a set of indicators dedicated to gender in the media is included. In the training of security forces on freedom of expression and maintaining public order, the 30% quota was met; we had 21 females out of 61 police officers trained.

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Political Parties Youth In the context of Bissau-Guinean political instability, the youth are often seen as key players in mobilizing voters for political parties and candidates, but these structures have been left aside during political dialogue.

In December of 2022, a workshop among the youth wings of Guinea-Bissau's major political parties was held for the groups to discuss conflict analysis, negotiation, mediation and dialogue. It's important to create a safe space, an environment where the youth can start doing politics differently. By doing so, they will create an agreed upon common agenda for country development, building a leadership that goes beyond decisive political parties by changing the narrative of a country mired in eternal instability.

During the meeting: 1. A total of 22 participants from all six political parties' **Youth Wings** represented at the Parliament attended the training. 2. The pedagogical approach used in the training, of hands-on, participative, experiential and activity-oriented sessions, intermixed with inputs from the consultant, proved to engage participants in open and frank debates in a relaxed learning environment. All group work mixed participants from different political parties, enabling for connections to be established, perhaps helping nurture better relationships between the individuals of different political affiliations, creating the space for dialogue to occur. 3. **Participants** conducted the structural analysis, dynamic analysis and actor mapping in mixed groups, revealing a strong capacity to work together and reach consensus across political party lines.

The dissolution of the Guinea-Bissau People National Assembly (ANP) on 16 May 2022, by a presidential degree, and the subsequent appointment of a Presidential Initiative government, necessitate holding of a legislative election withing 90 days according to the Guinea-Bissau Constitution. However, the government could not adhere to this Constitutional necessity. Initially the elections were scheduled to be held in December 2022, but delays in starting the voter registration process led to another postponement of the election, to commence on 04 June 2023. In this context, during the reported period, some project activities were rescheduled, and human resources were allocated primarily to the implementation of outcome 1: Effective and coordinated in country confidence-building measures, dialogue, and mediation interventions from ECOWAS, SRSG Good Office, Civil Society and other key international actors strengthen political stabilization in Guinea-Bissau. The development of a UN strategy on Election has paved the way for project staff to mobilize UN agencies implementing PBF projects, and CSOs to develop a Civil Society Roadmap to foster confidence building measures for election in Guinea-Bissau and to ensure the UN would align its peacebuilding activities in Guinea-Bissau and use its convening powers and advocacy efforts to enhance CSO's efforts to create an environment conducive to peaceful, transparent, and inclusive elections in Guinea-Bissau. In this regard, the project for support the electoral cycle (PACE) 2023-2025, signed between UNDP and the Government of Guinea-Bissau, includes activities to be implemented in complementarity with outcome 1and 3 of the projects, in particular support to mid-term activities of the CSO roadmap and strengthening of the media in the context of elections. Support from other PBF projects to create an environment conducive to peaceful elections included, activities aimed at preventing electoral violence, namely two (2) trainings to Public Prosecution Magistrates in Inspection of Electoral Results, and trainings on Elections and Security, in Bissau, Gabu, Buba and Sao Domingos, through the PBF CDTOC project, and awareness campaigns on peacebuilding, Human Right and governance, in Quinhamel, and Bissau, through the PBF Human Rights Project. These activities led to a successful holding of June 04 Legislative election win by PAI Terra Ranka Coalition.
