The Secretariat continued to engage the Government at both strategic and technical levels to ensure effective coordination and management of the fund. For example, at the strategic level, the project engaged senior government officials including ministers and directors of entities prior to and throughout the reporting period, the Secretariat remained actively engaged with the Government at both strategic and technical levels, aiming to ensure the effective coordination and management of the fund. An important aspect of this engagement was the convening of the Joint Steering Committee Meeting, which took place on September 14, 2023, under the auspices of the PBF Secretariat.

This meeting was significant and served as a platform for accountability, collaboration and decision-making. It was co-chaired by the UN Resident Coordinator and the Deputy Minister of Internal Affairs, and it attracted the participation of representatives from various stakeholders, including UN Agencies, Civil Society Organizations (CSOs), and relevant Government Ministries, Agencies, and Commissions.

During the meeting, comprehensive updates were provided regarding the status of the various projects funded by the PBF in Liberia. The participants engaged in meaningful discussions, addressing challenges encountered and sharing valuable lessons learned from their experiences. Importantly, the gathering collectively determined actionable steps and strategies to effectively address the identified issues, further strengthening the collaborative efforts in advancing peacebuilding initiatives in Liberia.

The Secretariat continues to provide technical support to agencies in the development of work and M&E plans as well as concept notes approved by PBSO leading to the development of projects. The Secretariat initiated discussion with the government peacebuilding office to undertake a comprehensive data collection, supporting SCORE Wave 4. PBF also provided support to previous SCORE research, which results are often used by government and donors to inform their respective conflict analyses.

The PBF Secretariat continued to ensure effective coordination, monitoring, and evaluation to achieve substantial results and sustain investment growth that promotes governance, peace, reconciliation and security.. During the period under review, the Secretariat engaged with donor partners in facilitating two informal donor coordination meetings in collaboration with the Swedish Embassy in Monrovia.

These meetings served as a platform for sharing crucial data regarding progress, lessons learned, and emerging challenges in the field of peacebuilding. Information was exchanged regarding interventions supported by PBF, USAID, Ireland, and Sweden, particularly in light of Liberia's general elections held in October and runoff in November. The exchange of information helped update donor countries and enhance synergies at both strategic and programmatic levels, thereby mitigating the potential for overlapping or duplicative support.

The Secretariat attended and provided updates in the United Nations Country Team monthly meetings on PBF Portfolio, including its Strategic Results Framework priorities. These updates the influence of various factors has led to improved outcomes and increased engagement of agencies in the development and timely submission of project documents for the PBF Strategic Results Framework. The active involvement of the secretariat in strategic meetings has also played a crucial role in reducing the risk of implementation delays and enhancing portfolio visibility. Agency heads consistently monitor their respective focal points to ensure the completion of critical success factors required to achieve targeted results.

Furthermore, collaboration with INGOs and UN agencies has been established to facilitate the submission of semiannual PBF reports by the deadline of November 15th. These reports undergo a thorough review by the Secretariat
to maintain quality assurance before they are uploaded to the gateway. These reports primarily emphasize the highlevel results of projects that have been in implementation for over a year, contributing to the SG's peacebuilding
report on Liberia. Moreover, the secretariat has initiated development a of cross-border regional project in close
coordination with the PBF focal point in Sierra Leone and the project teams of both countries. Coordination
meetings between Liberia and Sierra Leone have resulted in the development of a joint proposal for a Cross-Border
Project. This proposed project will be jointly implemented by IOM and WFP in Liberia and Sierra Leone.
As part of this collaborative effort, a two-day workshop was conducted, bringing together participants from the
government, Civil Society Organizations (CSOs), and UN agencies from Sierra Leone and Liberia. This workshop
aimed to develop a comprehensive proposal for the project and foster cooperation among stakeholders.

The primary objective of this activity was to guarantee the active involvement of various actors and stakeholders in the 2023 elections process, with a particular focus on the National Election Commission. The overarching goal was to foster an environment conducive to the conduct of free, fair, and credible elections in Liberia.

By facilitating and supporting this effort, the PBF Secretariat aimed to contribute to the promotion of democratic principles and good governance in Liberia. It recognized the significance of free and fair elections in ensuring political stability, social cohesion, and sustainable peace in the country. Therefore, the PBF Secretariat played a pivotal role in fostering collaboration among diverse entities involved in the electoral process, ultimately working towards the common goal of upholding the integrity of the democratic process in Liberia.
