At the UNDAF steering committee meeting held on 8 May 2023, The PBF secretariat interacted with various government officials including the Secretary-General. The ToR for establishing the PBF Joint Steering Committee was endorsed during the meeting.

Deputy Director of PBSO's Visit to The Gambia:

The PBF Secretariat hosted the Deputy Director of PBSO, Awa Dabbo, from 12-15 May 2023. The PBF Secretariat facilitated Awa's interaction with various government officials including the Minister of Justice and the National Human Rights Commission Chairperson.

During the PBSO support mission to the Gambia from 11th to 19th April, the secretariat organised a series of consultation meetings with government and CSO partners on the new SSR project attended by the Deputy Chief of Defence Staff (CDS) of the Gambia Arm Forces. Before the mission, a consultation meeting on the new climate security project was attended by high level officials including the Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Local Government and Lands.

On 21st August, 2023, the first inaugural meeting of the Joint-Steering Committee took place at the OIC Conference Center. The meeting commenced with opening remarks from the co-chairs, the Secretary-General - Head of the Civil Service, and the United Nations Resident Coordinator ai. Both co-chairs highlighted the importance of the JSC's role in promoting peacebuilding initiatives in The Gambia.

On the 21st and 22nd of August 2023, the PBF Secretariat organized a broad-based consultation on the Gambia's reeligibility process, how to approach the re-eligibility, what needs to be done and identifying strategic priority areas for further PBF investment in the Gambia, with the Government, CSOs, Private Sector, UN, and NGOs.

The PBF Secretariat has been having frequent meetings with the Ministry of Public Service specifically, the Department of Strategic Planning and Delivery on the re-eligibility process and how it's progressing.

From 14th – 16th November 2023, the PBF Secretariat and the PDA team organized a broad-based consultation to identify key conflict drivers in the Gambia, and small focussed group discussions with the Government, CSOs, Private Sector, UN, and NGOs, on key thematic areas to support the government to develop a compelling reeligibility application for the next five years.

On 31st August 2023, the PBF Secretariat and the PDA team collaborated with the Office of National Security to organize a broad-based consultation with key ministries and stakeholders on Security Sector Reform in the Gambia.

Staff Recruitment:

At the beginning of the project in January 2023, the PBF Secretariat had a coordinator and an M&E Officer. An Administrative and Finance associate was recruited in January 2023 and later resigned in April 2023. A new recruitment process was initiated to fill the position of Administrative and finance associate, but all the recommended candidates declined the offer. The PBF programme coordinator also resigned, in April 2023. A new recruitment process was initiated to identify a new PBF Secretariat Coordinator. The PBF Secretariat currently has a new coordinator who started in July with an IPSA contract modality as compared to a NOC modality.

The PBF secretariat has enhanced collaboration and coordination among stakeholders of the peacebuilding programme in the Gambia and ensured that no stakeholder is left behind. This has been achieved through intensified consultative processes towards planning, designing, implementation and monitoring of the peacebuilding programming in the Gambia. For the period under review (January to date) the secretariat successfully organised about ten consultative processes on the identification of priority areas, and planning and designing of new PBF projects, by bringing together key relevant stakeholders from the UN, Government, Civil Society, development partners and beneficiaries. Through this call and action of the secretariat, for a more inclusive process, the UN agencies in the Gambia are today more open to joint programming and inclusion of relevant stakeholders from central government, CSO partners and potential beneficiaries in the processes, which is key to achieving adequate and sustainable impact.

Strengthened portfolio-level support and multi-stakeholder cooperation: The Peacebuilding Secretariat in The Gambia is actively working towards strengthening portfolio-level support and promoting multi-stakeholder cooperation in the country. By adopting a holistic approach, the Secretariat is fostering collaboration among diverse stakeholders, including government agencies, civil society organizations, local communities, and international partners. Through regular consultations, joint planning, and coordination mechanisms, the Secretariat has facilitated the alignment of peacebuilding initiatives and interventions. This collaborative approach not only enhances the effectiveness and impact of peacebuilding efforts but also ensured that interventions are responsive to the needs and priorities of the Gambian people.

Sustained coordination and M&E: The PBF Secretariat supported a field visit to monitor ongoing and concluded PBF-funded projects and other joint interventions in several regions in The Gambia with the Resident Coordinator and several other UN Agencies Country Representatives from June 5th – 8th 2023. The Secretariat has recently (31st Oct 2023) facilitated the participation of members of the PBF JSC at the Tabanding Border Post launching supported through the cross border project of Gambia and Senegal.

On 12 - 13 April 2023, the PBF Secretariat organised a two-day consultation with the government, UN Agencies and CSOs to fine-tune the design of a new PBF-supported project on climate- and land-related conflict in The Gambia. This built upon an initial one-day consultation on March 30 with a broad range of actors to investigate who was doing what in this space and to identify promising entry points for the new project.

On 21st August, 2023, the first inaugural meeting of the Joint-Steering Committee took place at the OIC Conference center. The meeting commenced with opening remarks from the co-chairs, the Secretary-General - Head of the Civil Service, and the United Nations Resident Coordinator ai. Both co-chairs highlighted the importance of the JSC's role in promoting peacebuilding initiatives in The Gambia. On 21st and 22nd of August 2023, the PBF Secretariat organized a broad-based consultation on the Gambia's re-eligibility process, how to approach the re-eligibility, what needs to be done and identifying strategic priority areas for further PBF investment in the Gambia, with the Government, CSOs, Private Sector, UN, and NGOs.

On May 2nd, 2023, the PBF Secretariat held a consultation with interested UN Agencies on the 2023 Youth Promotion Initiative (YPI) call for proposals to explain the application modalities. The following 5 agencies attended: IOM, ITC, UNDP, UNFPA, and UNICEF. On May 9, the Peacebuilding Team which includes the PBF Secretariat, together with the Youth and Gender Officer at the RCO organized a consultation with Civil Society Organizations (CSOs), and UN Agencies that expressed interest in the Youth Promotion Initiative (YPI) call for proposal from PBF. The focus was on understanding the challenges faced by young people, especially women, and girls in engaging in political processes and identifying strategies to enhance their involvement and widening the civic space for young people in The Gambia. The following stakeholders participated in the consultation: UN Agencies: UNDP, UNFPA, UNICEF, ITC, IOM, UNAIDS. Civil Society Organizations: Catch them Young; FAWEGAM; NYC; NCCE; NYP; Safe Home for Migrants Association; Activista; CPD; GAMCOTRAP; Yakarr Justice; Peace Hub the Gambia; Gambia Participates; Girls' Talk.

The PBF secretariat has initiated a discussion with the UN Communication Group on the possibility to collaborate and improve the visibility of the PBF intervention in the Gambia, to showcase the impact and to attract potential support from other development partners to build on the achievements registered. The UN Communication Group (UNCG) was crucial in the recently concluded field visit undertaken by the UN Resident coordinator by way of sharing social media posts and recording multiple videos.
