The meeting took place on September 14, 2023, in the Kofi Anna Conference Room on the 3rd Floor of the One UN House. The meeting brought together representatives from the Government of Liberia, UN Agencies, CSO donor partners. It was jointly chaired by the UN Resident Coordinator and the Deputy Minister of Internal Affairs and attended by representatives from UN agencies implementing PBF funded projects in the country. The meeting provided the platform to provide updates and lessons learnt and to discuss challenges and recommendations.

Please provide a brief description of any engagement that the project has had with the government over the last 6 months. Please indicate what level of government the project has been engaging with.

Over the last six months, the project had several major engagements with government and through relevant government line Ministries, Agencies and Commissions. In March 2023, the project engaged the Ministry of Internal Affairs, the Independent National Commission on Human Rights, National Elections Commission, the University of Liberia to host a national symposium on peace, reconciliation and social cohesion aimed at maintaining peace in the country as Liberia goes to the polls in October 2023. The three-day symposium brought together over 100 participants from the different stakeholders mentioned above and resulted in the signing of a pledge by four university campus based leaders, seven leaders of political parties' youth wings, eight national youth leaders, and the media committing and reaffirming the use of responsible social media platforms, promoting social cohesion and sustaining the peace through nurturing a peaceful environment ahead of the October 10, 2023 general presidential and legislative elections.

The project also engaged with the Peacebuilding Office, the National Elections Commission, the Liberia Immigration Services, and the Liberia National Police to train different stakeholders including security personnel, youth and women groups, media practitioners, among others on peace and security, conflict resolution, elections monitoring and reporting, early warning and early response (EWER), among others to maintain and promote peace, social cohesion and reconciliation in the country, especially so before, during and after the October 10, 2023 presidential and legislative elections.

The project has completed all key preliminary/preparatory activities including the contracting of partners, the recruitment of staff, the collection of baseline data and the identification of beneficiaries. UNDP had contracted Naymote Partners for Democratic Development (Naymote), Platform for Dialogue and Peace (P4DP), Liberia Initiative for Empowerment (LIFE) and Center for Humanitarian Dialogue (HD). The Center for Humanitarian Dialogue further subcontracted the Inter-religious Council of Liberia (IRCL) and the Organization for Women Empowerment (OWE). These partners conducted dialogues at national and community levels on peace, reconciliation, and social cohesion; regional level dialogues on the county peace and reconciliation plans and the strategic reconciliation roadmap. These CSOs have assessed and identified in collaboration with the communities locally driven initiatives to foster peace, social cohesion, and reconciliation in the communities. Currently, the CSOs have provided social and livelihood grants to women and youth groups that are engaged in business and agricultural activities, leading to increased peace and social cohesion among members and within the community.

Further, FAO signed a partnership agreement with Peace Dividend Initiative (PDI). FAO and PDI are supporting women led organizations to promote entrepreneurship for peace, social cohesion and reconciliation through incubation and growth of business ideas and plans. FAO is also providing women with loan opportunities through the Village Saving and Loan Association scheme (VSLA) to promote social cohesion and peace.

The project has also completed a baseline and perception survey. The report has been finalized and used to complete the setting of baselines and targets for the project.

The project has made significant progress towards community dialogues informing regional and national reconciliation framework and directing local reconciliation initiatives in Liberia, especially in counties where the project is implemented. Following the launch and initiation of the project, the project embarked on robust community and national dialogues aimed at discussing and sharing idea and reflection on peace, reconciliation, and social cohesion. Outcomes of these dialogues have informed national reconciliation frameworks and directed local reconciliation initiatives. Key among the national reconciliation frameworks informed by the dialogues is the development of Options Paper on Reconciliation, the signing of a peace pledge and the development of the draft National Policy on Reconciliation. The Options Paper on Reconciliation which seeks to advance national reconciliation by proffering recommendations to take concrete steps to reconcile victims and perpetrators of the Liberian civil conflicts and other human rights abuses, was finalized in 2023, submitted to the Office of the President and shared with the National Legislature to get their commitment to the implementation of the recommendations contained in the document. Information contained in the Options Paper will also inform the National Policy on Reconciliation, which will serve as a basis for implementing activities to reconcile victims and perpetrators of abuse. The National Reconciliation Policy is in its development stage. The Peacebuilding Office is leading this process and has completed regional dialogues and stock taking of the Opportunity Mapping to inform and guide its development. A Peace Pledge was also developed and signed by youth institutions, the media and student organizations by which they affirmed their commitment to maintaining peace in the country, especially before, during and after the October 10, 2023, presidential and legislative elections and the runoff. To strengthen the implementation and monitoring of the Peace Pledge, the project collaborated with the National Elections Commission to train relevant actors on responsible use of social media platforms, which is often used to foment violence and tension. Participants were trained on how to check, track and fact check information on social media platforms so as to avoid or minimize the spread of misinformation and disinformation on social media.

The project has actively engaged both men and women at every stage of its implementation, at both the national and community levels. Men, women and youth are given opportunities to participate in and benefit from project interventions, with more emphasis place on the participation of women and youth. Every time the project conducted an activity, the project team would make sure those that will participate are inclusive of men, women and youth. As such, the project ensured that participants for training and dialogues included men, women, youth and persons with disability. At some points, deliberate efforts were made to empower women and youth to enhance their capacity to fully participate in peacebuilding efforts and initiatives. For instance, in March 2023, the project held a national symposium that targeted mainly youth to discuss ways they can contribute to maintain the peace especially during the upcoming October 10, 2023, presidential and legislative elections in the country https://drive.google.com/file/d/1wTa9pBebNwCVaMxF4_6qasTWtvKxoiTW/view?usp=sharing. As noted earlier, this symposium achieved the signing of a Peace Pledge committing young people to maintain the peace in the wake of the ensuing general presidential and legislative elections in October 2023.

Further, women and youth groups were deliberately targeted for training and social-economic support to amplify their voices in driving efforts and informing local reconciliations, social cohesion, and peace initiatives. A total of 33 youth and women groups were established and/or strengthened and provided training on peace education, social cohesion, reconciliation, and non-violence approach to dispute resolution. Out of the 33 groups, 20 were provided social-economic grants as a means to bring together women and youth from different socio-cultural backgrounds to interact with one another, discuss issues of peace, social cohesion and reconciliation and take collective actions to promote social cohesion, reconciliation, and peace. These women and youth are also using the skills and knowledge acquired to conduct dialogues on peace and resolve disputes, thereby making their contribution to peacebuilding efforts in their communities. The provision of loans/grants to women and youth, leading their economic empowerment addresses some of the structural constraints women and youth face in the Liberian society.

The project has made decent progress towards promoting local and regional projects for reconciliation and social cohesion. The project has engaged 58 conflict prone communities in the six project counties through dialogues to collectively assess and identify initiatives that would help to promote social cohesion and reconciliation and solidify peace in their communities. The project is supporting these communities to implement identified initiatives to foster peace, reconciliation, and social cohesion in their communities. The project has provided social-economic and livelihood grants and loans to 20 women and youth groups that are currently engaged in small businesses and group farming. The groups are not only using these initiatives to earn income but also to promote social cohesion, unity, reconciliation, and peace.

Training for selected beneficiaries for the VSLA has started in 20 communities in Lofa, Grand Gedeh, Nimba and Sinoe. Training for beneficiaries in Rivercess and Montserrado will commence following the completion of beneficiaries' selection in these locations. The training, in line with global standards for the implementation of VSLA, will last for 14 weeks. Once the training is concluded, the VSLA grants will be awarded to the certified beneficiaries to commence the VSLA program.

Following the selection of the women led business in Lofa (Komassa Vornamnbeh) and the signing of contractual agreements with the Liberia Cocoa Cooperation (LCC) and Amplio to provide training and other technical support to the group to upscale its business, the project conducted two specialized trainings for the group aimed in organic cocoa production. The production of the organic chocolate (the Peace Chocolate Bar) by the group is in its final stage of testing with sample chocolate bars produced for quality assurance. The second women-led business (Rural Women and Girls' Promoters) engaged in cassava cultivation has also been selected in Nimba and contractual agreement with Liberia Business Incubator (LBI) to support the incubation and upscaling of the business is being finalized. The assessment to select the third women-led business is ongoing and is expected to be concluded by the end of the year.

The project has enabled some catalytic effects to promote peace, social cohesion and reconciliation. The provision of grants to vulnerable women and youth that are susceptible to abuse and prone to being used as agents to stir violence has strengthened the capacity of these women and youth to maintain peace in the larger communities and to contribute to the long-term stability of Liberia. The peace dividends grants are being used not just as a means to unify and reconcile the people but to divert the attention and minimize the possibility of youth being used to instil violence, thereby maintaining, and promoting the peace. It also reduces the susceptibility of women to violence by allowing them to earn income and contribute to the wellbeing of the family, thereby promoting peace and unity in the home. This also reduces the vulnerability of women to violence as they can afford to provide for themselves and avert abuse.

The project has, as part of its design and implementation strategy, an explicit sustainability plan. The sustainability plan includes working with local authorities and community members to design and implement locally driven projects that are expected to outlive the life span of the project. The project identified and organized women and youth into groups and provided them with technical and financial support, which has enabled them to collectively work together to promote social cohesion, reconciliation, and peace. They are using the grants and the knowledge and skills gained to engage in livelihood and income generating activities, as well as to create awareness on peace, social cohesion and reconciliation. Given that these groups are within their communities and have acquired needed skills, knowledge and finances to engage in meaningful activities like business, it is very likely that they will continue to exist even after the project is closed. This will contribute to sustaining the impacts of key interventions of the project.
