Given the outbreak of the conflict on the 15th of April this year, UNHCR and UNDP have had to put all activities on hold due to the prevailing security environment and UN security and program criticality restrictions. As such, there have not been any government stakeholder engagements in West or Central Darfur specific to this program, considering both locations have been hotspots for conflict. Nonetheless, UNHCR and UNDP have both been engaged through the West Darfur Inter-Sectoral Coordination Group (ISCG) which brings together humanitarian cluster representatives in a coordination forum and Area-Humanitarian Country Team (A-HCT), which is the main leadership group at state level consisting of UN agencies and (I)NGOs, in their capacities as individual agencies and cluster leaders. These bodies engage regularly with government counterparts, including the Wali's office, SAF, RSF and native administration representatives, on behalf of all their members.

UNDP did conduct two consultations in September 2023 with key stakeholders from the Ministry of Agriculture and the Agricultural Research Station in El Fasher, North Darfur. The main objective of these consultations were to discuss the challenges and opportunities for potentially reprogramming the remaining project activities away from West and Central Darfur into North Darfur. The consultations led to a focus on supporting the winter season agricultural production through the distribution of improved seeds for various vegetables, targeting male and female youth. Through the distributions, government representatives posited that there would be reduced possibility for renewed conflict over scarce resources and livelihoods, and an overall strengthening of social cohesion between farmers and pastoralists in the area.

The project has been well under way since the previous reporting period, with all of the preparatory activities completed with the exception of the baseline report which experienced considerable challenges outlined later in the report.

UNDP conducted trainings on peacebuilding and digital content creation for a cohort of youth peace ambassadors in Q3 of 2022, improving their skills and knowledge, allowing them to support the design and distribution of Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials on peace and conflict and social cohesion in early 2023. The youth also commenced the cascading of peacebuilding trainings to other youth at their respective community levels. UNHCR, since the last reporting period has supported youth across West and Central Darfur to lead their own community dialogues and implement micro-projects, while also developing and implementing a women's leadership curriculum and training course. Both agencies have continued to support youth interns and have advocated with government counterparts for the inclusion of youth in civic structures and public policy.

Unfortunately, due to the outbreak of conflict across Sudan on April 15, further implementation was put on hold. The suspension of project activities has necessitated the application for a no-cost extension, which remains pending for submission and approval. Both agencies have agreed the operational environment in which the original project was drafted has become untenable. While UNHCR has completed most of the substantive activities and will not carry out anything further under the project, UNDP is seeking to shift their remaining funds to a complementary activity in North Darfur.

The conflict that has broken out across Sudan has been particularly severe in the project locations and disrupted many of the main objectives of the project. The project initially aimed to support youth access to civic spaces and promote their inclusion into peacebuilding processes at all levels through strategic communications, digital engagement and experiential learning. While a large portion of the activities were undertaken by UNHCR and UNDP in the months prior to the advent of the conflict, the violence has significantly complicated impact measurements and undermined results. Despite this, two key observations are salient that may have had longer term impacts had the project been able to be completed.

During advocacy engagements under outcome 3 of the project, UNHCR and UNDP were able to establish good relations with the office of the West Darfur Wali, in particular, the newly established Supreme Council for Peace. This allowed for pointed advocacy on behalf of youth civil society for their inclusion into ongoing peace efforts lead by the government, as well as decision making structures. This led to initial commitments to include 5 youth peace ambassadors into a peacebuilding steering committee, and an indication from the Council and the Humanitarian Aid Commission that they were developing a youth engagement strategy modelled on elements of the project. This demonstrates the attention the project was receiving amongst community and government. It also demonstrates that there was initial progress being made toward an institutional shift on youth engagement.

Another indication of initial success of the program that emerged prior to the conflict is the activeness of youth civil society groups. The project was able to work with 18 different youth groups that ranged from NNGO's, civil society organisations, youth groups and associations, theatre troupes etc. The variety of organisations across both states demonstrate the project was well targeted to support an active and, at the time, expanding civil society. Attempts were made, after the conflict, to link youth CSOs to other humanitarian, development and peacebuilding structures. Over the past months, positive signals of the resilience of some CSOs have emerged, with at least six approaching UNHCR and UNDP and requesting funds for implementing programs to support with humanitarian response in Darfur and Chad. Requests have been made to support psychosocial support programming, financing for female micro-businesses, & the distribution of humanitarian supplies. This could represent a slight societal shift in the way that some youth perceive their abilities and role in supporting their communities. Unfortunately, there are many variables that will affect the longevity of these impacts, including the availability of financial support, the ongoing conflict, changes in government or the institutional landscape, increased structural restraints or the overall restrinking of civic spaces.

The project selected 180 youth peace ambassadors, comprising 90 females and 90 males, to receive training in peacebuilding and digital content creation. They actively contributed to enhancing social cohesion and peacebuilding in various communities and have also cascaded trainings on peacebuilding and conflict resolution at the community level. In El Geneina and Zalingei, 640 youths (340 females, 300 males) from IDP, host, and nomadic communities received training, including religious leaders and proactive youth. Additionally, 1,500 individuals (900 males, 600 females) were reached through the dissemination of Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials, like leaflets and installation of signboards promoting peacebuilding messages. These signboards, featuring messages from the Holy Quran advocating unity, peace, social cohesion, and solidarity, were placed at water points, markets, and public areas. Furthermore, religious leaders incorporated the leaflet messages during Gumma prayers and market days, conducting brief awareness sessions on social cohesion and peacebuilding.

The same UNDP and UNHCR-supported peace ambassadors maintained discussions and disseminated peacebuilding and social cohesion messages via WhatsApp and Facebook. During the reporting period, 76 messages (out of 126 total) disseminated amongst the channels were identified by the ambassadors who moderate the conversations as strong peacebuilding messages.

In January 2023, armed conflict broke out in Zalingei's Alhamedia IDP camp between IDPs and nomads, resulting in the deaths of 9 IDPs and the burning of the camp market (Murain market). The youth ambassadors, with full financial backing from UNDP and in close coordination with the Sport and Youth Directorate, organized a two-day peacebuilding event in February 2023 in Zalingei town. The event featured traditional songs and sports matches between various groups, encouraging participation from IDPs, host communities, and nomads. Around 2,000 individuals, including an estimated 1,200 females from IDPs, nomads, and host communities, gathered in Wadi Aribo yard in Zalingei town for the two-day celebration. Throughout the event, key peacebuilding messages advocating unity, peace, and social cohesion were conveyed by the government representatives, UNDP, Youth Ambassadors, and Zalingei's Shartai (Head of native administration).

This initiative resulted in the inclusion of 50% young women among the core 180 peace ambassadors cohort. Moreover, out of the 1,500 household members who received the IEC materials, 600 were women, accounting for 40% of the recipients. Additionally, 340 women (out of 640 total) at the community level were reached through the dissemination of peacebuilding trainings conducted by the peace ambassadors. Notably, these training sessions were facilitated by pairs of peace ambassadors, one male and one female, ensuring equal

representation.

UNHCR, in collaboration with implementing partners TGH and HOPE, have expanded the program's overall engagement with youth and civil society in West and Central Darfur. The same Youth Peace Ambassador cohort that received capacity development under outcome 1, as well as existing youth civil society organisations, have been supported to host 18 youth-led community dialogues, addressing a range of issues and conflict drivers, such as displacement, gender, access to justice, education, employment and crime. The invitees to the dialogues were left to the male and female youth organisers and dialogue hosts, who often invited key community members, native administration, government officials, religious scholars and other youth. These dialogues served as a consultative forum for the formulation of ideas by youth for them to propose micro-project concepts for implementation. 18 different youth organisations, associations and groups participated in the implementation of 23 out of the targeted 28 microprojects. These included activities such as football tournaments; a marathon; film screenings; IEC campaigns on trauma, hate speech, gender-based violence and social cohesion; musical and cultural events; interactive theatre sessions; workshops and trainings. These microprojects, while having a slightly higher than expected implementation and partner costs- which partially explains the underperformance of the target, along with the outbreak of the conflict - contributed greatly to the overall visibility of youth as key changemakers within their communities. It also demonstrated the potential contribution that youth could have on their respective communities. While the exact number of participants is hard to determine as many were public events, our implementing partner TGH estimated that approximately 48,000 (25,000 F and 23,000 M) have been reached through the microprojects in West Darfur.

In addition to this, a women's leadership curriculum was developed through a national consultancy. The curriculum was based on consultations with female youth peace ambassadors on the challenges they face in accessing meaningful participation in civil society and decision-making structures, and their preferences for inclusion of topics in the training. 2 complete sessions of the 2-day training were held in Zalingei, El Geneina, with the final planned one in Kerenik interrupted by the outbreak of the conflict.

Gender equality has been targeted throughout the implementation of the dialogues and microprojects in multiple different ways. For the dialogues, youth participants were extensively sensitized to the aims of the activity, which sought to bring together conflicting and diverse ideas and profiles in order to achieve a constructive conversation on key conflict drivers and peacebuilding related issues. As such, many were co-facilitated by both male and female youth organizers and it the invitees were always considered in terms of age, gender and diversity characteristics. This also allowed for gender-based topics to be broached in a more balanced manner, such as gender-based violence and gender roles and their impact on communities. While the original project intention was to provide 50% of grants to young women, the lack of female-led youth civil society organisations in the states meant that it was not feasible. Instead, in both West and Central Darfur recipients of the funds were encouraged to ensure joint leadership of microprojects implementation by both male and female youth, or to address the objective of the microprojects toward gender equality or women's empowerment goals, such as directly addressing GBV awareness. Interestingly, it was observed that most youth-led CSOs and the different youth peace ambassador groups that received funds represented mixed gender teams to organise events.

The women's leadership curriculum and subsequent delivery of 8 training sessions across 2 days sought to directly support GEWE outcomes for the project. The trainings directly contributed toward developing the skills and confidence of women to take greater leadership roles in civil society, and be able to better assert themselves in decision making.

In the reporting period there has been limited progress under outcome 3, largely due to the outbreak of the conflict. Nonetheless, UNHCR and UNDP sought to engage with a range of government stakeholders to support youth inclusion into decision making structures and had some limited success early in the year. Joint meetings were held with the Supreme Council for Peace in West Darfur to discuss how the government could support youth inclusion into public policy spaces. The newly formed body committed to the inclusion of 5 youth members of the Youth Peace Ambassador cohort into its steering committee and to include them in a project approval committee. They also expressed their gratitude for the work of the program and, jointly with HAC, highlighted that they were developing a governmental strategy to support youth at state level which was modelled on key aspects of the YPI project. Similarly in Central Darfur, engagement with the Nomad Commissioner resulted in commitments to include 4 youth (2 male and 2 female) in activities of the commission to support better and more representative decision making. Due to the outbreak of the conflict, these commitments were unable to be followed through.

With regard to other deliverables under outcome 3, powerholder profiling, which sought to identify key government officials, community leaders and institutions that were able and willing to facilitate youth participation in decision making fora was started but was not completed. It was subsequently discontinued due to the significantly changed situation. 28 interns were placed in UN, (I)NGO and civil society organisations to support peacebuilding related projects and build the skills of youth. The internships commenced in 2022 were in place for 6 months, while those that started in early 2023 were in place at least 3 months until the outbreak of the conflict. All other activities remain on hold and are underperformed due to the inability of UNHCR, UNDP, and implementing partners to engage with government and power holding interlocutors. Additionally, there is a high likelihood that the powerbrokers in both Central and West Darfur will continue to shift over the coming months compared to when the project was conceived.

While advocating for the inclusion of youth and youth engagement into public policy, gender considerations were always centred as key tenets. Placements into institutional structures were planned to be gender equal as a way to ensure that issues related to gender and women's empowerment would be considered in decision making at all levels. Similarly, leveraging activities such as the women's leadership trainings under outcome 1, the internship activity also represented a gender balance, with 50% of the positions going to female youth. Unfortunately, overall progress on these activities has been limited.

While the entire output centred around youth inclusion and responsiveness of government and other powerholding institutional stakeholders, UNHCR and UNDP sought to continually mainstream and reiterate the importance of youth inclusion in all other related advocacy and formal meetings. This was particularly done through the Durable Solutions Working Group – a coordination body consisting of government representatives, UN agencies and (I)NGOs in which discussions were had on facilitating solutions across the humanitarian, peacebuilding and development nexus, for those affected by displacement – where youth related issues form significant barriers to achieving solutions in both states, and thus were held as key components for states to address.

This was done with the intent to further empower female youth as agents of change within their communities by giving them a greater range of skills, and a boost of confidence to take up emerging civic spaces, allowing them to further their own agendas.

These include the provision of basic services, education, employment, and addressing displacement issues, among various other deficiencies. The struggle to manage these competing priorities and limited budgets, compounded by intricate political dynamics in regions marked by persistent intercommunal violence and a history of conflict, often leads to the neglect of youth-related concerns. This neglect extends to aspects such as youth participation in civic spaces, public policy, and decision-making processes, which are not accorded high priority in these challenging environments.	Through sustained engagement by participating UN agencies, NGO implementing partners and by youth themselves, there appears to be a significant shift in the importance placed on youth related issues by the government. This was inextricably tied to their increased focus on peacebuilding and the search for durable solutions across the two states. Youth populations in Darfur make them hard to ignore as a constituency, and there is increasing pressure on political representatives through emerging technologies such as social media. Through sustained aligned rhetoric on the importance of grassroots and widespread inclusion in peacebuilding processes, the government structures and institutions began to reflect and be more open to youth inclusion and their related issues.

The endline survey and final evaluation of the project are no longer on track due to the outbreak of the conflict across Sudan on the 15th of April. The situation in West and Central Darfur has become untenable for the finalization of project activities as well as for the conduct of any further data collection or evaluation activities. The project team have extensively deliberated internally and with the PBF Secretariat in Sudan on the feasibility of further monitoring activities and have proposed in the NCE request that the evaluation be waived and removed for the following reasons:

- Conflict sensitivity would be a major issue
- Communities and project participants have been displaced and/or would potentially represent a significantly changed demographic.
- Perceptions and attitudes of potential respondents and even project participants will be significantly influenced and skewed by recent atrocities and severe conflict.
- The security situation is likely to continue to be untenable and UN program criticality restrictions persist.
- Remote evaluation and monitoring were considered but considering that project activities were only partially completed, evaluation may not be warranted and will likely not represent value for money.
- Delineating and evaluating the impact of the project at this current time from the severity of current events does not appear feasible.

Should this approach be approved, UNHCR and UNDP are proposing that the formal evaluation be replaced with an online internal lessons learnt workshop involving key project staff and implementing partners. The workshop is proposed to include exploration of design, analysis, planning, implementation and monitoring, identifying good practice and areas for improvement. The workshop will culminate in a learning product, documenting all insights to be utilized in future program design and implementation.

The project had originally planned to support youth and youth civil society to achieve greater access to public policy and decision-making structures, and to position them with government interlocuters as key players in peacebuilding processes. Many of the gains that had been achieved prior to the conflict will likely have been undone when things stabilize in the states, and it is highly likely that there will be significant rotation in government staff. Furthermore, it is highly likely that civic space will continue to shrink in the coming months and years, as it has been doing so since the conflict began.

The project also aimed to develop and capacitate the participating youth in peacebuilding, digital content creation, inter-community dialogue, and leadership, which they will then be able to utilize in other fora or contexts following the end of the project. While the skills and knowledge developed by the youth will not be lost and with likely be sustained beyond the life of the project, personal experience of conflict and displacement may be determinant of their willingness to continue to engage in peacebuilding related activities. While many youth peace ambassadors and youth-led CSOs continue to express their willingness to participate in the program and to contribute to humanitarian actions both in Sudan and Chad, their opportunities to do so are very limited.

Finally, the project was intended to support a proof of concept. Unfortunately, since it was not completed in its full manner, and that UNHCR and UNDP have lost the ability to appropriately monitor and evaluate, the final results of the project are unclear. There have certainly been positive indications for positive change and contributions toward local and state-level peacebuilding efforts, and feedback from participants has been encouraging. However, the conclusions that can be drawn remain limited.

- While initial catalytic effects appeared to be materialising amongst both youth civil society and some government interlocutors prior to the outbreak of the conflict, the project cannot claim any concrete impacts due to the current security and conflict environment in both West and Central Darfur. Much of the work to promote the inclusion of youth into decision making and public policy structures, and to promote youth access to civic spaces, has been undone.
- Discussions with PBF Sudan remain ongoing in the preparation for the submission of the NCE document for this project. The project will propose the discontinuation of the incomplete activities and will suggest the remaining money be reallocated elsewhere. The final evaluation for the project will also be removed from the project and replaced with an informal evaluation. This will take the form of an online internal lessons-learned workshop involving key project staff and implementing partners.
