Impunity Watch participated in two meetings organised by the Steering Committee. The first, on 11 April 2023, and a second on 29 August 2023.

Please provide a brief description of any engagement that the project has had with the government over the last 6 months. Please indicate what level of government the project has been engaging with.

Since Ejo Nahacu's official start on 13 March 2023, engagement with the Government has been continuous, principally via the Ministry of National Solidarity, Social Affairs, Human Rights and Gender ('the Ministry'), as well as other ministries via the PBF Steering Committee meeting on 11 April 2023 and on 29 August 2023. Engagement with the Ministry had been extensive during the in-country consultation process that led to the project design and submission, facilitating early project collaboration. An Execution Protocol outlining responsibilities of the Ministry and Impunity Watch was signed on 10 May 2023. Among others, the Protocol establishes the project's contribution to Government priorities for reconciliation and peace capitalisation, as well as the specific priority actions of the Ministry's General Directorate of Human Rights, Peace Education and National Reconciliation (the 'DG'), namely contributing to the elaboration of a policy for peace and history education, supporting youth centres, awareness-raising, and creating space for dialogue between communities and the local authorities. Crucially, the Protocol officially authorises the project and establishes the project partnership between the Ministry and Impunity Watch.

Subsequently, several planning meetings took place with Ministry and DG focal points, the main objective of which was to organise the national project launch. The launch took place on 1 June 2023 in Bujumbura, with the presence of the provincial governors of Kirundo, Gitega and Ngozi, representatives of the governor of Bubanza, the Mayor of Bujumbura Mairie, the Vice-President of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC), and members of the local administration from the six intervention provinces. The Ministry's Permanent Secretary officially launched the project.

On 7 June 2023, a letter was sent by the Minister temporarily suspending the project pending clarification of certain project strategies. As noted, the project had been carefully developed in collaboration with the Ministry; the letter therefore came unexpectedly. Further details are provided below on the engagement with the Ministry and the UN that has been ongoing following this temporary suspension, including agreement with the Ministry on a project "Roadmap".

Recruitment of Impunity Watch's core project staff – Project Lead and Project Officer – is complete, as are procurement procedures and the development of core training materials. The baseline process had been initiated, but is currently paused pending authorisation to restart the project. Crucially, preparation and discussion around the project's Execution Protocol took precedence, with the agreement signed on 10 May 2023. The Protocol is an indispensable administrative document representing the Ministry's authorisation, and providing Impunity Watch and partners with an official document to present to national and local authorities. In parallel, the process of designing the communication strategy was initiated, with a visual identity (logo, tools, information flyers, etc.) developed by an external consultancy organisation. Simultaneously, coordination meetings were organised with partners, and contracting procedures initiated via Impunity Watch's internal requirements. Partner contracting is pending finalisation: narrative and budgets plans are finalised, with contracts and the first fund transfers pending signature due to the project's temporary suspension. Partners have completed their internal procedures for recruitment and designating project staff.

The project was officially launched through a national event in Bujumbura on 1 June 2023. Participants included the six provincial governors and/or their representatives, the TRC Vice-President, local authorities, Ministry provincial focal points, and project partners. Official remarks were given by the Permanent Secretary, the Mayor's office, the Director General, the UN's Senior Human Rights Adviser, Impunity Watch, and partners. The necessary equipment for the staff and the Ministry has already been purchased, but transfer to the Ministry is still pending due to the project's temporary suspension. For the same reason, the only actions executed so far have been office-based. To this end, project training tools have been produced or updated, namely the modules and training guides on advocacy, leadership, income-generating activities, and transitional justice. These tools will serve as a reference and will be used throughout the project's implementation. Partners are currently producing terms of reference for activities in preparation for the official government authorisation to relaunch the project.

Core activities under Outcome 1 will be capacity-building and support for 192 youth leaders. Trainings will cover civic education, transitional justice (TJ), leadership, advocacy, and the SDGs. Progress under this Outcome has primarily been registered through updating Impunity Watch's existing training materials (modules, tools, methodologies), and through reviewing partner modules and ensuring their alignment with Ejo Nahacu. This includes APFB's module on gender and leadership, and design and management of income-generating activities (IGA), ISHAKA 2250's modules on youth advocacy and SDGs 5 and 16, and SPDH's modules on leadership and human rights. The review and adjustment process is completed for the project's core tools forming the basis of training-of-trainer sessions currently being planned.

Two principal sets of activities will contribute to the outputs falling under Outcome 2: first, the 192 youth leaders will be supported to establish 24 community networks through which TJ awareness-raising will take place and income-generating activities supported; second, three types of dialogue will be initiated – intergenerational, women-only, and youth-only. In order to prepare these activities, Impunity Watch's TJ awareness-raising tools have been reviewed and updated. Similarly, the existing methodologies of APFB and SPDH for income-generating activities have been reviewed and brought into line with the Ejo Nahacu's intervention strategies on TJ and peacebuilding.

In order to expand the scope and the scale of Burundian youth engaged in TJ outreach and dialogue, the project works with youth centres in the six intervention provinces. The actions under Outcome 3 are among the key priority activities of the Ministry's General Directorate of Human Rights, Peace Education and National Reconciliation. For this reason and in order to achieve the Outcome, collaboration with the Ministry is crucial. Time has therefore been invested in securing the project's Execution Protocol, with the youth centre actions among the activities that will benefit from close cooperation with the Ministry. Mapping of the youth centres is underway in order to identify the key targets and the centres with whom action plans will be developed (see e.g., Output 3.2).

The fundamental basis of Impunity Watch's work is that communities should play a central role in advocating for, designing, and implementing informal, local transitional justice initiatives. Sustainability underpins the work of the organisation in the way it develops projects, and is therefore at the heart of each of the intervention strategies of Ejo Nahacu. Preparations underway towards the realisation of Outcome 1 aim to create a multiplier effect among youth and women, strengthening their capacities through tailored methodologies and accessible tools; likewise, Outcome 2 preparations ensure that community structures become sustainable vehicles at the community level for dealing constructively with the past, linking this to economic empowerment to ensure that such structures are not only there to ensure dialogue. Finally, Outcome 3 activities are being prepared together with the Ministry as a first step to building the capacities of youth centres to continue working on peace consolidation and transitional justice after the project's close, with the provision of resources (books, tools) and training-of-trainers targeted at ensuring sustainability.

Following the launch of the project in close collaboration with the Ministry of National Solidarity, Social Affairs, Human Rights and Gender, a letter signed by the Minister was sent on 7 June 2023 temporarily suspending the project. The letter cites questions raised during the Q&A session of the national launch pertaining to certain methodologies and the project's collaboration with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. At the time of reporting, a letter had been sent to the Ministry in response, numerous meetings held with the Permanent Secretary, briefings organised with the Steering Committee, and meetings held with the UN Office to find a solution. The suspension was unexpected, as the project was developed in close collaboration with the Ministry and the General Directorate, and an Execution Protocol signed between Impunity Watch and the Ministry establishing the responsibilities of each party on the project and formalising the Ministry's authorisation for the project's implementation. Moreover, the national launch event had been successfully planned together with the Ministry and DG, leading to the project's official launch on 1 June 2023 with speeches from the Permanent Secretary and other high-level officials, including from the UN. The launch event was closed by the Director General and saw the participation of key stakeholders. See, for example, the launch event article on the Ministry's website: http://www.droitshumains.gov.bi/ejo-nahacu/.

On 31 July 2023, the Ministry sent a revised copy of a translated version of the project document indicating that the document required approval by the presidency before the project could be authorised to restart. Following discussions with the Ministry and the UN, an agreement was reached to send a project "Roadmap" to the presidency. The Roadmap was drafted, sent to the Ministry for review on 24 August, and presented to the PBF Steering Committee on 29 August 2023. On 19 September, Impunity Watch and the UN Office were invited to a meeting with the Ministry's Permanent Secretary during which the Roadmap document was approved and sent to the Council of Ministers. The Roadmap provides further details on the collaboration between Impunity Watch and the Ministry, as well as demonstrating where key Ministerial priority actions are integrated.

During the same meeting in September, the Permanent Secretary emphasised the excellent collaboration between the Ministry and Impunity Watch, clarifying that the temporary suspension was the result of concerns at the Council of Ministers that were beyond the control of the project partners and Ministry, and the result of unforeseen circumstances. At the time of writing, the dossier was pending approval at the Council of Ministers, with the Permanent Secretary suggesting that the UNRC could intervene to support the process and to obtain approval for the project to be relaunched.
