The project is on track and is expected to be completed during Quarter 1 of 2024 after approval of six months No-Cost Extension (NCE) from September 2023 until March 2024. All the preliminary and preparatory activities were completed during year 1 of the project including constitution of the project team who have been continuously supporting implementation of activities and consultations with key Government ministries.

During the period under review, the project signed a Letter of Agreement (LoA) with Development Services Exchange (DSE) during Quarter 1 of 2023 which formed the basis of disbursing small grants to support actions of the Youth Caucuses.

During the period under review, two joint coordination meetings and series of consultations were held with WVI to identify milestones realised, review progress and plan upcoming activities.

A total of 30 activities were undertaken by the project resulting in a total expenditure of USD\$435, 973.22, a total of 98% of first tranche received, spent.

Structures for youth voice, participation, collective action for meaningful change established & revitalised in the province: 39 youth-led community caucuses and 10 youth ward level caucuses (YCs) established and registered with the national coordination body, the National Youth Council (NYC). The project was also instrumental in the revitalization the Provincial Youth Council (PYC) which had been dormant for years, elections for office holders, including development of the PYC constitution & 10 written declarations of commitments. These new structures are being used for collective action by young people to address issues on land governance & rights, clarify leadership structures & promote meaningful youth participation in decision making & address issues affecting social cohesion. These structures are demonstrating to community leaders and elders, the effectiveness of young women and men in addressing local grievances and sustaining peace.

Intergenerational dialogues facilitating transmission of knowledge, building bridges and development of innovative solution supported. Combining the wisdom of elders and the energy and innovation of young people, the project facilitated several intergenerational dialogues that seeks to develop innovative solutions on key issues affecting social cohesion and encouraging young people's participation in decision making on these issues. Substance abuse, lack of employment opportunity, land and natural resource management were amongst topics discussed. These dialogues were guided by the principles of cooperation, tolerance and shared values and protection of shared environment. A total of 217 (M: 57%, F: 43%) from 20 Youth caucuses and community leaders in 6 Wards have benefitted from Tok-stori/ Tangatupua design consultations.

Enhancing young people's individual skills and knowledge on topics such as peacebuilding, conflict resolution, land rights and traditional governance systems. A total of 25 seminars/capacity building initiatives benefitting 400 community members including young people, were held focusing on increasing people's knowledge, skills and awareness of the process for land recording, benefits of land recording, establishing customary landholding group, development of byelaws for governance of these landholding groups, securing land rights and building skills in the area of confidence building, communication, conflict and dispute resolution processes.

Laying the foundation for young people and women to secure land rights for improved development outcomes and peace. Through the 15 seminars/briefing sessions benefiting over 756 community members, (40% women) including young people, the project has been instrumental in incrementally laying the foundation that closely connects land recording, securing land rights as key to the social cohesion and unlocking of potential sustainable economic development in the province. The project has also been key in increasing the participation and awareness of women on key issues related to land rights. These seminars/briefing sessions provide a first steps towards building a common understanding of land rights and land use potentially minimizing future conflicts around land. As a result, the project will facilitate land recording in 3 sites in Bellona and undertake tribal mapping and lands rights mapping in 9 sites in Renell.

To facilitate inclusive decision making, the project continues to strengthen the structures for youth voice, participation, collective action for meaningful change through the established YCs. Building on the capacities of local peacebuilders who are members of YCs, the project disbursed US\$ 33,500 in small grants to 20 YCs benefitting 113 youth caucus members (79 males, 34 females) across the 2 islands. These new structures are being used for collective action by young people in Renell and Bellona to address issues on land governance & rights, clarify leadership structures & promote meaningful youth participation in decision making & address issues affecting social cohesion. These structures are demonstrating to community leaders and elders, the effectiveness of young women and men in addressing local grievances and sustaining peace.

Intergenerational dialogues (Tok-stori/Tangatupua) to facilitate transmission of knowledge, building bridges and development of innovative solution supported. To create an enabling environment for youth participation in building local peace through dialogues and facilitating transmission of knowledge, the project facilitated 7 intergenerational dialogues, benefiting 217 young people (M: 57%, F: 43%) and elders from 6 Wards. The baseline assessment report clarified that traditional spaces of engagement, inter-generational knowledge sharing is not vibrant at the community level due their negative experiences with the mining and logging sector that has weakened traditional governance. Therefore, the project is playing a crucial role in reinvigorating, nurturing the practice of intergenerational dialogue using the Tok-stori/Tangatupua approach to dialogue as a start, on key issues that are not contentious, but as the practice matures, to gradually adapt the process to facilitate discussions on contentious issues such as land, mining & logging. These intergeneration dialogues are building bridges across the age group and has developed innovative solutions to key issues as a result of combining the wisdom and experience of elders with the energy and innovation of youth.

To address aspects of loss of traditional knowledge of solving disputes through traditional structures, land governance and tenure, the project is supporting the identification and documentation of traditional knowledge on conflict resolution to create body of knowledge for future generations and to ensure sustainability beyond termination of the project. To ensure youth inclusion and responsiveness, the project has strengthened the structures for youth voice, participation, collective action for meaningful change through the establishment of 39 youth caucuses (YCs), with an overall membership of 170 young men (78%) and women (32%). The project disbursed US\$ 33,500 in small grants to 20 YCs benefitting 113 youth caucus members (70% males, 30% females) across the 2 islands. These new structures are being used for collective action by young people in Renell and Bellona to address issues on land governance & rights, clarify leadership structures & promote meaningful youth participation in decision making & address issues affecting social cohesion. These structures are demonstrating to community leaders and elders, the effectiveness of young women and men in addressing local grievances and sustaining peace.

To create an enabling environment for youth participation in building local peace through dialogues and facilitating transmission of knowledge, the project facilitated 7 intergenerational dialogues, benefiting 217 young people (M: 57%, F: 43%). These intergeneration dialogues that are building bridges across the age group and has resulted in the development of innovative solutions to key issues affecting social cohesion as a result of combining the wisdom and experience of elders with the energy and innovation of youth.

To ensure gender equality and women's empowerment, 32% of women are members of the 39 YCs established by the project in the province and 30% of the beneficiaries of the small grants issued to 20 the YCs were women. Under this outcome, the project has ensured 40% of women participation across all its activities.

The project made significant contributions to enhancing & empowering young women & men with relevant knowledge & skills on land rights & land registration processes and procedures. In partnership with the Ministry of Lands, 15 consultation sessions were conducted in Renbel province during the period under review, benefiting over 756 participants (M: 95%, F:5%). Results of the baseline assessment concluded that a large section of the population do not have common understanding of their land rights, or the process involved in the registration of their customary lands. Therefore, the project's interventions are crucial in building this common understanding of ownership and rights, making this information accessible to all and in the future, countering misinformation & minimizing future conflicts around land.

Trust-building and buy in for land recording processes established: After 12 months of running awareness sessions on land rights, clarifying the process, the benefits of registering customary land, engaging in trust building, the project through the Ministry of Lands has received 12 Expressions of Interest (EOIs) to proceed with land recording (3 EOIs) and tribal, land rights mapping (9 EOIs). By supporting the community's engagement in these processes, the project is playing a significant role in conflict prevention and peacebuilding as people learn more about their rights, their boundaries and genealogy. This process ensures that resource owners are rightly identified and recorded.

The project has also encountered some challenges under this outcome and readjusted its approach as agreed in the recently signed NCE. Due to the "not-so-pleasant" experiences of the province with the logging and mining sector which has led to the weakening of traditional governance structures, it took time to generate buy-in for activities related to land recording. Therefore, under this project, based on its revised strategy, for Renell Island, the center of the logging and mining activities, the project has invested in supporting these communities to map their land rights, and tribes, which lays the foundation for any future land recording process to build on. For Bellona, the project has proceeded with land recording based on the EOIs received, an important step in securing their property rights and in the future, potential access to better credits and finances as a result of the land registration.

The baseline assessment has pointed out that due to the nature of the land tenure system in the province, women's access, control and ability to manage land is severely limited, including their meaningful participation to decision making processes on these issues. Therefore, the project has design specific activity interventions to improve the practice of involving women and young people on land rights and conflict related to land, and their involvement and engagement with mining and logging companies.

Therefore, in holding consultations on land governance, the project held specific sessions for women and young people. In these safe spaces, participants freely express their views on the challenges impacting participatory land and natural resource management and quality of leadership.

All interventions carried out under this outcome is aimed at improving the practice and buy in for women and young people participation in community decision making including their involvement in management and decision making related to their natural resources.

After several series of workshops and seminars on land recording and land rights mapping, the project recorded marked increased in participation of women, where initial sessions started with only 1 woman attending the session, to an average of 60% of participation of women in the remaining land rights awareness session. A total of 15 session have been held.

During the reporting period, the focus under this outcome has been on preparing and laying the foundations necessary to support activity implementation. The project has held several consultants with various stakeholders: community members (women, youth and men) in Honiara and Rennell, national and local NGOs and CSOs as well as provincial and national Governments representatives. All stakeholders have expressed keen interest in engaging at different levels.

The baseline assessment results pointed to the lack of transparency, accountability in mining and logging operations and during negotiating and paying royalties. CSOs consulted have expressed hope that the dialogues to be organised by the project, will bring some transparency in the actions of extractive industries. The provincial and national governments have also expressed strong interest in continuing the collaboration on this topic.

The project has reached an agreement with the national government (Ministry of Mines) who has committed to support specific engagements, such as the development of the community engagement strategy and to pilot various mechanisms, like grievance handling mechanism, intended to strengthen governance of the extractive sector as outlined in the National Minerals Policy (2017-2021) and draft Mines and Minerals Act.

To support the framing of the discussions in the stakeholder engagement process, the project is presently engaged in conducting a detailed study to understand the complex relationship between local people and the mining and logging sector, study and understanding power structures and addressing of grievances in the mining sector. Findings of the study will be available during Quarter 4 of 2023 and will be plugged into other ongoing interventions especially in Rennel Island.

Overall, several dialogues are planned for December 2023 and in Q1 2024 between various stakeholders that draws on the results of the study

The baseline assessment has pointed out that due to the nature of the land tenure system in the province, women's access, control and ability to manage land is severely limited, including their meaningful participation to decision making processes on these issues. Therefore, the project has design specific activity interventions to improve the practice of involving women and young people on land rights and conflict related to land, and their involvement and engagement with mining and logging companies.

Therefore, in holding consultations on land and natural resource management, the project held specific sessions for women and young people. In these safe spaces, participants freely express their views on the challenges impacting participatory land and natural resource management and quality of leadership.

The project aims to adopt the same methodology when facilitating the dialogues between different groups including with the extractive sector. In particular, during the dialogues the use of working groups and working groups deliberations will enhance participation of youth and women

Young People in Rennel and Bellona

Although young men are owners and future owners of land they are excluded from decision-making on their land and natural resources. Lack of participation of young women and young men in decision-making on the management of communal land reduces their security of tenure and their ability to access land for their basic needs, contributing to food insecurity and poverty. Initial findings of the PBFfunded Anthropological study on Traditional Governance in the Solomon Islands, show that interviewed Renbel youths are unaware of the traditional governance system in their tribes. This is mainly because young women and men often leave their communities in order to pursue their education, losing ties with elders and traditional leaders. However, there is an emerging group of young men who are taking a new and increased interest in family genealogies, traditional governance and land discussions. Initial

מוסט סווטעע נוומנ women still do not have the same access to traditional governance structures or conversations as young men. In Renbel, youths' lack of knowledge on how to solve disputes through their traditional structures, the lack of effective formal mechanisms to address land disputes, the frustration of young unemployed men, can exacerbate conflicts with a negative impact on the peace in the province and in the whole country. **Traditionally youths** and women can freely move across tribes in conflict to initiate "peace talks" and lay foundations for the peace negotiations conducted by the haka hua (traditional leader). Women give continuation to the lineage by bearing children, they are considered mothers of the nation. Men on the other hand are considered shields for their sisters, mothers and womenfolk. In spite of their role in peacebuilding, women are excluded from decision making in their

tribes. The erosion of

traditional

governance, further exacerbated in Renbel by economic migration of population to Honiara and other regions has weakened the traditional conflict resolution structures and the crucial role as agents of peace that youth and women played in their communities and it has, halted the inter-generational transmission of knowledge.

Establishment of youth structures at community level laid the foundation for dialogue between the young women and men and existing traditional leaders thus allowing for meaningful participation of the youths in decision making and dialogue with community leaders, provincial government, national government and private sector on the management of land and natural resources in the province.

We are very glad that we as the youths had an opportunity to interact and dialogue with our traditional elders from our communities and those from the provincial administration during the Tok-stori sessions.

Overall, the project has strengthened the structures for youth voice, participation, collective action for meaningful change through the establishment of 20 Youth Caucuses. These structures are demonstrating to community leaders and elders, the effectiveness of young women and men in addressing local grievances and sustaining peace. The project continues to facilitate transmission of knowledge, building bridges and facilitate the development of innovative solution to key issues impacting social cohesion at the community level. The baseline assessment report clarified that traditional spaces of engagement, inter-generational knowledge sharing is not vibrant at the community level due their negative experiences with the mining and logging sector that has weakened traditional governance. Therefore, the project is playing a crucial role in reinvigorating, nurturing the practice of intergenerational dialogue using the Tok-stori/Tangatupua approach to dialogue as a start, on key issues that are not contentious, but as the practice matures, to gradually adapt the process to facilitate discussions on contentious issues such as land, mining & logging. These intergeneration dialogues are building bridges across the age group and has developed innovative solutions to key issues as a result of combining the wisdom and experience of elders with the energy and innovation of youth. The project is also making significant contributions to enhancing & empowering young women & men with relevant knowledge & skills on land rights & land registration processes and procedures. The project has also played a crucial role in trust-building and facilitating the buy-in for land recording processes which has resulted in the project receiving 12 Expressions of Interest (EOIs) to proceed with land recording (3 EOIs) and tribal, land rights mapping (9 EOIs). By supporting the community's engagement in these processes, the project is playing a significant role in conflict prevention and peacebuilding as people learn more about their rights, th

It also opened room for extensive presentation of project activities and future plans as well as gather relevant information from community gate keepers. The study has helped to determine the baseline values for the project results framework but also revealed interesting findings on emerging governance and peacebuilding challenges and opportunities. In addition to the study, the following activities were also carried out: Monitoring missions by DSE, WVI and UNDP personnel majorly to monitor activities of the PYCs through small grants; Convening of two planning meetings with all implementing partners to discuss the project's AWP, scheduling of joint events, and trainings/mentoring on M&E, communicating results, impact stories and Internal spots checks undertaken by the project team including the conduct of verification missions by WVSI and DSE, UNDP to monitor grants and activity implementation.

- Youth caucuses and the Provincial Youth Council (PYC) have been created on the example of those created for the EYAPSCSI, IGNR projects, and will be linked to the National Youth Congress to ensure the coordination and sustainability and increase impact.
- The project is presently documenting traditional knowledge on conflict resolution and the findings will be compiled into a booklet. This documentation will help to create a body of knowledge for future generations and to ensure sustainability beyond termination of the project.
- The project secured the buy-in and support of traditional leaders and on the young women and men who are members of the Youth Caucuses through linking of existing traditional structures and the new youth structures established. Deliberate inclusion of young women and men in all activities including the development of by-laws in accordance to standards of participation and inclusion will not only legally empower young women and men but also support sustainability of the gains realized beyond project implementation.
- For the stakeholder engagement dialogues, this process and practice can be sustained in the future by the extractive industries as part of their commitment securing a social licence to operate responsibly. This could be monitored by the NYC, PYC, the MMERE and by the ICCTISI to ensure that extractive industries provide support to indigenous communities in Renbel.
- The project is collaborating with other UNDP initiatives to establish synergies and ensure that the peacebuilding gains are sustained. Solomon Islands is expected to conduct national and provincial election in April 2024 and UNDP is among the lead agencies supporting elections in the country. UNDP have an ongoing project titled "Support to Electoral Cycle in Solomon Island Project" which is utilizing the platforms and networks established under the PBF project in Rennel and Bellona province to conduct awareness and voter education campaigns especially among the youths and other members of the community.
- The project utilized the sub-national networks and structures of the National Youth Congress (NYC) under which management falls. The project collaborated with and utilized NYC grassroot platforms of youths through the Youth Councils (at community level) and Youth Committees (at ward level) which allowed young men and women as well as other members of the community to participate and own the process defining own priorities and needs. This ensures sustainability as it is opening of forums and avenues of dialogue among the youths, traditional leaders and other members of the community.

Through the Ministry of Lands, Housing and survey, the project is unanimously considered by stakeholders as timely relevant and necessary, since it not only meets the existing country needs on land use and land management, but also presents a strong alignment with the main interest of the Government of Solomon Islands to have citizens who can hold, manage, and better administer own lands. The Ministry of Lands is also making efforts to ensure that land dealings are fair, transparent, impartial, and according to appropriate and relevant Solomon Islands laws. About 85 percent of landmass in Solomon Islands is customary land, regulated by unwritten laws and oral tradition passed down from generation to generation. This continue to remain a challenge in the Solomon Islands as customary usage is not a universally recognizable body of rules or practice.

The project is also contributing to the efforts of the Government through the Ministry of Mines and Energy to review and refine its processes of engagement in the extractive sector to improve the transparency and accountability of the sector.
