The project has built strategic partnership with key government stakeholders at national, subnational, and local level. For instance, the negotiation of signature of co-management agreement has required intensive engagement with the office of the President of the Republic of Burundi through its chief of military cabinet (appointed by the President as the focal point of the project), as well as the Minister of environment and the General Director of OBPE. The project has also worked closely with the mentioned authorities including the Minister of foreign affairs to mobilized additional fundings.

The Governor of Kayanza province and his advisor have provided strategic direction for implementation of activities that are pertaining to communities. In February, the Governor of Kayanza led a brainstorming session for the implementation of protection committee of Kibira.

At local level, the administer of communes of Muruta and Kabarore played a critical role during participatory monitoring of activities. Along the eight chiefs of targeted villages, they have also been instrumental in sensitization activities.

COH has been recruited since July 2022 to implement key conservation, community development, cultural and peacebuilding activities. COH works as lead organizations in a consortium with specialized NGO in the field of conservation/forest restoration (ABN), women empowerment (AFEB), Indigenous people rights (UNIPROBA) and culture (KIOKA).

The programme coordinator is in place since August 2022 liaising with in country stakeholders and ensuring proper implementation of the programme.

The project priorities sites and beneficiaries have been identified since September 2022

The Mpanda-Hydroneo hydro-power Public Private Partnership (PPP) has been selected for the investment of $1.5~\mathrm{M}_\odot$.

<u>Outcome 1:</u> Social cohesion, local governance and conservation of the forest are improved through community, government, and private sector engagement to address the interlinked drivers of local level conflict and deforestation in and around Kibria.

Progress summary: (350 word limit)

The project has created a dedicated foundation, the Kibira Foundation, following a participatory and political process with the Government of Burundi, the private sector, and the civil society. His Excellency, President Évariste Ndayishimiye, has endorsed the selection of the five founding members of the Foundation led by the Honorable Imelde Sabushimike, Minister of Human Rights, Social Affairs and Gender, who is the first Twa-indigenous woman, designated to the national Government. The other members include two young environmentalist, one prominent businessman and one woman from caritative organization. The Kibira foundation has been constituted on 24th of February by its 5 founding members and formally recognized by the government of Burundi on 25 of June.

The formal recognition of the Kibira Foundation paved the way for the signature of a comanagement agreement for the Kibira National Park. The 10-year co-management agreement, was signed on 3rd of September between the OBPE and the Foundation to enhance the protection and conservation of Kibira National Park. Under this co-management model, the Government oversees the deployment of eco-guards in the park, largely recruited from forest communities themselves. This collaborative management of the park will help improve security for communities, strengthen the state's presence in the park and serve as a disincentive for armed groups to occupy these spaces. At the same time, the Foundation is working to secure additional resources for the park and to develop public-private partnerships.

To clearly create the link between the foundation and the local communities and promote peace cohabitation with park managers, the project has started to support establishment of comite de protection de la Kibira. Although, it is at an early, over 400 people have been sensitized and 48 will be trained to support peace actions in their community. The 11 cultural stories already collected will then bring awareness and knowledge on the importance of the forest to

consolidate reconciliation between communities and the forest, thus creating enabling condition to collaborate with park managers and reduce the conflicts.

The Kibira foundation is the framework for the community to partner with the government of Burundi to forge lasting peace and stability in the region. The project has ensured that the founding members of the foundation have included two women and two youth. This with the aim to guarantee effective Gender Equality and Youth Inclusion in decision-making processes in the overall park management.

<u>Outcome 2:</u> Access to sustainable livelihoods is improved for communities in and around Kibira forest to reduce structural drivers of conflict and recruitment into illegal or violent activities through sustainable exploitation of forest resources.

Rate the current status of the outcome progress: On track Please select

Progress summary: (350 word limit)

The project has started the restoration activities that will contribute to carbone sequestration. Through funding provided to Communities of Hope (COH), the project has undertaken reforestation and restoration activities that provide livelihood to local communities while undoing part of the damage done by agriculture, illegal timber and fuelwood harvesting. 700 local individuals have participated in planting initiatives and a total of 161,000 plants have been cultivated through community nurseries. Furthermore, support has been extended to 122 Batwa people, including 64 women, aiding them in acquiring formal land rights for housing and agricultural pursuits, strengthening the rights of indigenous communities and empowering them as key guardians of the forest and its resources.

The project has successfully managed to sensitize a group of people that was doing agricultural activities inside the park. Through continued dialogue they agreed to stop their activities and over 5 hectares are currently under restoration with prunus Africana.

In terms of alternative livelihood:

- 1000 kg of mushrooms have been produced.
- 2,000 fruit plants including 1,000 Japanese plum and 1,000 maracuja plants distributed to Batwa
- 50 modern hives installed
- 3 communities' group of credits and savings are operational.

Overall, the income-generating activities have greatly contributed to improve attitudes and reduce the socio-economic inequalities that existed in the community prior to the project's intervention. Some examples include:

- (i) the Batwa are starting to understand the importance of farming like the rest of the population (Hutu and Tutsi);
- (ii) women are involved in bee-keeping activities, which is traditionally a men activities;
- (iii) Men allowing their wives to take part in association activities.

In the field, the project has worked to promote alternative livelihood opportunities for women, youth, and indigenous people (Batwa). Through support for production of mushrooms, honey and fruits plants, women, youth and Batwas have respectively accounted for 60%, 40% and 30% of total of beneficiaries. The project has engaged with these groups with a combination of approaches including mixed and dedicated associations. With the revenue generated by these activities most of the women involved in the project activities are able to contribute to daily needs of their family including improving savings, building additional source of income (eg.

Livestock), food, school fee and medical fee. This has greatly contributed to improve status of women in the households as testified by some beneficiaries. It also helped to improve the capacity of association of women and Batwa to empower their members. In the meantime, the project has improved women confidence to overcome a few social barriers that limit their economic empowerment. For instance, some women (10 out of 40 beneficiaries) are currently involved in beekeeping which is considered as men activity in the project area.

Before the project, the Batwa liked to work in isolation, but now they have functional groups and savings and loan activities that enable them to access credit to meet their needs (purchase of goats, pigs, clothes, etc.). The landholdings acquired as part of the project and the close supervision provided by the project's managers have enabled them to enjoy their work and increase their self-esteem in the community. Capacity-building in mushroom-growing techniques, boot production, beekeeping and fruit-tree planting has enabled them to demonstrate their ability in development activities and boost their incomes. The work of the batwa together with the other components of the population in the nurseries has contributed to the strengthening of social cohesion and the consolidation of peace.

The project has also offer opportunities for Batwa and others ethnic group to work together and lift some social barriers. For instance, Batwa and other ethnic groups can now engage more easily to some social activities like party, sharing drinks, foods etc. The Batwa are now bringing more positive attention through their participation to project activities that are also benefiting to other communities. For example, in the commune of Muruta, Hutu communities are now accessing mushroom through the production form the Batwa.
