The project has supported the Federal Government of Somalia on several activities that include high-level meetings (NCC), DG coordination meetings for the preparation of handover transition documentation to the new administration, women's political participation. After the inauguration of the president and formation of the new cabinet, the federal government embarked on a path of direct contact with the FMS leaders for continuation of the political dialogue to progress the state building agenda for Somalia. The project has signed letter of agreement and channelled funds to support the Office of the Prime Minister of the Federal Government of Somalia on the implementation of the national priorities following the NCC meetings.

This report covers the activities accomplished from January – Dec 2022. Several activities have been conducted as stipulated in the subsequent sections. However, given the political nature of the project within the overall context of the political transition through long-drawn process of indirect election, timeline and scope of some activities and interventions were influenced by the circumstantial compulsions leading to repeated revisions. Also, during this period internal discussions led to review the prodoc changing the outcome and output(s) in the prodoc. On the issues of accountability and to minimize the risk, it was suggested to provide some support to OPM in terms of procurement system as well as ensuring the meaningful implementation of activities focussed on the compliance of gender marker in a close collaboration with OPN and UNSOM. Current project will end in May 2023, however, given the challenges indicated above, there is suggestion to extend the project for an additional period of 7 months.

With its secretariat led by the Office of the President, the 9-mmeber National Consultative Council convenes the Federal and FMS executive leaders and the Banadir Regional Administration, and is now chaired by the President of the Federal Republic of Somalia with following composition: President of the FRS – Chairman of the Council, Prime Minister of the FGS- Deputy Chairman of the Council, Deputy Prime Minister of the FGS, President of Puntland, President of Southwest, President of Galmudug, President of Jubbaland, President of Hirshabelle and Governor of BRA being members.

The NCC held on 27-31 October 2022 decided to form the NCC's terms of reference that outlined the structure, powers/responsibilities of the Council, process of reaching agreements, articles to be negotiated and implementation of the agreements. The NCC was repositioned to ascertain existence and development of collaborative relations between the Federal Government, the Federal Member States and Benadir Regional Administration in order to negotiate and agree on unified policies. The objective of NCC, as agreed by the members, is to establish procedures for political negotiations at national level that involve the FGS and FMS governments in order to help address serious challenges confronting the statehood and to reach agreements on issues that are priority to state-building through a sense of political unity. The Council pledged to be guided by the following general principles: (i) Inclusive agreements; (ii) Consultation and consensus; (iii) Process based on ownership, transparent and accountability; and (iv) Supremacy of the Constitution and the Law.

The Project was successful facilitating the operationalization of the agreed roadmap and implementation of the national consultative council agreements, thus resulting the successful completion of the indirect elections .

However, Project's support to the efforts by the Goodwill Ambassadors on the target of women quota in (s)election was not achieved due to some entrenched structural and operational factors including cultural barricades and lack of mechanisms to implement political agreements intended to strengthen women's political participation.

The National Consultative Council (NCC) meetings, initially chaired by the interim Prime Minister, have been instrumental in unlocking the political stalemate on electoral framework and timeline by convening the highestlevel political dialogues and negotiations starting from Dhusamareb-1 in 2020 that culminated in a joint Communique on 27th May 2021. Despite intermittent disruptions in the dialogues and repeated reversals in the deadlines, these rounds of dialogues between Somali leadership helped reaching a Somali-led and Somali-owned electoral framework payed ways and means for a subsequent peaceful transition of power in May 2022. However, these forums remained informal, time-bound and ad-hoc in nature largely confined to election related agenda. It is currently being recognized by the stakeholders that these informal mechanisms and avenues of dialogue should be extended, and complimented by more enduring, predictable, and proactive institutional arrangement to iron-out longstanding issues related to state-building through negotiated settlements. Cabinet Induction: The project supported the induction for the new cabinet that enhanced coordination between ministries and enabled discussions on the government priorities of the different ministries. DGs Coordination Forums was held to maintain momentum in the implementation of the agreed roadmap to contribute to a constructive dialogue among federal line ministries that focuses on principle of cooperation at technical level, which resulted to prepare plans, priorities, set achievable milestones and targets for the new government program. The commitments and decisions made in the cabinet induction program would be measured at the end of 2023 and a compliance tracking report would be prepared by the OPM.

Additionally, the project funded several Directors General Coordination Forums which resulted in the preparation of handover documents to the next administration. This helped ensuring continuity of government service delivery to the citizens during a sensitive transitional period. It is worth noting that a meeting on the development and activation of digital applications was held with Bewsys, a software company. This focussed on "Effective Communication and Coordination Towards Improved Management of Inter-Governmental Relations in Somalia"

Early in 2022, the project supported initiatives on women empowerment.This included the support provided to the Goodwill Ambassadors on the agreed 30% quota for women in the indirect electoral process. The Goodwill Ambassadors held numerous advocacy meetings with civil society representatives, women, youth and traditional elders in all the federal member states and encouraged the electoral bodies to meet the 30% quota for women.

Furthermore, a draft report on gender priorities for the new administration and the best standard techniques to handle these goals was developed and prepared, as a result of discussions at NCC meetings about how to enhance gender inclusivity in the NCC's political and security discussions. A series of similar meetings on how to integrate gender in the implementation of NCC decisions and recommendations were also organized with the participation of women in the public and security sectors. The process of integration of gender related recommendations remains a work in progress which would be followed through this project and other similar initiatives.

The project has exit strategy, but no specific steps is being taken to ensure that sustainability of the gains on the state building process after the end of the project.

The NCC held on 27-31 October 2022 decided to form the NCC's terms of reference that outlined the structure, powers/responsibilities of the Council, process of reaching agreements, articles to be negotiated and implementation of the agreements. The NCC was repositioned to ascertain existence and development of collaborative relations between the Federal Government, the Federal Member States and Benadir Regional Administration in order to negotiate and agree on unified policies. The objective of NCC, as agreed by the members, is to establish procedures for political negotiations at national level that involve the FGS and FMS governments in order to help address serious challenges confronting the statehood and to reach agreements on issues that are priority to state-building through a sense of political unity. The Council pledged to be guided by the following general principles: (i) Inclusive agreements; (ii) Consultation and consensus; (iii) Process based on ownership, transparent and accountability; and (iv) Supremacy of the Constitution and the Law.

With intermittent gatherings, the NCC still remains ad-hoc, informal, flexible, and reactive body with no reference to the Provisional Constitution, which lays out similar entry points for the development of cooperative federalism by suggesting periodical Summit(s) of Executive Heads of FGS and FMSes (Article 51(3)). This Article makes it mandatory to have annual Summit on regular basis to discuss and agree on following overarching subjects and issues critical in carving out an operational framework on cooperative federalism in Somalia: (a) Strengthening national unity; (b) Security and peace of the country; (c) National socio-economic development, and common market policies of the country; (d) Promotion of the wealth of the people; and (e) Information sharing.

In order to facilitate the constitutional compliance of Article 51(3), efforts are being made to creating and strengthening predictable institutional spaces for continuous discussions on pending issues necessary for the operationalization of cooperative federalism in Somalia by transforming NCC from a de-facto to a de-jure body resourced by public funding with a clear sense of public accountability. This can be achieved by enhancing complementarities between informal and formal platforms of dialogue, contestation, negotiation and possible agreements on federal framework.
