**This report covers the activities accomplished since January 2023. Given the political nature of the project within the overall context of the political transition through long-drawn process of indirect election, timeline and scope of some activities and interventions were influenced by the circumstantial compulsions leading to repeated revisions. Also, during this period internal discussions led to review the prodoc changing the outcome and output(s) in the prodoc. On the issues of accountability and to minimize the risk, it was suggested to provide some support to OPM in terms of procurement system as well as ensuring the meaningful implementation of activities focussed on the compliance of gender marker in a close collaboration with OPM and UNSOM. The end-date of the project was in May 2023, however, given the challenges indicated above, the project was extended for an additional period of 7 months.**

**Revision of the Project Document: Following internal discussions between PBF and UNDP, a thorough review of the project document was conducted to realign the programmatic focus from 'transition' to 'consolidation' building on the momentum of inclusive political dialogue. The project period was extended until November 2023 to enable and finalize the implementation of activities focussing on Gender Marker.**

**From November to December 2023, the UNSOM Joint Justice and Corrections Section (JJCS) and UNDP, in partnership with the Office of the Prime Minister (OPM), conducted a series of workshops in Mogadishu on enhancing women's participation in peacebuilding through the use of Nonviolent Communication (NVC) to amplify women's voices in conflict resolution, mediation and advocacy to create and implement justice and equity for all segments of society. In total, 106 women leaders from civil society and public institutions from different regions of Somalia were trained over a series of five workshops. The participants agreed on advocacy topics to jointly carry forward and they defined goals, actions, and the necessary support. Among the advocacy issues are gender justice and equality, ending female genital mutilation (FGM) and other forms of gender-based violence, and women's participation in peacebuilding and politics. The workshops provided a platform for women from different regions of the country to connect with each other, share their situations, challenges, and their common wish to have their voices heard in society. Sharing the difficulties they face as women in Somali society has proved supportive for women who are keen to change harmful and/or discriminatory social norms through the experience of sisterhood and companionship.**

**This project contributed to support women networks to come together to collectively agree on how to demand from the political leadership their full participation and visible role in the peace and state building processes. The activities under this project supported women's engagement with the NCC, by bringing them and their priorities to the table, supporting them develop strategies for influencing the agenda and outcomes of the NCC, having a visible role in the implementation of NCC decisions and holding the leadership to account. The strategies were developed by Somali women with the support of the PBF as a catalytic intervention. Once the groundwork is laid, the expectation is that the Somali women will be able to take this process forward. The project helped to mobilize Somali women:**

- 1. To demand/lobby for women's inclusion and seat at the NCC table.**
- 2. To rally women to influence the agenda and outcomes of the NCC decisions.**
- 3. To ensure women have a visible role in the implementation of priorities outlined by the NCC, as part of the nation's peace and state building.**

**From November to December 2023, the UNSOM Joint Justice and Corrections Section (JJCS) and UNDP, in partnership with the Office of the Prime Minister (OPM), conducted a series of workshops in Mogadishu on enhancing women's participation in peacebuilding through the use of Nonviolent Communication (NVC) to amplify women's voices in conflict resolution, mediation and advocacy to create and implement justice and equity for all segments of society. In total, 106 women leaders from civil society and public institutions from different regions of Somalia were trained over a series of five workshops:**

**- Workshop 1 (12-15 November) – Cohort 1 – Group 1 (total of 27 participants):**

**20 women and youth leaders from the Mogadishu Peace and Protection Network and government employees from the OPM (4) and the FGS Ministry of Women (3).**

**- Workshop 2 (16 & 18-20 November) – Cohort 1 – Group 2 (total of 24 participants):**

**24 women and youth leaders from the FMS Peace and Protection Networks from Jubaland, Galmudug, South West State and HirShabelle.**

**- Workshop 3 (21-23 November) – Cohort 1 – Groups 1 and 2 (total of 51 participants):**

**The group consisted of participants from workshop 1 and workshop 2.**

**- Workshop 4 (25-27 November) – Cohort 2 – Group 1 (total of 30 participants):**

**A new group of 22 women and youth leaders from the Mogadishu Peace and Protection Network and government employees from the OPM (2) and the FGS Ministry of Women (6).**

**- Workshop 5 (12-14 December) – Cohort 2 – Group 2 (total of 25 participants):**

**A new group of 25 female government employees from the OPM and the FGS Ministry of Women and FMS ministries of justice, women, and health.**

The project supported the Office of the Prime Minister (OPM) to conduct a series of workshops on enhancing women's participation in peacebuilding through the use of Nonviolent Communication (NVC) to amplify women's voices in conflict resolution, mediation and advocacy to create and implement justice and equity for all segments of society. The workshops provided a platform for women from different regions of the country to connect with each other, share their situations, challenges, and their common wish to have their voices heard in society. Sharing the difficulties they face as women in Somali society has proved supportive for women who are keen to change harmful and/or discriminatory social norms through the experience of sisterhood and companionship. Exercising empathic listening, one of the key skills of NVC, supported the participants' self-empowerment: by getting in touch with the resources within themselves, the women became clearer about their values, leading to more strength to work with their values, and being better positioned to imagine a way forward for change through advocacy. This follows the theory of change that the more people are in touch with their own needs, the more they are likely to take actions in service of their needs. Having become familiar with the four steps of NVC, especially the difference between the needs that all human beings share and these needs being met or unmet laying at the heart of feelings experienced, and the understanding that different strategies (or requests) can be engaged to satisfy universal needs allows women to engage in discussions and advocacy aiming at sensitive topics, such as FGM. By focussing on universal needs and leaving aside what is seen as 'right' or 'wrong', a significant transformation can be achieved in the way women discuss and engage in discourse about (women's) needs and win-win solutions that see both parties to a conflict satisfied.

On a second account, 2-day meetings in each FMS between women advocate group and FMS leaders were supported to discuss the implementation and constitutionalizing the 30% quota, and women's participation in state building process (constitutional review process, Federalism).

In each trip women groups were led by the Minister, MoWHD led to culmination meeting marking the end of the missions to the FMSs, to review the outcomes and achievements to celebrate the success by the team and to address any challenges and in view of these, set agenda for contribution to the upcoming NCC. Town hall meeting to be held to discuss the outcomes and women's role in the implementation of NCC agreements. These discussions concluded that the continued exclusion of women in NCC processes and decisions is not sustainable and does not help in building lasting solutions to Somalia's political transition processes as this means that a large part of Somalia's population is excluded from these deliberations. These meetings resolved that women need a seat at the table. Women need to be part of the solutions for the country's peace and development.

**The National Consultative Council (NCC) meetings, initially chaired by the interim Prime Minister, have been instrumental in unlocking the political stalemate on electoral framework and timeline by convening the highest-level political dialogues and negotiations starting from Dhusamareb-1 in 2020 that culminated in a joint Communique on 27th May 2021. Despite intermittent disruptions in the dialogues and repeated reversals in the deadlines, these rounds of dialogues between Somali leadership helped reaching a Somali-led and Somali-owned electoral framework paved ways and means for a subsequent peaceful transition of power in May 2022.**

However, these forums remained informal, time-bound and ad-hoc in nature largely confined to election related agenda. It is currently being recognized by the stakeholders that these informal mechanisms and avenues of dialogue should be extended, and complimented by more enduring, predictable, and proactive institutional arrangement to iron-out longstanding issues related to state-building through negotiated settlements.
