Over the past six months, the Project Steering Committee (PSC) has met once. Its establishment and first meeting took place during the project's launch event at the Karsa Hotel in Gabú, Gabú Region, on February 27, 2024 - the location was chosen exactly to allow the participation of more local actors.

The agenda for this inaugural meeting included defining PSC members and discussing the project's terms of reference, marking a crucial milestone in the project's governance structure and operational framework. It should be noted that the PSC was set up with the aim of being a political strategic oversight body for sharing experiences and strengthening coordination with other structures with regard to the activities and actions resulting from the implementation of the project.

The PSC will gather every 6 months for comprehensive reviews of project progress, challenges, and achievements. Additionally, a new meeting is planned to take place between the end of August and the beginning of September.

Over the past six months, the project has actively collaborated with governmental authorities across various administrative levels.

At the national level, significant involvement was evident during the project's launch event and the subsequent establishment of the PSC. Notable attendees included an inspector from the Ministry representing the Minister of Water Resources, as well as the President of the National Land Commission and IBAP (National Institute for Biodiversity and Protected Areas). These engagements at the national level underscore the project's alignment with overarching governmental strategies and its integration into broader initiatives for sustainable resource management.

Additionally, at the government level, there is a strong desire to work directly with the Water Resources General Direction. To this end, the possibility of UNCDF entering into a partnership agreement with a strong technical component with this Directorate is being evaluated. The objective of this agreement would be not only to directly contribute to the project but also to strengthen ties with the government. This possibility is being discussed directly with the PBF Secretariat. Furthermore, technicians from this Directorate are directly supporting UN-Habitat in the inventory of water points in the 30 selected communities.

Moreover, the project maintained consistent engagement at the regional level, with participation of governors of the targeted Regions in the PSC, through dialogues during project missions, ensuring alignment with regional priorities and strategies under the leadership of the regional governor. These interactions highlight the project's commitment to harmonising efforts within the regional development framework and leveraging regional resources and expertise.

Futhermore, the project emphasised the importance of local involvement by ongoing presence of sector administrators in project activities.

In summary, the project's comprehensive engagement with government entities at the national, regional, and local levels underscores its holistic approach to governance and partnership-building. Such collaboration is indispensable for the effective implementation and long-term success of initiatives aimed at promoting peaceful management of natural resources, ensuring that interventions are tailored to address both community needs and broader governance structures.

Focusing on the Coliba-Korubal river basin and the regions of Gabú and Tombali, they identified three sectors impacted by the basin: Pitche, Boé, and Quebo. In between April and May, the agencies consulted the communities and conducted field missions to validate the selected tabancas, as well as to initiate the installation of listening clubs. Additionally, participatory workshops were held in collaboration with technicians from the Water Resources General Direction and local representatives, such as regional sector delegates and regional governors, as well as local NGOs involved with gender issues, to adapt the framework methodology to the local context. Local focal points were trained to carry out data collection. In the meantime, UN-Habitat is in the process of contracting the NGO REMPESECAO to coordinate gender-sensitive actions on the ground, while UNCDF evaluating the possibility of partnership with the Water Resources General Direction. It is also planned that FAO will hire IBAP in the future to assist with field activities. The agencies are set to start data collection for the spatial development framework and the inventory on water wells in the selected communities. The application of questionnaires is expected to take place in June, followed by data analysis and the prioritization of interventions for contracting technical service providers. Output 1.1: Women and youth at community level are empowered through constitution of listening clubs for increase role in natural resource management and water infrastructure management

The partner agencies convened and collectively determined the criteria for pre-selecting communities. Existing data on water points and communities in the MWaterPortal region, along with the 2009 Census data (INE, 2009) and hydrographic basin data, were mapped and compiled into a technical report shared with the Water Resources Directorate technicians. Based on this data, pre-selection criteria for communities were established, considering the highest population concentration in Gabú and sectors simultaneously affected by the Coliba-Korubal river basin. The 30 communities were divided among the Boé, Pitche, and Quebo sectors, with 10 communities allocated to each sector.

The proposal was endorsed by local government representatives who provided a list of communities eligible for the project. UN-Habitat then mapped these communities and identified some that did not meet the established criteria. Subsequently, UN-Habitat conducted a field mission with the pre-selected list and defined the villages in the three sectors that could be included in the project.

Simultaneously, FAO contracted Local NGO ECAS and ANCOPF and trained their staff in the listening club methodology. With these NGOs, FAO and the pre-selected communities FAO conducted 3 field missions in the targeted sectors to confirm the identification of 30 communities responding to selection criteria (10 in each sector). These field missions were realised with ECAS for Gabu region and ANCOPF for Tombali region. Then ECAS and ANCOPF were confirmed to work with the communities for the formation of the listening clubs according to the methodology provided by FAO.

Output 1.4 Reviewed and updated water point inventory in downstream Koliba-Corubal Basin focused on gender-based conflict prevention.

UN-Habitat proposed the adaptation of the Spatial Development Framework (SDF) methodology which aids in prioritizing interventions through qualitative and quantitative data. This approach is more fitting for the foundational spatial structure of the 30 communities, rather than an entire region, as would be the case with the function matrix, previously used in other PBF projects. Consequently, the construction of a questionnaire for community diagnosis commenced. This methodology and diagnosis are undergoing participatory refinement with local representatives, the Water Resources Direction, and the NGO REMPSECAO, which is under procurement process and shall assist in gender-related and data collection activities.

A mission was conducted in the first week of June in the Gabú region, with another scheduled for the Tombali region in the second week. Additionally, UN-Habitat trained REMPSECAO focal points responsible for collecting data on spatial development framework diagnostic surveys. Surveys will be conducted in the 30 communities, using the listening clubs established by FAO, starting from the third week of June.

Simultaneously, UN-Habitat is collaborating with Water Resources General Direction appointed technicians to develop surveys and the agenda for water point inventories, which will also commence in June. Following data collection, the UN-Habitat team will analyze the information and propose priority interventions, which will be validated with listening clubs in the communities. Furthermore, the process of contracting technicians and companies for physical interventions will start after the data analysis and intervention prioritisation.

Building on previous interventions, the project employs a differential approach to cater to the specific conditions of young and older women. This method acknowledges the unique challenges and needs of different age groups among women, thereby promoting inclusivity and preventing the perpetuation of exclusionary practices. By fostering cooperation between women of various generations, the project aims to enhance solidarity and mutual support, crucial for sustainable empowerment. This transgenerational mechanism is designed to endure over time, ensuring ongoing benefits and continuity.

The project focuses on creating specific entry points for women to access decision-making processes, especially in resource management and conflict resolution. This includes:

- Listening Clubs (Output 1.1): These clubs facilitate dialogue and interaction among women, allowing them to voice their concerns and contribute to community decisions.
- Community-Based Organizations (Output 1.3): Women's participation in these organisations ensures they have a platform to influence community decisions.
- Water Resource Management (Output 2.3): Involving women in the management of water resources not only empowers them but also integrates their perspectives in crucial resource management tasks.

To date, the activities have ensured a 45% female presence, aligning well with the project proposal's target of 30-50% women, thus promoting fair media representation and active participation.

UN-Habitat, UNCDF and FAO has forged partnerships with sub-national entities, such as local government bodies or regional authorities, to ensure that project activities are aligned with regional development priorities and strategies.
