Support Mass Sensitization to promote peace and Womens Participation: The Forum conducted over 7 community engagements ranging from community leaders' engagement to promote peace and women's participation, radio discussions, market campaigns to mitigate conflict during the elections. Establishment of Mechanism to Collect Real Time Data: In collaboration with Eminent Women Peace Mediators network, the forum established a women's situation that recorded 212 cases of violence during elections, including vandalism of market stall. Monitors were trained and deployed at the center and Analyst engaged to ensure peaceful elections. Engage Security Sector to enhance security for female Leaders: In collaboration with Mano River Union Peace Networks, Women's Forum conducted a panel discussion with the security sector to understand policy, and system gaps for women peace security.

Establish Monitoring Mechanism to Monitor Women's Participation in Politics: 125 monitors were hired by the forum that monitored the elections in all the districts and documented the level of participation of women in the elections and assess the enabling environment for participation

project has engaged with the government both at national and local level. At national level, the government through the Ministry of Gender and Children's Affairs in their capacity as co-chair of the project board have been providing strategic oversight on the planning and implementation of the project. Prior to the officially launching the Women Focused CSO coalition, the Minister of Gender and Children's Affairs performed the symbolic handing over of equipment for the setting up of the coalition secretariat offices in all six implementing districts (Bombali, Karene, Kono, Pujehun, Western area Rural and Western area Urban respectively), As part of the ministry commitment in supporting and promoting the Women Peace and Security agenda they have been engaged in providing capacity building trainings for CSOs on the implementation of the GEWE Act and other relevant gender normative women peace security (WPS) frameworks including legislative and policy guidance in the project implementing locations. In addition, inter and intra party cooperation and dialogue have been strengthened through engaging the female parliamentary caucus to increase their effectiveness in parliament.

The project at local level has been engaged with the Independent Commission for Peace and National Cohesion (ICPNC) to leverage on the peace building and national cohesion structures at community level by linking up the women focused CSO to the peace commission peace clubs and CSO peace forums to jointly coordinate women peace and security agenda while building national cohesion at local and community level. Moreover, the CSO coalition have been actively engaged with the local councils including ministries at local level to engage in advocacy and awareness raising initiatives on national issues that have the potential to create instability at communities.

Additionally, coalition members engaged the office of the National Security, Sierra Leone Police and the Judiciary to influence national policies and strategies in addressing electoral violence against women and assessing gaps in the policies and legislative frameworks. The recommendations have been used to engage the Human Rights Commission to inform electoral reviews and reforms within Sierra Leone.

All the preliminary preparatory activities including recruitment of staff and contracting of partners have been concluded since the last quarter. In addition to current status of the project the Women Focused CSO coalition has been launched and the secretariat is now fully operational across the project six districts. Executive and general meetings both at national and district level are held regularly in line with the Coalition's Terms of Reference and the Working Together Manual. The coalition continues to gain visibility and recognition in different platforms at local, district, and national level on issues related to women, peace and security. Various capacity development activities have been conducted for the coalition including on the working together manual, conflict transformation, resource mobilization, group dynamics, advocacy and communication. The project has also supported a series of advocacy and capacity building activities implemented jointly by the coalition at district level towards promoting women, peace and security. Mentorship guidelines have been developed and validated by the coalition and the mentorship programme is currently being rolled out.

Outcome 1:

Integrated approach to coordination -18 coordination meetings have been held by the Women Focused Organizations established in the 6 project locations. Their engagement with religious, traditional leaders and security personnel resulted in enhancing speedy trial of GBV cases, protection of women from compromise and provided victim support in Pujehun, Karene and Bombali.

The secretariat has been providing a joint platform for the administrative and full operationalization for a joint coordination in resource mobilization and advocacy. The adherence to the coalition's Terms of Reference and the working Together Manual capacity training demonstrates commitment to transparency, accountability, and good governance. These trainings provided to the members have strengthened their understanding of how they effectively communicate, addressing group dynamics. This enabled them to reflect on their governance structures and strengthened their management systems.

Coordinated advocacy and influencing – The coalition jointly at district level organized six (6) high level stakeholder engagement platform, that attracted representatives of various institutions at local, regional, and national levels. This proactive engagement at local, district and national levels has elevated the coalition's visibility and recognition as key players in promoting women, peace, and security. It is now recognized as a key player in advocating for women's rights and peace building and is networking widely with various players in promoting gender equality and women's empowerment by allowing it to influence perceptions and practices in broader peace building issues Additionally, the coalition has actively contributed both at district and national level in the development and validation of the National Action Plan 1325 SiLNAP III. The joint advocacy and capacity building activities at the district level have yielded tangible results. The coalition actively engages with local stakeholders including traditional leaders in advocating and campaigning for emerging issues such as drug abuse (e.g., kush). Coalition members are increasingly being involved in supporting survivors of sexual and gender-based violence to access services, providing logistical and transport support for survivors to access services. Additionally, they have been actively involved in alternate local dispute resolution on matters that could spark violent conflict.

Capacity Development – The project's investment in capacity building has empowered coalition members in the following areas 1) Conflict transformation, 2) resource mobilization, 3) group dynamics, 4) Advocacy and communication. These trainings have contributed to enhancing the skills and capabilities of CSO members in advocating for gender-sensitive policies and contributing to conflict prevention and dispute resolution. These skills have provided a platform for coalition members in Karene District to jointly develop a grant proposal that is currently being reviewed. One (1) mentorship guide has been developed. 120 coalition members have been trained on mentoring. As a result, coalition members have been mentoring each other on the development of their financial and audit reports to donors.

Outcome 2

The project contributed to increasing women's participation at the chiefdom, District, and national governance levels. 573 female aspirants were trained on electoral processes and leadership skills for the positions of Members of Parliament and Councilors in the six project locations. 16 of which became Members of Parliament and 68 became councilors in the 2023 elections. Additionally, the project contributed to shaping the leadership skills of one of the youngest female aspirants, ever to participate in national politics. In Karene, Bombali and Pujehun District, the project contributed to promoting the participation of women as female town chief, deputy chief administrator, councilors, local jurors and chiefdom police in the local courts. This has contributed to enhancing women and girls' safety in facing the local courts and in participating in chiefdom matters. The traditional leader in Karene indicated adopting community bylaws that encourage women's participation are further indications of growing awareness of and support for gender-inclusive practices.

The project has enabled significant shifts in views and actions toward youth involvement, women's empowerment, and gender equality. Women and young participants, for instance, have reported being more confident, assertive, and involved in political involvement and decision-making processes both before and after the elections, suggesting a change in society norms and beliefs.

Policy reform recommendations and gaps identified by the women's groups through the engagement of the security has been submitted for action to the Human Rights Commission. Additionally, members of the Market Women Associations published press release requesting for the protection of market women in Freetown.

The project has further contributed to institutional changes that promote peacebuilding and social cohesion. This includes the establishment of inclusive platforms for consultation, such as stakeholder meetings and community forums, where diverse stakeholders, including women, youth, and community leaders, come together to discuss and address key issues affecting their communities. In addressing Women Peace Security Matters, a National Coalition Strategy has been developed by the Women's groups, adopting an advocacy toolkit for engaging different stakeholders on WPS.

The project has contributed significantly to increasing female representation in politics from 14.5% to 30.4% in Parliament and 19% to 34% in local councils during the 2023 general elections. During the period under review, the project design, planning and implementation have ensured the equal participation of women, youth, and people with disabilities by applying age and gender considerations in all activities.

Women and youth equally participated in capacity-building sessions, and community-based activities addresses their specific needs. The project team has established strong collaborative relationships with women community mobilizers, counsellors, and activists to ensure that their concerns and needs are voiced and to further strengthen their active presence in their communities by enhancing their activate participation in leadership both at national and community level.

Engaging CSOs and Women's groups working in Peace and security is a priority, the project have been engaging with traditional leaders at community level including (Mamie Queens, Chiefs, youth leaders, etc) in providing awareness raising and popularization on the GEWE ACT, this have provided significant changes within the project implementing location by having a female town chief in Pujehun districts Gbanga chiefdom and the inclusion of 2 female jurors in Karene district local court.

The Localization and working together for peace project are contributing to outcome level peacebuilding results under the framework of the sustainable development goals. The project contributed to the peaceful and inclusive general elections in 2023. This was achieved through mitigating conflict by reaching 211,064 people through Facebook, twitter YouTube, community markets, and public places with peace messages. This was done by developing and sharing videos, jingles, and radio discussion programs in Bombali, Karene, Pujehun Western Area Urban and rural. 200 community leaders were engaged, with 4 (four) giving their commitment to promoting peace and women's participation in politics in Bombali, Pujehun, Western Urban and Rural, whilst 21 signed the peace clothe, committing to promoting peace in their communities.

Additionally, the Women Focused CSO coalition has conducted joint advocacy and campaign in addressing issues that could spark violence in their various districts. The district level interventions influenced non-violent conflict resolution promoting peaceful coexistence and social cohesion. Coalition members have also been raising awareness about the National Unity agreement thus contributing to demystifying false information and growing tensions in communities. The women focused CSOs are playing significant role in providing recommendations and advocating for inclusive, transparent, and accountable governance processes at all levels. This includes contributing to the development and validation of the National Action Plan (NAP III) for the implementation of UNSCR 1325.

The project has contributed to the increased female representation in parliament from 14.5% to 30.4% and in local council from 19% to 34% during the 2023 general elections which has amplified the voices of women this was done through support to the development of their manifesto's including lobbying to political parties on the position of women in the propositional representation list (PR). This has led to increased urgency, confidence, and assertiveness among women in governance processes as more women enhance their willingness to take up decision making positions. In addition, there has been an increase in positive attitudes and perceptions towards women's leadership thus promoting women's participation in governance processes. Successful candidates are serving as role models, inspiring other women in the various districts to aspire for political positions. The district CSO coalition jointly organized high level stakeholder engagements with peace institutions, community peace promoters and government stakeholders in promoting peace and cohesion at district level in commemoration of the International Women's Day.

Coalition members are now collaborating with local level peace mechanisms and contributing to supporting Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) survivors. This includes providing on the ground referrals, transportation, and logistics for Sexual Gender Based Violence (SGBV) survivors to access services. The coalition is increasingly being involved in alternate dispute resolution on issues that have the potential to spark violence and advocating for non-violence conflict resolution.

The coalition of 120 Women Focused CSOs working on conflict prevention/mitigation and meaningful participation of women was established with structures at national and district level. 218 CSOs working on Women, Peace and Security were profiled and assessed across the project districts (Bombali, Karene, Kono, Pujehun, Western Area Urban and Western Area Rural); to understand their organizational, structural needs that could enhance their coordination effectiveness. The findings revealed a myriad of gaps and needs for the functionality of the women focused CSOs including their strengths and weaknesses. As a result, a Working Together Manual, Terms of Reference for the coalition was developed and adopted by the coalition in a three-day conference held in Freetown. Launched by the Minister of Gender and Children's Affairs, the coalitions' leadership was formed, and communications platform established for all of the districts. Coalition members share a common vision of a peaceful and inclusive society for the benefit of all women and girls in Sierra Leone. Their mission, as espoused in their ToR is to work in a holistic manner to drive locally grounded and inclusive interventions that promote women and girls' participation in peace building at all levels. Following the recommendations of the assessment report, several capacity development activities have been implemented to empower the CSOs with various skills including resource mobilization, advocacy, communication, and group dynamics among others. The project is working with the coalition to advance women, peace and security issues, gender equality and women empowerment.

The Project Monitoring and Evaluation has a defined approach for monitoring and evaluating the program throughout its life cycle in addition to the agency level M&E systems. For the period under review, the project team has delivered on the following monitoring activities.

I) Rapid Assessment: UN Women, UNDP & WV conducted a joint rapid assessment in the 6 project locations to collect data for progress tracking of the program result indicators and address critical data gaps for reporting, assess the situation of women-focused CSOs and how PBF has contributed. The assessment highlighted key findings including 72.2% of CSOs reported increased in their level of collaboration among CSOs which has considerably improved their effectiveness in promoting women's participation in peace building and national cohesion.

II) Spot-check visit: Spot checks conducted on key activities to assess if activities are implemented as planned to use a standard quality checklist. The visits highlighted areas for improvement including enhancing coordination among agencies and improving partner monitoring of funds.

III) Field Monitoring visit: UNDP alongside the CSOs conducted a monitoring field visit to gain insights into the key elements of the work halfway through implementation. The visit provided valuable information regarding the project's achievements, challenges, and areas for improvement, including identification of strengths and weaknesses in project implementation, recommendations for enhancing project effectiveness and assessment of progress against project indicators. Key findings change in women representation at local level including women holding positions of Town Chiefs in both Pujehun, Kono, and Bombali Districts, women now sit on the jury committee in the local courts in Bombali and Kono, and enhanced support from stakeholders for women's rights and empowerment initiatives.

IV) Outcome harvesting: Using UNW outcome harvesting approach, the project communication unit implemented rapid outcome harvesting, gathering impact stories to report on significant changes of the project. Key impact areas investigated were the significant outcomes resulted from the increased capacity of partners on resource mobilization, significant change stories of the successful female parliamentarians and councilors.

V) Partner Financial Monitoring: World Vision finance unit conducted a finance monitoring using agency-level financial monitoring checklist/indicators assessing the cost effectiveness by comparing activities implemented versus cost expended. Some of the key findings were: 1) Inaccurate payment voucher and attendance sheets not capturing the required finance fields 2) The need to strengthen documentations of activity implementation with unit coding structure and align with outputs.

This project's overall objective is to build the capacity of local CSOs and women's groups in Women Peace and Security. Local stakeholders, authorities, and community members have been integral to the design and implementation of the project, ensuring ownership and continuation of the activities in the long term. The project team has constantly consulted with all active actors, aiming to prioritise issues of Women Peace and Security. The activities are not stand-alone but integrated into a broader context and address needs at different levels.

Sustainability is ensured by building strong networks and creating peer support systems that will maintain collaboration and mutual support beyond the life of this project. The capacity-building of CSO partners within the region has been prioritized by the project through the provision of logistical equipment and the setting up of a secretariat at each district hosted by a CSO organization. In addition, the project invests in developing the leadership skills of women and other groups, such as youths, who can ensure the continuation of activities.

Furthermore, CSO coalition members have established a mechanism that was jointly agreed by them as an initiative to mobilize recourses through individual organizational contribution on a quarterly basis to serve as a seed funds to jointly implement advocacy initiative at their various communities.

Overall, project activities will have a lasting impact by increasing the capacity of community led CSOs engaged in women peace and security by providing a platform where they jointly co-create proposal and concept initiatives and linked them with donor partners with the aim of resource mobilizing and building network.
