The project's technical committee is coordinated and chaired by the Minister of the Ministry of Public Administration and Political Affairs (MPAPA) in its capacity as the implementing partner for the project. The technical committee comprises the lead UN agencies – UNDP and UNICEF, and one representative each from the implementing partners.

The convening agencies (UNDP and UNICEF) met with the Minister of MPAPA in September 2023 to apprise of the project's contributions to the elections and in the immediate post-election period; and explored options to sustain implementation. The PBSO focal person for Sierra Leone in company of UNDP and UNICEF also met the Minister of Public Administration and Political Affairs in May 2024 to understand the Ministry's perspective on the project's implementation and contribution to peace before and after the elections.

All preparatory activities including development and revision of concept notes/proposals and budget from potential implementing partners and contracting of implementing partners; signing of low value grant agreement, responsible party agreements and letter of agreements respectively are completed. Following the finalization and endorsement of agreements with implementing partners, UNDP and UNICEF have transferred all funds in line with respective agreements to the partners in tranches for execution of approved activities. In partnership with representatives of MPAPA (former MPPA) the project ensured the monitoring of the activities carried out by the implementing partners. The project's baseline assessment is also concluded following engagement with relevant stakeholders in both agencies, and the implementing partners at the national and district levels. The baseline facilitated the revision of some outcome and output indicators, which has been submitted. With regards to staffing, in line with the project document, payment remains effected for the following staffing configuration, who are already on board in both agencies: 1 CTA/PM P5 charged 50% to the project for 24 months (the other 50% is covered under the UNDP election project); 1 P3 from UNICEF (charged at 30%) for 24 months; and 1 NOC from UNICEF (charged 100%) for 24 months respectively.

iVerify continues to foster the mitigation of mis/disinformation across mainstream and social media through factchecking and publications of verified contents as requested by the public. The weekly one-hour radio shows hosted by the Independent Radio Network (IRN) and broadcasted across 60 radio stations in the 16 districts of Sierra Leone publicizes verified content, empowers media literacy, and post-electoral education. Led by PPRC, in line with Resolution 5 of the Agreement for National Unity, the 'Inter-Party Dialogue Framework between the APC, SLPP and other political parties' facilitates the much-needed dialogue required to foster inclusivity, peace and cohesion amid ongoing threats over the concluding phase of the post-electoral review processes implemented by the Cross-Party Committee.

Capacities of 60 Youth Peace Ambassadors (32 males, 28 females) and 10 Youth Civil Society Organisations (YCSOs) representatives strengthened on mobilization and engagement of adolescent girls and young people in communities. Skills transferred to enhance their knowledge and response to peace efforts include problem solving, intergenerational dialogues, stakeholder engagement, peacebuilding, conflict resolution, monitoring and evaluation, report writing, volunteerism, life skills, personal learning journeys, leadership, and their roles as lifelong youth ambassadors. The ambassadors will strengthen existing platforms for youth participation and feedback, leveraging the U-Report.

A total of 3,786 people (1,645 men, 2,141 women) including religious and traditional leaders engaged in community and intergenerational dialogues, with multiplier effects to more citizens through 116 radio discussion programmes in 5 districts on violent free electoral process and participation of youths in local governance and decision-making process. Additionally, 1,800 adolescents and youth (900 men, 900 women) engaged in life skills, community dialogues and awareness raising on peaceful and civic education in 30 project communities.

Operationalization of an Information Sharing Protocol (ISP), finalized by the Technical Working Group (TWG) and signed by all the pilot organizations. The ISP ensures ethical collection and sharing of GBV data to ensure the safety of survivors and data collection organizations. Since the launch of GBVIMS+ in May 2023 in three (3) districts of Freetown, Bo and Kailahun, 286 cases of SGBV of which 86% are cases of GBV against children, have been reported by the four organizations. 69% of the cases recorded were rape, with all documented cases provided with at least one essential GBV service. Under the guidance of the TWG, a road map has been established for scaling up the GBVIMS+ to all the other districts of the country. Upgrading of the Digital Referral Pathway (eRPW) to include offline functionality increased efficiency of service providers to offer requisite support, with additional upgrade in progress to enable accessibility of ERPW through USSD. The simultaneous roll out of the GBVIMS+ and e-RPW has increased capacity of government and civil society partners to respond to GBV cases. With data from the GBVIMS+, the Ministry of Gender and Children's Affairs now has strengthened capacity for coordination, reporting and referral of SGBV. A total of 30,922 calls were registered including 1,332 calls within the reporting period by the 116 Helpline since the start of the project in May 2023 with 50 of the cases referred for GBV case management while other calls provided with information and counselling depending on the nature of the call.

The government's dedication to expanding GBVMIS+ nationwide is clearly outlined in the country's Medium Term National Development Plan (MTNDP). MGCA has allocated funding for GBVIMS+ programming in its annual budgets and plans, demonstrating its commitment to sustaining the system.

iVerify continues to provide a viable platform for citizens to verify pertinent information through submission of request on the website or facebook platform. Relevant stakeholders on specific subject matter are contacted by fact checkers to elicit accurate information, which are reviewed by coordinators before publication on the website and facebook pages. This has contributed to countering of fake news, misinformation and disinformation during the highly contested electoral process. UNICEF engaged with adolescents and youth for the development of visibility materials such as posters and card news that contributed to mobilizing young people for peace and social cohesion throughout the 2023 elections.

UNICEF mobilised funding (\$353,430) from Global Programme to End Child Marriage (GPECM) which is a joint programme of UNFPA-UNICEF across 12 countries to end child marriage. The resources from GPECM were used as cofunding to set up and roll out GBVIMS+ in the country, and capacity building of the workforce to effectively use the system to respond to GBV cases, focusing on electoral related violence. Furthermore, LAB developed the messages, jingles on elections and the directory with the contact numbers from LAB for legal support related to electoral violence, which was disseminated beyond the project districts. Similarly, FSUs were sensitised and trained to respond to electoral related violence beyond the project districts. UNDP mobilised USD 250,000 additional funds to complement the iVerify platform integration in the 2023 elections and USD 115,000 for the Early Warning Early Response (EWER) activities towards the establishment, customization and operationalization of the election EWER online portal, and trainings for data collectors on conflict monitoring. The Folke Bernadotte Academy also provided training for WANEP insider mediators on dialogue and mediation at no cost.

GBVIMS+ was launched jointly by UNICEF and UNFPA to further strengthen the partnership between the UN agencies under the PBF project. UNFPA and UN Women support the One Stop Centres in the country which are a critical service and referral mechanism to respond to GBV related cases during elections. All the four agencies (UNDP, UNICEF, UNFPA, UN Women) are also part of the Gender Theme Group which further strengthens the coordination between all of them focusing on Gender related issues including GBV, its prevention and response throughout the elections.

Prior to the elections, the project partnered with international training institutions such as the Clingendael Institute for International Diplomacy and Folk Bernadette Academy (FBA) to train women and youth political leaders, as well as insider mediators/DERG members of WANEP.

UNICEF implementing partners (Focus 1000) is working with KOMBRA Network, a grassroots local organisation and others such as Children Advocacy Forum –Sierra Leone (CAF-SL), Youth and Child Advocacy Panel (YACAP) and Health Care for the Aged. The community volunteers of these organisations are supporting Focus 1000 to mobilise community leaders, youth groups and parents in the project districts to amplify the messages on peaceful elections.
