Second Project Steering Committee meeting was held on 13 February 2024 in UN House, Sarajevo. The Project Steering Committee, including the Ministry of Civil Affairs BiH, Ministry of Health and Social Protection of Republika Srpska, Ministry of Labor, Health, Social Protection and Exiled of Canton 10, UN Resident Coordinator's Office, IOM, and UNDP approved submitted local community initiatives for implementation.

During the reporting period, the UNDP project team engaged with local, cantonal, and entity government levels to support development of project proposals for improving social services and social cohesion. UNDP signed Memorandum of Understandings with nine partner local governments (Bosanski Petrovac, Bosansko Grahovo, Drvar, Glamoč, Ključ, Livno, Mrkonjić Grad, Ribnik, and Sanski Most), two cantonal governments (Una-Sana, and Canton 10), and line ministries in state and entity governments to support improving social services and social cohesion. The UNDP project team participated in the Drvar municipal council assembly to support the establishment of the Center for Social Work. The council voted in favour of the initiative following UNDP's explanation of its importance.

Also, UNDP met with the newly elected Minister of Health and Social Protection of the Una-Sana Canton to present the project activities in the three municipalities located in that Canton (Ključ, Sanski Most and Bosanski Petrovac).

The project team directly supported local governments (LGs) in the implementation of the selected project proposals to improve social services and foster social cohesion. Thus, the project team participated in the Drvar Municipal Council Assembly to advocate for the project proposal to establish the Center for Social Work.

Consequently, the council voted in favor of the initiative after the project coordinator explained its significance and the funding that will be allocated for it by the SPSC project.

To assist partner municipalities (Mrkonjić Grad, Livno, and Sanski Most) in developing project proposals for supporting people with disabilities, UNDP organized a work session on this subject with them. A representative from the Federal Ministry of Labor and Social Policy of Bosnia and Herzegovina attended the session to present the Ministry's future activities aimed at improving social welfare. Furthermore, the Mayor of Lovas Municipality in the Republic of Croatia attended the session to share best practices for social inclusion and cohesion in her municipality, which can be applied to these and future initiatives.

Continuous meetings are being organized regarding the digitization of social services and the creation of a social map, a priority for effectively directing public funds to social protection beneficiaries. The Federal Ministry of Labor and Social Policy of Bosnia and Herzegovina asked for support.

Young people will have opportunities to increase youth activism skills, implement (cross)community initiatives, familiarize with different religions, interact with youth from other communities, and increase capacities to recognize inflammatory (hate speech) and create counter violence and positive narratives. The new project partners are reaching out to new beneficiaries, thus engaging a higher number of youths in project activities. While the baseline data on social cohesion, youth activism, and community assessments are completed, the project is continuously updating Community Profiles based on the lessons learned about the communities through the activities. The UNDP project team is completely operational. A civil engineer was hired for the planned period (January-December 2024) to ensure the quality of infrastructure works carried out within the funded municipal projects. Following the Steering Committee's decision in May 2023, the planned number of UN community volunteers engaged in the project was reduced from 40 to 15, and the engagement period was extended from 6 to 12 months. This decision was driven by a lack of eligible candidates and a desire to ensure their capacity development and gain experience for possible engagement in local institutions. As a result, during the reporting period, UNDP extended the contracts of 18 UN Volunteers (72% female) for an additional 6 months. The baseline assessment of social service availability in the project area, completed in November 2023 with 835 respondents (60.7% female), combined with insights from nine local community dialogues, provides UNDP with a foundation for developing project proposals with targeted municipalities to improve social services and foster social cohesion.

The UNDP activities are running in line with the defined activities and outputs, albeit with certain delays. Recruiting dedicated personnel with the necessary skills and talents took longer than expected and they were fully on board in July 2023. Additionally, the competitive supplier selection process for the mapping of social services faced challenges. The limited number of offers for the rapid assessment of social service availability in the project area slowed the tendering process. The initial tendering procedure, announced on 20 March 2023, and ending on 17 April 2023, yielded only one, ineligible offer. The process was relaunched and successfully concluded on 12 June 2023, with the selection of a suitable service provider. However, after clarifying the terms of reference, a contract was signed that ran from 31 June to 31 October 2023, and extended to 15 November 2023, due to the provider's request for more time to prepare the report. These extended tendering timelines impacted the overall project implementation schedule.

Furthermore, the development of project proposals and their implementation by partner municipalities experienced delays. Initially, the targeted municipalities lacked project ideas to promote social cohesion by improving social services, even after receiving findings from the social service mapping and participating in community dialogues. These ideas were eventually developed through additional direct communication and counselling with UNDP. A total of 21 project proposals were submitted, with 12 selected for funding. The remaining proposals were either of low quality or did not meet the requirements, necessitating further consultations with partner municipalities, including organizing forums for social protection practitioners and additional work sessions. In some cases, delays occurred due to the need to obtain permits from municipal councils before starting rehabilitation work. As a result, the implementation plan for the funded municipal project proposals was delayed, which impacted the overall project timeline.

Some delays occurred due to the forthcoming local elections in October 2024. The informal pre-election campaign has already begun, causing municipal councils to focus on political disputes to gain votes. Findings of the Rapid assessment and Youth Needs Assessments have been used to shape community dialogues in nine project communities. Community dialogues resulted in identification of key priorities in those communities. Several priorities struck as most prevalent: lack of space for youth to discuss and socialize, accessibility of social services, lack of cooperation between different communities, gender-based violence, wellbeing of persons with disabilities, mobile care and healthy ageing for older persons, and sport activities.

The project successfully established Professional Learning Communities (PLC) in 10 primary schools and six secondary schools in project communities. In order for youth to engage in cross-community and inter-entity activities they have received three methods of support: trainings to be able to support students in developing different activities that foster critical thinking and value driven engagement with social justice in mind, trainings on critical thinking and problem solving, values and social justice, and mentorship support.

The project created and published a promotional episode of the podcast "Besjede o obrazovanju" (Talks about education), with professor of peacebuilding sciences from the Faculty of Political Science of University of Sarajevo as a guest. The professor is one of the leading experts on peacebuilding in Bosnia and Herzegovina, as such this podcast episode discussed peacebuilding from various perspectives including the obstacles for establishing social cohesion in BiH's political context and the role of teachers in building peace while educating their students.

NGO Psiholuminis developed a pool of eight professionals (psychologists, social workers) who were capacitated to provide group and individual support to persons significantly affected by transgenerational trauma. The pool was created from a larger group of 28 professionals who participated in trainings on the Methodology for working on transgenerational trauma. Following the selection of professionals in the pool, a public call was published, inviting youths that want to participate in therapeutical sessions on transgenerational trauma. Over 90 youth applied, but 45 (71% female) were selected for participation in the camp, which included storytelling workshops and individual sessions based on the severity of the cases as described in the application. Those with more severe transgenerational trauma, as determined by the team of psychologists, had a higher likelihood to participate. The participants often reported that increased knowledge of storytelling positively influenced their confidence in presenting ideas, better understanding themselves and their parents. Some of the participants spoke openly about their own prejudices about members of other ethnic groups and how raising tensions in society is instrumentally used to mobilize social groups for political objectives.

The network of war veterans capable to facilitate veteran dialogues in project communities extended to 10 veterans (one female) and 7 professionals (5 females). The veteran dialogues can now be implemented in project communities with participants, as well as those from surrounding communities.

Two Strategic Review Sessions were organized in January 2024, one as a strategic session for IOM and UNDP, and other as a strategic session with existing Implementing Partners. The main purpose and objective of the session was to explain current state of achievements of each party. Both groups concluded that the partnership synergy is significantly bolstering social cohesion between CSOs and government in partnering communities.

IOM has piloted an activity entitled "Transgenerational transmission of Activism" as a continuation of work with young people from targeted geographical areas, bringing them together with CSO activists from their respective communities, combining knowledge and experiences of senior activists with fresh perspectives of younger generation. A total of 25 participants were part of this activity. The event fostered a deeper comprehension among young people about youth activism, the challenges they may encounter in the creation and execution of community initiatives, and the potential resources available in their communities.

By the end of January 2024, UNDP received 21 project ideas for improving social services. A committee of UNDP and IOM representatives scored these proposals, selecting 12 for funding (10 municipal and two inter-municipal). Selection was confirmed by the Steering Committee.

To further improve the quality of project proposals aimed at supporting people with disabilities and enhancing inter-municipal cooperation, UNDP organized workshops on "Persons with disabilities – From a Different Perspective" in March 2024 and "2nd Forum of Social Protection Practitioners" in April 2024.

The project organized 283 events (trainings, workshops, conferences, visits, community dialogues) in project communities. A total of 862 beneficiaries participated 3,159 times in project activities. About 11 per cent of beneficiaries participated in 10 or more activities (up to 30 activities), 12 per cent from four to nine activities, 25 per cent in two or three activities and 53 per cent in one activity. About 65 per cent of participants were women.

During the Transgenerational transmission of activism seminar for CSO activists and young people, the agenda addressed women's empowerment and youth inclusion. As a direct consequence of this action, Youth Centre in Ribnik was established, recognizing the importance of women empowerment as part of youth work.

While the veteran dialogues are primarily comprised by male veterans, facilitation of the dialogues are predominantly conducted by female professionals, as most of the engaged psychologists are women (only two men). During the development phase of the veteran dialogues approach, project stakeholders identified a potential risk on whether women should facilitate the dialogues, considering that they would be exposed to potentially traumatic and horrifying war stories.. However, female facilitators demonstrated compassion and empathy with war veterans, enabling veterans to open up more easily in front of the psychologists compared to male counterparts. About 70 per cent of teachers and social care professionals engaged in PLCs are women, consistent with the proportion of women in education settings.

The project promotes gender equality and women's empowerment by establishing safe apartments for victims of domestic violence in Bosansko Grahovo and Glamoč, targeting women and children as primary beneficiaries. It also includes a social counseling service in Sanski Most offering support for domestic violence victims, legal advice, and psychosocial support, enhancing the safety and well-being of women. Additionally, inter-municipal cooperation between Bosanski Petrovac and Ključ addresses the needs of women suffering from cancer and other vulnerabilities, fostering a supportive environment for both gender and youth inclusion through comprehensive social services and mental health support.

The teachers (engaged in PLCs) and veterans accentuated that the most visible and immediate impact of the project is established connections between agents of change from different communities, with particular focus on collaboration between entities. This project enabled people from communities that are geographically connected to each other but belong to a different entity to communicate and cooperate. It can be expected that this way of communication and cooperation will lead to more specific actions outside of the project framework, changing the point of view to the people, making them understand the importance of relying on one's neighbour.

The greatest value for me, as far as all of this is concerned, is that I have met all these wonderful people [referring to people from another entity] and that I know that I can turn to each of them for help if I need anything, and I am also available for whatever is needed. – teacher

Training and educational activities enabled teachers to gain additional knowledge and skills valuable for their pedagogical practice - particularly regarding the fostering and development of critical thinking in students, and recognizing and overcoming prejudices and stereotypes towards others.

For me, the most significant outcome is the enhancement of my knowledge and pedagogical practice through the School of Thought training. I finally attended a seminar where I learned practical strategies that I could apply in my classroom, complete with specific guidelines - teacher

As a result of community dialogues, policy makers had opportunities to see how ethnocentric narratives shape community divisions. Some municipalities were completely underestimating and denying the existence of certain ethnic groups in those communities. A former mayor of one of the project municipalities, participant of the community dialogues, noticed that their city is extremely divided between two extremist narratives. In the month of September, the Liberation Day of the municipality is celebrated on two different days, referring to military events that happened during two different years of military history. The project proliferated the idea that municipalities should work on the design and distribution of positive messaging to citizens as evidenced by the Mayor's statements underscoring the importance of unity at community level. The local Youth Council is recognized as an important agent for the development and dissemination of positive and alternative messaging.

Economic poverty and social isolation are frequent motives for youth considering leaving BiH. As a result of project activities, youth have seen opportunities that are appealing and inspirational for their willingness to stay in BiH. The everyday contact between the project staff and beneficairies suggests that youth who are ready to leave BiH are predominantly those more open for interethnic collaboration, and more susceptible for positive and non-divisive narratives, thereby their retention is key for the preservation of peace.

At the beginning of this project, and while we were talking to each other (youth) we were discussing how we will be going to Germany and leave our community. Now, seeing all of this and hearing all of you I feel motivated, and you gave me hope to think that it is possible to make a change and I would like us all to manage this together. This summer I was planning to go to Germany for one month to see if I can live there. However, there are a lot of project activities in the summer, and I decided to stay. – participant of the community dialogue

The community dialogues contributed to restoring civil society activism. In smaller communities (Ribnik, Grahovo, Drvar, etc.) civic activism is limited and the few remaining actors are retiring. However, municipal engagement with

community dialogues, inspired and motivated local activists to remain exertive.

At the individual level, project beneficiaries (teachers, students, social care professionals) report improved knowledge and skills, an increase in motivation and interest for learning and being involved in community-based activities and an increase in self-confidence and self-worth. At the relationship level, they reported improved cooperation, trust and mutual support with peers from neighbouring communities, dominantly communities from other entity. During a common event in Bihać on 5 December 2023, UN Volunteers from Ključ and Mrkonjić Grad shared how their engagement has connected them professionally and personally, exemplifying inter-vision and friendship between professionals from different communities. Similar testimonies underscore the deep connections and camaraderie fostered among participants, highlighting a shift towards a more supportive and collaborative professional network.

Now I have new friends whom I can turn to at any time for help. They not only greet me, but also hug me when we meet at the forum.- director of the Centre for Social Welfare

At the community level, the project established new structures which support different forms of collaboration among teaching staff, students, school management and local community partners, and enabled initiation and implementation of student and teacher-led activities and programs (e.g., Critical Thinking Club, PLC) which increased participation of students in the planning and implementation of extracurricular activities based on topics

or their interest.

The most significant achievement for me is the establishment of the Critical Thinking Club. This was a collaborative effort with the students, which made them feel a sense of belonging and ownership. Students from various classes interacted and connected with each other. They took the initiative to organize all aspects – their meetings, workshops. For commuter students, who are quite numerous, they now have content and activities to engage in while waiting for transportation, thus allowing them to spend their time more productively. - teacher

At the end of 58 capacity building events, 701 participants filled out the post-training satisfaction survey. About 99 per cent of participants stated that they are satisfied with the provided training (similar distribution of responses between men and women) and that they will utilize learned knowledge and skills in their professional and activist's life. Project partners and beneficiaries werewere asked about the impact of the project during the monitoring visits. Some of the quotes and key conclusions are already described in the report. The following quotes provided by different stakeholders serve as anecdotal evidence of the project impact and relevance to project communities and beneficiaries. After event in Sarajevo (Ilidža) we can state that the group we gathered is now motivated to work on certain activities implementation in their communities. Having in mind that they will be provided with the opportunity to do so (with IOM small scale grants) and skill development program provided by partners (PRONI Centre for youth development and CIM Centre for Peacebuilding) we can expect to observe an obvious change in the following months. - IOM staff During the mentorship visit to the primary school "Ključ" one of the teacher sponsors mentioned when talked about interschool activities that: "students from both schools already "hangout" virtually they talk and are excited to meet each other as well as to write letters. – project partner Many activities have further motivated me to work with students. For example, when we were working on values, I questioned myself and my role in the teaching process at times. I found myself in a lot of the things that the coaches said and convinced me that I was on the right track and that I was doing what I was doing well. It is important for me to know who I am and what my role is in the lives of my students. There was a desire for change, both in me and in others. Students who participate in this project are enthusiastic and eager for change - teacher Now for sure I have a feeling wherever I go in these 9 communities, I will feel like at home.- woman, student Most of the participants concluded that they benefited most from storytelling was that they had the opportunity to share and discuss with other members, to be honest and that they found understanding. Young women and men

Young men and women are leaving from Bosnia and Herzegovina, including project communities, not only because of unemployment, but also because of the lack of other opportunities and low level of trust in elected leaders, which is all contributing to the lack of hope and overall lethargy. Young men and women in BiH share similar values when it comes to their sense of belonging, interethnic trust, contacts with other ethnicities, and attitudes toward violence. Youth in BiH have lower level of trust in other ethnic groups, and a large proportion of them think that interethnic conflict in BiH is possible, which affects their sense of safety, security, and stability. Young people are engaged in the process of establishing youth clubs; they are travelling to visit friends in other communities, and do not accept and perpetuate divisive rhetoric and rivalries.

"What bothers me are stories that my family had to run away from home, that they lost everything in the war and that they are still afraid of it" "My uncle often mention how he was in prison camp, he ate every second day, how portions were small and that sometimes they were taking some people away from the group and those people never came back. While I am listening to these stories, I feel afraid and lost." "At the beginning of this project, and while we were talking to each other [youth] we were discussing how we will be going to Germany and leave our community. Now, seeing all of this and hearing all of you I feel motivated, and you gave me hope to think that it is possible to make a change and I would like us all to manage this together". "At the beginning, I was a very quiet person and didn't talk too much. If someone asked me a question, I would answer, but with shame. All this lasted until I got to know better the team of young people from all over BiH who participated in the camp. Later, I began to be more of a free person and slowly realize that no one would laugh at my answers than that we would all exchange opinions together that would benefit our community." – female, Glamoč "By attending seminars in different cities, I had the opportunity to demonstrate my real abilities and grow as a person. This experience not only enriched my knowledge, but also shaped my opinion and changed my life." - female, Dihnik

Teachers and pedagogues

In primary school, "Glamoč" during an informal talk with one of the teachers from the school team, she talked about her strong relationship with a colleague with whom she shares the subject - she is a lecturer of Croatian, and he of Bosnian language in the school. They both have school breaks simultaneously and use them to plan lessons together and share what they have done with students. Often, they come and watch each other's classes to seek inspiration. BiH's politicized education system is unfortunately free of education in the field of critical thinking, values, and social justice. It keeps citizens apart from the earliest most formative years of their lives. Lack of democratic culture produces students who are easy to be manipulated and it perpetuates divisive rhetoric and rivalries. After the teachers and pedagogies experienced the trainings and other project activities, they started to create together teaching tools which will enable more open, understanding, and diverse classroom environment in schools. For the teachers who are educated and practice an ex - cathedra autocratic way of teaching all their lives – this is a huge step. Teachers also actively participated in community dialogues which shows that the project activities increased the level of motivation to participate in community. Through inter communities visits of the

schools, the teachers are

"As school principal myself, I observed how important were PLC for creating the new layer of identity for teachers attending the PLC sessions. Many of them see themselves as "innovative and proactive" which distinguishes them from the rest of the teachers' room." "We saw that our students really clicked with the students from Drvar and we didn't want to interfere in their decision to pair up with this school. We also think it is great that they paired with the school that is relatively close and those connections made during the interschool activities can continue even after the project ends." "I am more confident in teaching, I have more educational tools that are easy to apply in teaching and with the students, I noticed more leadership skills among my students and that that they were more relaxed in behaviour." Elementary school "Nikola Mačkić" Ribnik will implement an activity in which the students, the leaders of the Club, will hold a workshop for the **Professional Community** for Teacher Learning at the school. This activity shows the readiness of teachers and pedagogies to engage in a completely different dynamic of the position of educator-participant.

The involvement of UN Volunteers in this project has a significant direct impact on Centres for Social Welfare/Departments for Social Protection, not only in terms of providing needed professional staff, but also in terms of identifying critical community needs. Through UNDP-UNV engagement, these people have the opportunity to develop their skills through UNDP learning platforms while also connecting with one another through officially organized gatherings.

A UN community volunteer from Glamoč exemplifies empathy for recognizing needs. Since the community was aware of her involvement in the Centre, she received information about one older person who required immediate assistance due to a serious health condition. She initiated the process with other colleagues, and they discovered that older man is living in a remote area in a very poor economic situation, who was very sick and had no support from family or the community. He had no health insurance or financial income. The Centre initiated the process with the Health Insurance Office and the Ministry of Labour, Health, Social Care, and Exiled Persons of Canton 10, and with common support and coordination, they were able to resolve the case and send the beneficiary to hospital care. This is one example of how an innovative approach to hiring qualified individuals directly in the field can have a significant impact on citizens and the entire community.

Employees of the center for social welfare (all targeted partner municipalities)

During project proposal submission, UNDP requested that all proposals be received directly from the municipality authorities. This was the first time that municipality authorities or mayors were included in the whole process of detecting community gaps and needs in social care provision and drafting project proposals with the Center for Social Welfare/Department for Social Protection. After the selection of project proposals, the mayors of each municipality appointed project coordinators on behalf of the institution.

Previously, centers for social welfare were left alone in overcoming different obstacles related to legislative, lack of staff, non-recognition in municipal budgets, etc. After the project proposal was submitted, the mayor of Sanski Most Municipality initiated an agenda item at the Municipal Council that referred to the provision of two additional rooms for the Center for Social Welfare. This item was adopted promptly without any objections, and UNDP immediately started with implementation . "This was the first time that the mayor heard what our challenges are, what we need, and that we did not feel alone. He engaged other sectors to support us, especially for the infrastructure works, because we cannot do it alone. We hope that this will reflect in the municipal budget from now on, because they hear us now." - Social worker, Center for Social Welfare Sanski Most

Centres for social welfare and municipal departments for social protection (all targeted partner municipalities) UNDP organized two forums for social protection practitioners. Since this project is implemented in most of the underdeveloped communities, the forum was the first occasion where social care practitioners shared their concerns, obstacles, and examples because, through the BiH social care system, they do not have the opportunity to attend official supervision or interact with colleagues, intended specifically for social workers. Helping professions are very demanding and usually related to burnout symptoms. This is rated very highly (4.8/5 through official evaluation).

"Now I know that I can contact another social worker (participant of the Forum) if I need some advice." - Social worker, Centre for Social Welfare Sanski Most

"This was the first time that we shared our issues, and previously we thought that we were alone. When I heard other centres, I see that we are in even better position than them." - Director of the Centre for Social Welfare Ribnik

"We will exchange our contacts and be support to others if they need our advice. We need more of these events, but maybe with the Ministries as well." - Officer in the Department of Social Protection of the City of Livno "I don't know how we would help our citizens without volunteers." - Director of the Center for Social Welfare,

As a result of Community Dialogue held in Bosansko Grahovo, the Interdisciplinary Team of local community was founded with the aim of continuous communication between citizens and local authorities on problem identification and solving. Members of the mentioned Team are municipality Mayor, representatives of the respective municipal units (social care, health, etc), youth, CSOs representatives, others.

As a result of continuous effort and cooperation that Step by Step has established and is maintaining with different teachers, pedagogues and school principals from partnering local communities, they have formed two supporting non formal groups called "Professional Learning Communities", one for primary and other for high-school teachers. Having in mind that teachers are expected to apply Professional Learning Community knowledge and methodology in their schools and classroom once the project is done, we expect that some of them will become part of wider non formal network called "Innovative Teachers Community" that gathers all teachers practitioners from this field from across the country. They have developed additional communication platform where positive experience and practice can be shared among the group members improving their day-to-day work in classroom. The idea of presenting all of this as a benefit to those participating in activities supported within this project makes us believe they will increase the level of resilience and strengthen their feeling of belonging to specific and more proactive group of people in the field of education and work with young people.

The Association "Pravipozar" has increased the size of the educated network of veterans for dialogues in the communities. This network will be used to implement veteran dialogues throughout of BiH by Pravipozar outside of the project framework.

To ensure the sustainability of peacebuilding gains, UNDP has established several mechanisms and networks through project activities. Continuous engagement with local, cantonal, and entity government levels has been prioritized, with regular meetings and forums to foster collaboration and support. The involvement of mayors and municipal authorities in identifying community needs and drafting project proposals ensures local ownership and ongoing support. The project's emphasis on capacity-building, such as professional development for social welfare practitioners, equips local stakeholders with the skills needed to sustain initiatives. The creation of inter-municipal projects and regular forums for social protection practitioners pr

omotes a network of support and knowledge-sharing. By addressing critical gaps in social services and facilitating continuous dialogue among key stakeholders, the project lays a foundation for long-term social cohesion and stability.
