Please limit your response to 3000 characters  The project, with CDF implementing on behalf of UNFPA, and DDRA on behalf of IOM, has been actively engaging
with the state government in White Nile (WN). Following the project's shift from West Darfur to Kosti in WN state,
the implementing partners initiated a series of interactions to introduce the project and secure government
support.
During these engagements, the project team met with key government officials, relevant line ministries, and local
authorities. The discussions focused on presenting the project's objectives, activities, and expected outcomes, as well as seeking the government's endorsement and collaboration in the implementation process.
In addition, WHO has discussed with both the Federal Ministry of Health (FMOH) and White Nile State Ministry of Health (SMOH) on the need to strengthen MHPSS. WHO will build the capacity of health care workers in selected
facilities in Kosti and procure the essential psychotropic medications (mental health kits). FMOH has already
approved these requests while WHO is currently procuring the medications, which will be distributed by National Medical and Poisons Board (NMPB).

Similarly, IOM is finalising the contractual processes for its implementing partners Berghof Foundation and DDRA to complete their respective remaining activities under output 1.3. WHO on the other hand is currently procuring the essential psychotropic medications and planning on training health care workers on both mental health GAP Humanitarian Intervention Guide (mhGAP-HIG) and Problem Management Plus (PM+). Agreement and approvals have already been provided by respective FMOH and SMOH offices. Coordination meetings between the partner organisations to align on the revised implementation plan and strategies.

Initial stakeholder engagement and consultations with local authorities and communities in WN state to introduce the project and obtain their buy-in.

The project partners have worked diligently to ensure a smooth transition and to maintain the momentum of the project activities, despite the geographical shift. With the preliminary preparations completed, the project is now poised to commence its implementation in WN state, building on the established partnerships and leveraging the expertise and experience of the project team. The project team is currently waiting for approval from the PBF in New York to apply for a second No-cost extension of six months and extend the project until January 2025.

Unfortunately, the project's shift from West Darfur to White Nile state has posed some challenges in terms of the timely completion of the planned outputs.

When the project was being implemented in West Darfur, it was largely on track for the timely completion of the outlined outputs. The established partnerships, community engagement, and project team's familiarity with the local context contributed to the smooth implementation and progress towards the intended goals.

However, the relocation of the project to WN state has introduced new dynamics and complexities that have made it difficult to achieve the same level of progress as originally envisioned.

Firstly, the change in geographical location has required the project team to re-establish connections with local authorities, communities, and stakeholders in the new area. This process of building new relationships and navigating the unfamiliar context has resulted in some delays in the implementation timeline.

Secondly, the remaining project duration and budget constraints have made it challenging to fully replicate the comprehensive set of outputs that were planned for West Darfur. The project team has had to carefully prioritise and adapt the activities to fit the new context and the available resources, which has meant that some of the original outputs may not be achieved to the same extent. Furthermore, the unstable security situation and the existing vulnerabilities in the WN state have added another layer of complexity to the project's implementation.

Despite these challenges, the project partners remain committed to making the best use of the available time and resources to contribute to the promotion of non-violent, gender-equitable notions of masculinity and to build trust between the communities in WN state. The project team is focusing its efforts on a range of activities that they believe can have a meaningful and lasting impact. One key intervention is the establishment of Living Peace Clubs for youth in the project communities.

These Peace Clubs will provide a safe and inclusive space for young men to come together and engage in open discussions around issues of masculinity. For many of these youth, this will be the first time they have had the opportunity to explore positive, constructive notions of masculinity, moving beyond the traditional and often restrictive social constructions they may have been exposed to previously.

Within the Peace Clubs, the facilitators will guide the young men through workshops and dialogues that challenge harmful gender norms and stereotypes. The aim is to help these youth develop a more well-rounded and healthy understanding of masculinity - one that is not rooted in dominance, aggression or rigid gender expectations, but rather emphasizes traits like empathy, care, and non-violence.

By creating these dedicated spaces for young men to reflect on and discuss masculinity, the project team hopes to catalyze a shift in social attitudes and behaviors. They believe that equipping these youth with the tools and perspectives to redefine masculinity can have a transformative effect, not only on the individual participants, but also on their families and communities as a whole.

In addition to the Peace Clubs, the project is also implementing capacity-building workshops and community-level initiatives that reinforce the themes of positive masculinity and gender equality. The holistic approach, involving both individual and collective change, is designed to create a ripple effect and sustainable impact within the target communities.

While the project may not be able to achieve all of the original outputs as initially planned, the partners are working diligently to adapt the implementation strategies and ensure that the project's core objectives are still addressed to the extent possible within the revised context and constraints.

The progress of the project has been impacted by a series of factors, including a delay in obtaining approval for the project amendment request, which was granted in January 2024. Additionally, there was a one-month delay due to power outages and the interruption of the mobile network from mid-February to mid-March 2024. The changing dynamics and challenging situation on the ground have made it difficult for implementing partners to smoothly carry out the project. This includes changes in local authorities, which require additional effort to advocate for the project in line with the humanitarian needs in the state.

The situation in the area has been characterised by an increase in hate speech and retaliatory attacks, known as "turma," following clashes which have escalated since the RSF advanced on White Nile. These factors have led to heightened tensions among community members and raised concerns about a potential cycle of violence between tribes and communities. The conflict in White Nile has reinforced and entrenched hypermasculine ideals like physical strength, aggression, and dominance within the local culture. These militarized notions of masculinity can have damaging consequences, leading to the perpetuation of violence, gender-based abuses, and the oppression of vulnerable groups.

If these harmful masculine norms go unaddressed, they can create a vicious cycle where the youth in White Nile and Sudan are socialized into this toxic version of masculinity. This can normalize violence, marginalize women and non-conforming individuals, and contribute to new cycles of conflict and instability.

Furthermore, the neglect of mental health in the White Nile region, where there are no psychiatric facilities or psychiatrists, mirrors the situation in West Darfur. This similarity suggests that strategies and interventions used in West Darfur can be effectively adopted and implemented in White Nile. The decision to shift the geographical focus of the project to the White Nile was influenced by the relative stability in this area compared to other conflict hotspots and the large influx of internally displaced people (IDPs).

To address this challenging situation, project partners have spent the reporting period preparing to implement quick impact interventions using materials and methodologies developed and trialled in West Darfur. The same teams and implementing partners will manage these interventions. The primary objectives of these interventions are to reduce inter-communal violence in Kosti, White Nile, and foster peaceful interactions between IDPs and host communities. The aim is to prevent further clashes or fragmentation of the national conflict at the state level.

Additionally, the interventions aim to promote non-violent and gender-equitable ideals of manhood, facilitating changes in gender norms. They also seek to establish platforms for positive interaction between different generations and tribes, enabling socio-cultural and economic empowerment necessary for peacebuilding. Overall, the project aims to contribute to social restoration, healing among youth, and improved access to mental health and psychosocial support services while promoting peace and stability in the White Nile region.

The project recognizes that conflict and militarization can have distinct gendered impacts. It acknowledges that traditional notions of masculinity associated with militarism, power, and violence may be reinforced in such contexts. At the same time, women and girls may face heightened vulnerabilities, including gender-based violence and limited access to resources and opportunities.

Engaging Men and Boys: To challenge militarised notions of masculinity, the project has implemented targeted interventions to engage men and boys. It promotes non-violent and gender-equitable ideals of manhood, emphasising the importance of peaceful conflict resolution and respect for women's rights. By involving men and boys in discussions and activities focused on gender equality, the project seeks to transform harmful gender norms and promote positive behavioural change.

Women's Participation in Peacebuilding: The project actively promotes the inclusion of women in peacebuilding efforts. It recognizes the valuable role that women can play in conflict resolution, community reconciliation, and sustainable peace. The project creates spaces for women to participate in decision-making processes, fosters their leadership skills, and supports women-led initiatives. By empowering women as agents of change, the project contributes to gender equality and women's empowerment.

Youth Inclusion and Empowerment: The project places a strong emphasis on youth inclusion and responsiveness. It recognizes the importance of meaningful youth participation in decision-making processes and program implementation. The project engages youth through various mechanisms such as youth-led initiatives, youth forums, and mentoring programs. By amplifying the voices of youth and addressing their specific needs and concerns, the project ensures their active involvement and empowerment.

Addressing Gender-Based Violence: The project acknowledges the increased risks of gender-based violence in conflict-affected areas and works towards its prevention and response. It supports the establishment of safe spaces for women and girls, provides psychosocial support services, and raises awareness about gender-based violence and its consequences. By addressing this issue, the project contributes to creating a safer environment and promoting gender equality.

Due to accessibility challenges, WHO, Sudan MoH, and White Nile MoH are focusing on training general doctors and family physicians in mental health. Health care workers will be selected from accessible health centers in the state, with training scheduled for late June 2024. These trained personnel will then train and supervise their colleagues in White Nile, enhancing the provision of mental health and psychosocial support in the region.

Essential psychotropic medications (mental health kits), currently being shipped to Sudan, will be distributed by WHO and the Sudan National Medicines and Poisons Board to health facilities with trained staff. This approach will establish a referral pathway, ensuring that patients referred from the community to health facilities receive comprehensive care, including both psychosocial and psychiatric support.

This additional time will be crucial, as they now need to establish a comprehensive baseline assessment in the new WN location before implementing any interventions. As part of this baseline process, the team plans to conduct an Endline study over the next six months. This in-depth assessment will serve as a critical endline for evaluating the impact of the project's designed interventions. The endline study will allow the team to better understand the current situation, needs, and capacities within the new WN context, and measure the effectiveness of the planned MHPSS services and other interventions. Specifically, the baseline study will examine factors such as the impacts of the ongoing conflict, the availability and accessibility of mental health and psychosocial support services, as well as the specific vulnerabilities and requirements of the target population of conflict-affected adolescents, youth, and GBV survivors. By establishing this detailed baseline understanding, the project team will be able to design tailored interventions that can most effectively address the identified needs and challenges. Moreover, the baseline study will serve as a crucial assessment, enabling the team to evaluate the realworld impact of their designed interventions. By comparing the post-intervention data collected through the endline study to the baseline conditions, the project team will be able to measure the extent to which their MHPSS services and other activities have succeeded in improving outcomes for the target population. This comprehensive baseline and endline process is particularly important given the significant shift in the project's operating environment, from the original West Darfur state to the new White Nile state. The baseline study will ensure the team has a thorough understanding of the new context, allowing them to adapt their interventions accordingly and accurately assess their impact, despite the challenging circumstances.
