Project progress summary

In the reporting period, the project has achieved significant progress, particularly in promoting and enabling women's participation in leadership in The Gambia. The project supported a total of 60 women leaders and 5 civil society organizations across four regions: Upper River Region, North Bank Region, Central River Region, West Coast Region. These women were empowered to participate in and lead policy advocacy and influence, planning, and governance. As an example, they played an active role in advocating against the current appeal to repeal of the Female Genital Mutilation Law in The Gambia.

Furthermore, the project activities led to a significant increased in the women's participation in politics and leadership positions in multiple Governmental entities. During the local government elections in 2023, 17 women councillors and 1 woman Mayor were elected in 2023, compared to 7 women councillors and 1 woman Mayor in the previous cycle, which represents more than the double number of women elected compared to the previous cycle and exceeded the Project Target.

Additionally, in 2024, the project supported an 78.3% increased of women representation in community structures, as the number of women appointed to the district tribunals went from 5 to 23, making it a first for The Gambia.

In addition, the project has contributed to creating an enabling environment for women's participation in political and leadership processes. Notably, discussions are underway to amend the District Tribunal Act to further increase women's participation at local level decision making. Through financial and technical support from the project, Women leaders and groups have formed consortiums advocating for women and girls' participation in leadership across the regions. They are educating young people on engagement in leadership and politics, and initiating community peace and development activities to support women as they prepare for the next elections. This consortium is also very engaged in the on-going conversations, advocacy and dialogue against the repeal of the FGM law and supporting for the amendment of Women Reservation Bill.

The project also had a cross-cutting positive impact on youth and persons with disabilities. With the support of the National Youth council (NYC), over 700 young people, including persons with disability, were engaged in the participation and representation of youth and women in political and leadership roles as well as the inclusion of persons with disabilities in politics and decision-making processes. These activities enhanced awareness and built capacity of young people to increase the number of youths and persons with disability taking up leadership roles within local communities and positively change the perceptions on their roles in political participation in local communities. The training also took stock of some of the successes achieved by women and youths in politics, whilst identifying bottlenecks and advocacy points to support the buy-in of female candidates by stakeholders, critical for moving the electoral processes further.

The project has achieved significant progress in supporting societal and structural changes in behaviours and attitudes towards women's participation and leadership. Here are the key accomplishments:

Enhanced Legal Frameworks and Policies:

The project contributed to progress towards the outcome of enhanced legal frameworks, policies, and political party bylaws aimed at increasing women's political participation and leadership. This is evidenced by the growing interest and involvement of women, men, youth champions, and pressure groups advocating for supportive legal frameworks. Notably, there have been several dialogue and advocacy engagements, as well as knowledge-sharing events, focused on amending the Women Reservation Bill. The Inter-Party Committee (IPC) has engaged in dialogues and campaigns that have made the Political parties indicate interest in adoption of the Gender Strategy when it is finalized. IPC has reviewed and approved terms of reference for the consultant to lead the review and validation of the gender strategy. Advertisement has been launched by UNDP and the recruitment process is expected to be finalized mid-June. Furthermore, advocacy has been conducted among key community stakeholders (community influencer, traditional chiefs, and women's groups) on review of the District Tribunal to ensure inclusion of women as leaders.

Enhanced Women Leadership in Community-Level Governance:

Significant strides have been made in enhancing women's leadership within community governance structures. The district tribunal now has 23 active women members thanks to advocacy and townhall meetings with District Tribunal members and the Ministry of Gender, Children and Social Welfare. Additionally, there are 18 elected women councillors across The Gambia who received support (financial, capacity building etc.) through project engagements. These elected women councillors, the woman Alkalo, appointed women tribunal members, rural court women, and women leaders in various groups have formed a consortium and pressure group under the African Women Leadership Network (AWLIN). This group advocates for increased representation of women in governance structures within their communities, exerting pressure through advocacy and dialogue in districts and regions with fewer women in these roles.

Strengthening Conditions for Women's Political Empowerment:

The project has established a consortium structure of women that regularly meet to share information and learnings through two key initiatives - The Women Resource Centre: A center dedicated to training, mentorship, and capacity building for aspiring women leaders and GAMBIFoods Food Processing Center: A facility that trains women in producing high-end finished agriculture products for sale and export while providing support funding to finance women political candidates' campaigns. This facility is a pilot initiative, supporting climate change response by combatting agriculture products wastage and loss while providing economic empowerment for female candidates interested in governance.

The WPL project has successfully addressed a significant gap in sustainable peace and development by strengthening the civic space through the formation of a national consortium with women leaders with the potential for long-term peacebuilding change. By providing technical and financial support, the project facilitated the establishment of a consortium among CSOs and women leaders actively supporting women's empowerment, particularly in political participation and leadership.

The project enhanced the capacity of these organizations to engage in high-level national discussions with the government in policy change. This is evidenced by the active participation of CSOs consortium advocating against the repeal of the FGM Law and the amendment of the Women reservation Bill in The Gambia.
