Strengthening Local Peace Infrastructures:

The project has made progress in strengthening local peace infrastructures through extensive youth engagement. A total of 155 representatives from seven LSGs were trained in development planning and youth engagement to strengthen local peace infrastructures. As a result, 25 out of 42 youth-led peacebuilding solutions presented to the LSGs were funded by them. The LSGs engaged with 3,000 young people to agree which solutions to fund. Initiatives included peer-to-peer training in peace skills and media literacy, and the creation of youth co-working or art spaces. Youth and Community Engagement: 4,050 young people took part in U-Report surveys, providing vital data for the design of solutions. The project also trained 290 young people in peacebuilding skills and 294 parents in supporting adolescent mental health. Qualitatively, using the UPSHIFT human-centered design methodology, the project facilitated a collaborative environment where both youth and LSGs could identify and address local youth and peace-related issues, collectively developing solutions. This approach not only built the capacity of both groups, but also established a sustainable model of engagement that can be replicated in other contexts. At the policy level, the project successfully elevated youth issues to national discussions, influencing policy decisions and promoting youth involvement at the highest levels of government., The project established a Youth Policy Forum that brought together key decision-makers, including the President of Kyrgyzstan, elevating youth issues to the highest levels of government and highlighting them in discussions on national policy. In the realm of early childhood education, the project promoted inclusive and non-discriminatory practices, improving the quality of education for children of diverse backgrounds., 194 early childhood educators worked with 5,000 parents to enable the provision of inclusive and quality ECE services and to promote non-discrimination of children based on gender, ethnicity, language, special needs and other factors. The qualitative impact of the project includes two training modules on peacebuilding in ECD and multilingual education developed by the Ministry of Education and Science for all ECD staff, which can improve practices in all kindergartens and ECD centres.

The development of educational resources and training programs for law enforcement strengthened the capacity of educators and police officers to address human rights and diversity issues effectively, specifically finalised 2 manuals for secondary school teachers in the Kyrgyz Republic.

The Ministry of Internal Affairs has finalised, reviewed and approved a training programme on the work of law enforcement agencies in multi-ethnic communities, including methodological and analytical tools for teaching human rights and diversity to police officers.

In April, the Russian-language version of a global practical guide to the adoption of comprehensive antidiscrimination legislation was launched in Bishkek for governments, with the participation of government partners, national human rights institutions, development partners and civil society. The launch of the anti-discrimination legislation guide and the support for strategic studies underscored the project's commitment to fostering an inclusive, equitable, and participatory society. Project supported National Institute for Strategic Studies in research on the level of access of decision-making processes in pilots.

The project significantly enhanced local peace infrastructures by engaging youth in meaningful participation and decision-making processes. The training and capacity-building efforts empowered both youth and local authorities, fostering a collaborative environment for addressing local issues and developing sustainable solutions.

Both gender and youth considerations are central to the project, with key initiatives designed to address the specific challenges faced by girls and promote their active engagement. For example, the project has focused on reducing girls' school dropouts—a significant barrier to their education and prospects—through targeted interventions such as mentorship programs, awareness campaigns, and tailored support networks. Girls have assumed active leadership roles in community projects, allowing them to engage directly with local leaders and community members. They have also led campaigns to raise awareness about gender equality in schools, organizing workshops and speaking at events. These opportunities have enhanced their confidence and respect within the community, equipping them with valuable leadership skills resulting in a notable increase in overall women's participation (51.4%) compared to the baseline (44.2%) in meetings aimed at the development of their city and community. Women's participation in decision-making processes for improving city/community life also slightly increased (41.7% in the final assessment compared to 39% in the baseline).

For youth inclusion, the project has prioritized the direct engagement of young people in designing and implementing peacebuilding solutions, fostering a sense of ownership and accountability. Additionally, the creation of a youth policy forum involving high-level decision-makers has ensured that youth perspectives are integrated into national policymaking.

Furthermore, 41.5% of them participated in decision-making processes to improve city/community life, compared to 37% in the baseline assessment. This inclusive approach led to the co-funding of 25 out of 42 youth-led peacebuilding solutions by the LSGs, demonstrating a tangible commitment to integrating youth perspectives. By actively participating, youth were able to articulate their views and concerns, leading to more informed and inclusive governance. This shift not only strengthened the capacity of both groups but also established a replicable model of engagement, enhancing trust at the local level. Furthermore, by integrating these strategies into the national "Youth and Child Friendly Local Government" program, led by the Ministry of Culture, Information, Sports, and Youth Policy, youth engagement in peacebuilding have become integral to urban development and governance. Additionally, the project enhanced horizontal trust within the community by fostering cooperation and communication across different groups. Through a variety of collaborative initiatives and educational programs and involving approximately 7,000 youths, 5,300 parents, 155 LSGs, and 194 ECD workers, the project created platforms for these diverse groups to interact and work together on common goals. This interaction helped break down barriers and misunderstandings, leading to a stronger sense of community cohesion and mutual respect. Such engagement nurtured trust by showing that different groups could collaborate effectively and support each other in contributing to social cohesion. The project has successfully broadened the understanding that building social cohesion requires special attention to under-represented groups, particularly those with limited access to decision-making processes. For instance, the project has emphasized the importance of increasing the participation of persons with disabilities in decision-making processes, including peacebuilding and inclusion in all aspects of public life. As a result, state bodies have begun to include persons with disabilities in various discussions and working groups, reflecting a positive shift towards greater inclusivity and representation.

- The integration of project strategies into the national "Youth and Child Friendly Local Government" program under the leadership of MoCISYP ensures that youth engagement in peacebuilding are part of ongoing urban development and governance initiatives. This alignment with national priorities helps maintain momentum and funding for youth-focused peacebuilding activities across the country.
- The project has fostered strong partnerships with local civil society organizations like "Youth of Osh" and the "AIDS Foundation East-West in the Kyrgyz Republic" (AFEW). These organizations play a crucial role in the grassroots continuation of peacebuilding initiatives, utilizing their local presence and community trust to sustain engagement and impact.
- Transitioning ECD centers to state-funded libraries, along with the integration of the modules on multilingual education and peacebuilding, developed by Ministry of Education and Science ensures that educational programs promoting peace and diversity are consistently delivered to young children and their families. This strategic approach not only embeds core values of tolerance and inclusion from an early age but also sets a scalable model that might be replicated across all ECD centers nationwide.
- The capacity of local self-government bodies and community activists to conduct dialogues and participate in decision-making processes, which have already been functioning for more than half a year without active project intervention, has been increased.
- · Adoption of a new law on youth with provisions for increased participation of youth in decision-making processes
- Adoption of a curriculum for MIA officers as a mandatory subject for all cadets and current officers undergoing advanced training.
- Approval of a training manual for teachers on the value of diversity, human rights and civic identity will be applicable for years to come and will influence the new generation.
- Capacity building of local insider mediation contributes to sustainability as local communities will have trained people capable to identify and address potential conflict cases by using mediation technics.
