The partner built six water holes in Buba, each with a

horticultural perimeter of 1 hectare, except in Cufada, which has 0.5 hectares, and two in São Domingos. In addition,53kg of vegetable seeds (28kg in Buba and 25kg in São Domingos) and small horticultural materials were distributed to the women involved in this activity. 192 farmers received Cash for the dyke repair work.

The distribution of 300 horticultural tools (watering cans, buckets and watering cans) and the construction of 5 boreholes with their respective horticultural perimeters of 1 hectare each were also carried out. 6,952 ml (about 1.84 gal) of belt dykes were rehabilitated. 135 farmers received Cash for the dyke repair work.

For Outcome 1, UNDP has signed several agreements with implementing partners:

- 2 agreements with CSOs to coordinate most of the activities under outcomes 1.1 and 1.2 - Tiniguena for the Gabú and Quinara regions and AOFASS for Cacheu.

- An agreement was signed with the Women's Political Platform (PPM) to support the implementation of activities under Outcomes 1.1 and 1.2 in three target regions, ensuring women's representation at all decision-making levels.
- An agreement was signed with PELE to facilitate the participatory development of gender-sensitive communication products.

- For Outcome 1.3 awareness campaigns, an agreement was signed with RENARC (National Network of Community Radios), which consists of 34 community radio stations and 4 community television stations spread throughout the country.

For Outcome 2, WFP selected 3 IPs to support implementation in the three target regions. The agreement was signed with the NGOs AD, ANCOPF-GB and GUIARROZ to implement the project activities in São Domingos, Buba and Pitche respectively. The activities were carried out in the different project communities.

- Construction of boreholes with different perimeters for horticultural activities for women.

- Distribution of inputs and tools to cultivate rehabilitated land and work on horticultural perimeters

After the trainings in the four areas of intervention (climate change, confl ict mediation, civil/political participationand land rights).

In terms of climate change, the communities have reduced deforestation of large trees and depopulation of mangroves.

In each beneficiary community, a committee has been set up to mediate intra- and inter-community conflicts, which have decreased significantly; women have benefited from inheritance and land ownership; in terms of women's participation in decision-making, women are now reported to be called upon to be heard at decision-making moments.

The contracts with the implementing partners clearly emphasized the project's focus on gender equality and women's empowerment and linked the NGOs that achieved the project's GEWE results. In addition, the CBPP sessions were organized in a gender-sensitive way (473 participants, 280 women), as was the selection of project beneficiaries. The project team ensured that at least 50 per cent of the participants in the sessions were women and this was rigorously enforced in the fi eld. Likewise, the team ensured that women were well represented at community level in the various project activities. The selection of beneficiaries was based on the level of vulnerability of the households, with priority being given to i) female-headed households with many younger members, ii) those whose only means of subsistence is agriculture, iii) those with a disabled person and iv) those with a long-term illness. The aim was to enable each vulnerable person to benefit from goods, paid work and training.

UNDP Organized community dialogues for participation, free expression and deliberation on climate security issues. Promoted broad stakeholder engagement (government and community) to increase women's participation. Piloted the creation of community-based monitoring structures to accurately track the impacts of climate change on the use of land, water and other natural resources.

Identified and designed gender-sensitive community/local solutions to inform national/local government strategies and interventions in affected areas.

All this served as a mechanism to reduce the conflicts that existed in the communities, the injustices over land ownership and inheritance issues where women are left out because according to tradition it is the man who has the right and not the woman.

The availability of land for agriculture has contributed significantly to the reduction of conflicts in the communities. There were no reports of conflicts within the community or between the community and the protected area authorities. The rehabilitation of 25,088 meters of dykes valued 370 hectares of land for cultivation that had already been abandoned, allowing food to be grown and reinforcing food security. To ensure that the activities had an impact, the WFP carried out its Post Distribution Monitoring (PDM) survey and as a result, 97.8% of the population of the communities declared that the natural environment had improved thanks to the stabilization and recovery of the land.

In addition, training sessions on land tenure and land rights, as well as on the effects and mitigation measures of climate change, have increased communities' awareness of their land rights. This has given them the ability to grow food and generate income, providing security and economic stability, which will help lessen conflicts within and with state entities.

Since the implementation of the project, there has been a rapprochement between the communities and the local government. A regional forum was held in the 3 different regions where the majority of the communities are women.

This is the first time that women have had the opportunity to sit at the same table with the local government to discuss issues that directly affect the communities.

A conflict management committee and a community garden have been established where all problems are resolved, which has significantly reduced the number of cases reported to the police and between communities. Women have gained knowledge and as a result their behaviour has changed.

Girls are encouraged to go to school because they realize that this is an urgent need.

The 3 regions /17 target-villages are geographically dispersed, face differentiated conflict contexts, stakeholders and climate-change vulnerabilities, and therefore require a tailored approach. The IP CSOs reveal little capacity to simultaneously implement activities in such a dispersed geographical area due to the limited number of qualified staff, logistic and transportation facilities. Both aspects contribute to a slower than expected implementation speed, having the project team, therefore, requested a 6-months project extension. Future projects with similar ambitions and strategies should focus on building the capacity of their implementing partners to guarantee the quality and time-efficiency of the intended results.

The mapping mission concluded that the project should cover 3 more communities in Cufada to mitigate the conflicts that could arise from selective support. Extending the scope of the project negatively affected the ratio of budget per tabanca for resilience activities, so vulnerability criteria were defined to determine the distribution of assets, such as the number of inhabitants, female-headed households, households with people with disabilities. Meetings were held with each community to increase understanding of the criteria that guided the distribution of assets.

Also, the geographical characteristics of some communities have made it difficult to dispose of certain assets, such as boreholes, since there is no transportation to move large drilling machines. An alternative solution to the problem could be rainwater harvesting, but there is no time until the end of the project to implement an alternative solution in a sustainable way.

The project is unanimously considered by its stakeholders as "relevant and necessary, since it not only meets the existing country needs and global priorities, but also presents a strong alignment with the main needs of the regions, sectors, tabancas and households that inhabit them" (Baseline Study). Despite the concerted eff orts the team is making into accelerating implementation, the greatest stakeholder concern is sustainability mostly due to time constrains. The initial time allocated to the implementation of the project and the availability of funds to start work were not enough to implement activities that require time, such as resilience activities that obey the agricultural calendar. These aspects lead us to believe that if the project had lasted between one and a half and two years, it would have been possible to carry out activities in good time and avoid requests for extensions.
