Part C) Justification

The joint Access, Support and Coordination (ASC) Programme focuses on strengthening the capacities of national and community-based partners (Access), caring for and empowering survivors (Support) and coordinating efforts (Coordination) in response to the needs of survivors of trafficking (SoTs) in Trinidad and Tobago. The primary objective of the 3-year programme has been for SoTs to have access to comprehensive and integrated, survivor centred specialised services and support through coordinated efforts by national protection systems and community-based organisations with support from the United Nations (UN).

While significant achievements have been noted throughout the period, many challenges also impacted the timely implementation of key activities envisioned under the joint programme (JP). These include but were not limited to the acquisition of the relevant government approvals to successfully launch the JP which to date, have not been obtained. Although PUNOs have strategically leveraged on existing relationships with both government and civil society partners to ensure continued project implementation, the lack of approval from the Cabinet of the Government of Trinidad and Tobago resulted in the individual endorsement of activities by the various organizations. This negatively impacted the proposed workplan for the ASC programme as approvals for several initiatives were obtained later than anticipated. In some instances, the lack of approval by the Cabinet also resulted in a change in the initially proposed lead government partner, as feedback from the intended ministry was perpetually delayed. Despite the aforementioned, PUNOs were able to re-strategize and engage organizations with a similar mandate to ensure the successful implementation of the activities.

Such activities include the piloting of the Case Management System and the operationalization of an emergency shelter for newly identified victims of trafficking (VoTs). According to the ASC's initial workplan, the design and piloting of the Case Management System, as well as the proposed timeframe for implementation was within the first year of the project with the government partner, Ministry of Social Development and Family Services. Notably, since the award of the MMPTF, attempts to engage said Ministry proved futile which consequently led to a partnership with the Counter Trafficking Unit of the Ministry of National Security to action same. As such, a contract with the digital software provider was signed on 12th March, 2024 for the development of a Case Management System to support with victim care. Although, the contracted period of works is until 28th June 2024, to date the deliverables have been behind schedule as it requires a commitment not only by the developers but also key personnel within the Ministry of National Security. Further, given the challenges that usually exist with the development of software, additional time beyond the project end date would be required to troubleshoot and ensure the successful launching of the platform.

Similarly with the shelters, while the infrastructural works are expected to be completed prior to project closure, all construction contracts have a one-year retention period before the final payment can be made. Although the funds would be posted in the financial system, the additional time would allow for officers providing technical oversight to address any urgent issues relating to the scope of works completed by the contractor.

Finally, it should be noted that the proposal was initially projected from October 2021 -September 2024 and therefore, based on this, the NCE would allow PUNOs the full three years of implementation that was initially envisioned.

Therefore, in consideration of the aforementioned, a request is being made for a three month no cost extension to ensure the successful completion of activities under the ASC programme. While no additional funding is being requested at this time, there is a need to reallocate operational funds to support staff costs for the three-month period. The projected cost is approximately USD 35,882.79 which does not exceed the UNDG 20% variance nor does it exceed 2% of the total budget. Once the specific lines for reallocation are identified, further correspondence would be provided to the committee.
