The project has worked closely with the Government of PNG through the Department of Community Development, Families and Regions as a main body to drive the national WPS agenda. The Department was invited to the project inception meeting and provided a keynote speech covering the WPS agenda. The project has also started work with the Autonomous Bougainville Government (ABG) on the WPS agenda and work plans are being finalise din alignment to the project results framework. Under outcome 2, the UNDP Highlands team is working with the provincial administration in Hela and Southern Highlands. All four Government agencies attended the inception meeting and provided inputs into the project proposals including results framework.

UN agencies delivering the project have started the project on a positive note and are working collaboratively to work on the WPS agenda. A first inception meeting was held on June 6, 2024 that aimed to bring together the Government, civil society, UN agencies and others in reviewing and discussing the results framework as a way of validating the prodoc. Importantly, the inception meeting was a forum to provide briefing to potential partners and government on the way forward. The staff recruitment has been advanced, and agencies have contracted staff with all recruitment to be finalised by August 2024. The first project steering committee is expected to be held in September 2024.

Project implementation will see an accelerated delivery of on the ground initiatives in the period between August and November 2024 as resources are committed and events and activities are rolled out across the regions and in the national capital.

<u>Outcome 1:</u> An enabling environment is created and strengthened for active participation of women in decision-making and leadership roles.

Rate the current status of the outcome progress: Initiated

Progress summary: (350-word limit)

During the reporting period, UN Women (UNW) recorded progress in four activities:

(1) Stakeholder Engagement

UNW leveraged existing relationships and influence with the Department of Community Development and Religion (DfCDR), women political leaders in the National Capital District (NCD), the sub-national government in Hela province (HP), and key stakeholders to work together on the WPS agenda through:

- First <u>DfCDR-UNW consultation on WPS</u> decides to implement WPS training for DfCDR officers
- <u>Inception meetings</u> to convene stakeholders were attended by 24 participants, including 16 women from national and sub-national governments, civil society organisations, youth and women's groups.

(2) Capacity Building

In response to a request for capacity building for the preparation of a WPS National Action Plan (NAP) in the first consultation, UNW provided a one-day <u>WPS training workshop</u> for the 20 DfCDR officers, including 8 female officers, 4 junior female officers and 3 junior male officers through three sessions:

- Gender equality with a specific focus on gender and conflict
- WPS in the world and in PNG
- WPS NAP overview, case studies, and brainstorming

UNW is working with DfCDR to develop a concept note for the WPS NAP and future activities for Outputs 1.1 and 1.2, and is leading the development of the WPS NAP.

(3) Partnership Building

UNW organised the <u>Gender Equality & Women's Empowerment-Development Partners'</u> <u>Coordination Group (GEWE-DPCG) on WPS</u>, which was attended by 30 participants, including national government, key sub-national stakeholders and development partners.

UNW also actively participated in WPS related meetings and identified potential Implementation Partners (IPs) for Output 1.1 and 1.2, developed a contact list of IPs, and advertise a call for proposals.

(4) Procurement

UNW has hired an International Consultant on Governance, Peace and Security and fully committed to the project from May to July.

UNW developed a Terms of Reference (ToR) for a consultant specialised in communication and advocacy to develop a multimedia campaign strategy for Output 1.3. UNW advertise the call for applications.

- In the first DfCDR-UNW consultation on WPS, a senior female official and a junior male officer from the DfCDR participated and nominated attendees for WPS training workshop including junior female and male officers.
- In the WPS training workshop, 8 female officers, 4 junior female officers and 3 junior male officers attended and provided insights into the current state of gender equality and WPS in PNG from the perspectives of women and youth.
- In the inception meeting, 16 women participated and successfully represented subnational governments, civil society organisations, youth and women's groups.

<u>Outcome 2:</u> Improved women's access to justice and conflict resolution, peacebuilding, and post-conflict recovery in the Highlands of PNG

Rate the current status of the outcome progress: on track

Progress summary: (350-word limit)

UNDP has initiated consultations with provincial administrations and stakeholders from the rule of law, peacebuilding, and development sectors to explain the project's purpose and activities, and to seek advice on how to effectively initiate project interventions. On 07 March 2024, UNDP convened a stakeholders' meeting, inviting the deputy provincial administrator, Executive Officer of the Provincial Governor, Provincial Chief Commander, District Education Advisors, Head of the Family & Sexual Violence Unit, District Administrators, Local-level Government (LLG) representatives, local councillors, and representatives of faith-based organizations from various denominations.

The meeting's agenda included discussions on the current state of people's access to justice, particularly for women, the role of insider mediators in identifying, preventing, and resolving conflicts, and the potential integration of peace and development interventions. Stakeholders were also briefed on the findings of a recent study by UNDP on people's access to justice in the Highlands, the recommendations of which were also incorporated into the project. The stakeholders provided specific recommendations for the project's implementation, emphasizing support for village courts, particularly by providing facilities for women magistrates to help and encourage women to refer their cases to the village courts.

UNDP also started the identification of potential local partners for the three components of the project under this outcome. Given UNDP's strong presence in the Highlands, and its extensive work with

various civil society groups, faith-based organizations, and women and youths' groups, UNDP will continue to engage these entities based on their areas of expertise to ensure efficient and effective implementation of the project activities.

UNDP has invested in capabilities and capacities of women organizations int the Highlands through the PBF-funded 'Creating Conditions for Peace' project, and as such, UNDP will engage these women organizations in the implementation of this project.

UNDP Bougainville

UNDP has initiated consultations with Autonomous Bougainville Government. The engagement has been fruitful with the ABG Government including representation at the inception meeting and with the CSOs and other groups. The main stakeholders for the Bougainville section of the WPS (outcome

3) have agreed to further collaborate and work together to refine the key activities in line with the ABG gender and peace priorities. The first session to roll out the WPS in Bougainville will be held on the 7th of August in Buka that brings together various stakeholders.

OHCHR completed the recruitment, onboarding and deployment of a Human Rights Advisor, and revised its mapping of human rights defender networks, especially women HRDs.
