The project has held meetings with the Government of South Sudan at the executive and legislature at the national level. In January, there was a meeting with the Minister of Justice and Constitutional Affairs (MoJCA) and his technical team with UNDP representatives on the status of the two critical Bills of formation of Commission for Truth Telling and Healing (CTRH) the Compensation and Reparation Authority (CRA). The Minister advised the meeting on the principle of separation of powers and how best to approach Parliament. The project has subsequently followed the advice and managed to convene 2 meetings with the National Legislative Assembly - Committee on Peace and Reconciliation in January and February to discuss the roadmap to the finalization of the two Bills. As a result, the Committee has managed to convene 3 meetings in Juba to review Civil Society Organisations submissions on the two Bills. The joint meetings with representatives of civil society were instrumental in incorporating their views in the draft Bills. By end of May, the Committee agreed to a meeting with the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs, Ministry of Peacebuilding, CSOs and international partners including UNDP and UNMISS to meet and come up with roadmap to the finalization of the two Bills. There are two meetings scheduled for 6 and 7 June 2024. These interactions with the Legislative Assembly is critical in ensuring that momentum on finalizing the two Bills is maintained.

During the reporting period, the project supported the presentation the two draft Bills of the Commission for Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and Compensation and Reparation Authority (CRA) to the Speaker of the National Legislative Assembly in November 2023. This was a major milestone marking the First Reading of the Bills in Parliament. The bills are currently being reviewed by the Parliamentary Committee on Peace and Reconciliation. The Peace and Reconciliation Committee has indicated that it will need to carry out additional public consultations on the two Bills before debates can be held in Parliament and the process may be protracted to as far as November 2024 before being presented to Parliament the second and third reading and then to the President for assent. Thus far, there have been extensive consultations with CSOs who have shared their comments with the parliamentary Committee. Two workshops have been conducted in Juba by the Committee to review the CSO comments.

Key activities for the project have been completed with the exception of the contracting of new CSO partners after the expiry of the old grants in December 2023 and April 2024. In this light, as at the time of reporting 15 out of 20 new and existing CSOs had been contracted as implementing partners to continue work on the dissemination of information on Transitional Justice and to prepare victims and survivors for engagement with the anticipated establishment of the CTRH and CRA mechanisms. The CSOs will also establish and continue supporting the existing 82 Victim Support Groups (VSG) in old and new locations across the country. The key activities for the VSGs will be to enhance the provision of pyscho - social support and preparation of victims and survivors to engage with the mechanisms when established The CSOs will also focus on advocacy and information dissemination through radio programs across the country the two bills and generally on the overall transitional justice process in the South Sudan Describe overall progress under each Outcome made during the reporting period (for June reports: January-June; for November reports: January-November; for final reports: full project duration). The project remains off track because the two transitional justice mechanisms that were anticipated in the Peace Agreement have not yet been established pending the enactment of the two requisite laws. While several of the project outputs fall outside the ambit of the two mechanisms, there is a significant portion of support that is supposed to go to the establishment of the two mechanisms as well as ensure that they are operational.

The two draft laws have gone through several iterations since the May 2023 Transitional Justice Conference. This took considerable time as representations were made by different sectors to the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs. The delays within Government also contributed to these delays. Furthermore, when The Minister of Justice and Constitutional Affairs presented the two Bills for the first reading, Parliament immediately went into recess for 4 months. This also delayed the process of reviewing the Bills. Since the opening of Parliament on 3 April 2024, the Peace and Reconciliation Committee has been committed to the process of reviewing the two Bills and finalising them. The Peace and Reconciliation Committee has shown commitment by conducting several meetings to review CSO submissions in Juba facilitated by UNMISS – HRD. UNDP has also supported Parliament to produce a roadmap for the finalisation of the two Bills. Preparations are underway for the Committee to meet with the Ministry of Justice and Constitutional Affairs as well as the Ministry of Peacebuilding to undertake this process in July 2024. The finalization of these bills depends on the commitment of the NTLA; however, UNDP (and partners) will continue advocating, through the UN good offices to have the bills passed. Possibilities for the passing of the bills remains high.

#### Project progress summary

The establishing legislation for the CTRH and CRA has not been promulgated into law as it is still under review within Parliamentary processes, currently at the committee of Peace and Reconciliation. There are no clear timelines as to when this process will be concluded. In November 2023, the Minister of Justice and Constitutional Affairs submitted the two draft Bills to the Speaker of Parliament for review and debate. The legislative process has taken slightly longer party due to the four months recess in Mid-December 2023. Since the Parliament opened on 3 April 2024, the Peace and Reconciliation Committee of the National Legislative Assembly is currently reviewing the two Bills and has received comments and inputs from Civil Society Organizations. The parliamentary committee has indicated that they will conduct public consultations and other necessary reviews with different stakeholders before presenting it for debate at the floor of the legislative assembly. The project is working towards supporting the Government to ensure that the laws are promulgated at least before the end of 2024. The Government has missed the majority of deadlines in the implementation of the tenets of the R – ARCSS be it in the Constitution Making Process, Elections, Judicial Reform and Transitional Justice among others.

As the project awaits the tabling of the two bills in parliament that will give way for the formation of the critical transitional mechanisms, awareness raising on the transitional justice processes has continued at community level. This included training for journalists conducted in Bor, Pariang and Juba for 45 participants (3 F/42M) in the last quarter of 2023. Additionally, a total of 3303 (F=1325, M=1195 and Youth=783) IDPs community members from Bor, Pariang and Juba were mobilized and supported to participate in awareness forums to enhance their contribution to the development and implementation of the enabling legislation for CTRH. The trainings focused on role of the media in responsible reporting the transitional justice in South Sudan. The items focused on the role of the media to advocate with duty-bearers to fast-track the two critical Transitional Justice bills. The project also organized radio talk shows on transitional justice with two members of Civil Society Organizations and one-member of the Technical Committee on the one-year anniversary since the May 15 – 17 International TJ Conference. The discussion focused on forging a future built on accountability, justice, and lasting peace, sustaining the commitment from all stakeholders in the implementation of the transitional justice in South Sudan. The discussions emphasized that open dialogue, community ownership, and unwavering political support are crucial to expedite transitional justice processes in South Sudan.

Other awareness creation and capacity strengthening activities included the training of 72 (23F) Journalists in Bor, Jonglei State and Pariang, Ruweng Administrative area in December 2023 on responsible reporting in transitional justice as well as conduct of two awareness sessions on role of the media in responsible reporting the transitional justice in South Sudan. The items focused on the role of the media to advocate with duty-bearers in Parieng in the last quarter of 2023 with 65 participants (33 males and 32 females) in the same. In total, 1599 IDP individuals (Males 801, Females 771 including 27 persons with disabilities) were reached through awareness sessions with information on transitional justice mechanisms.

During this reporting period, finalization of construction of all the three safe spaces for IDPs and returnees were completed in Juba, Bor and Parieng: one semi-permanent in an IDP camp in Juba, the second a permanent one in Bor, and Mingkaman, Lakes State. The safe spaces will be critical spaces where sessions for truth telling will be conducted when the CTRH is established. The safe spaces are being used by the community members to address day-to-day social issues affecting mainly women and children like gender based violence.

At policy level, the major achievement, following the hosting of the National Transition Justice Conference in 2023, has been the presentation of the two draft Bills of the Commission for Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and Compensation and Reparation Authority (CRA) for the First Reading to the Speaker of the National Legislative Assembly in November 2023 by the Hon. Minister of Justice and institutional Affairs. Once the Committee on Peace and Reconciliation reviews the bills, they will be tabled in the parliament for debate through the second and third readings and passage before being assented into law by the President. This will pave way for the actual formation of the two of the transitional justice mechanisms in South Sudan. While the two processes with the executive and legislature have taken long, the support provided by the project has strengthened the Government institutions and created platforms for more dialogue on the issue of Transitional Justice in South Sudan. An issue that had remained sensitive and taboo among political elites is now discussed openly and officially in Government circles.

The need for more information on issues of justice and reparations was noted in the community meetings and VSG meetings by the majority of CSOs implementing the TJ project across the country. The prevalence of children born out rape in some communities and the failure by the state to recognize the mothers' and children's predicament in attaining birth registration certificates was also noted. In addition, the project also observed that there is need for more intervention to deal with pyscho social trauma cases in women and children victims and other survivors who have borne the brunt of the conflict in South Sudan but still fail to access organised health care to deal with their pyscho social and mental health needs. Based on the lessons learnt the project has planned to target more women and youth in (Central Equatoria (Juba); Eastern Equatoria (Magwi), Upper Nile (Malakal), Pibor Administrative (Pibor), Warrap (Kuajok) areas. This will be done through tailored conversations on the CTRH and CRA targeting at least 3000 people (2700 Men, 300 women) or which 300 will be youth; both male and female per location in the five locations of Juba, Pibor, Kuajok, Magwi and Malakal who are victims and survivors of several types of conflict in each area the project will be implemented. This is in addition to the general support currently being given through other CSOs.

At least 50% of the CSOs that have been supported with Low Value Grants are led by women and their focus is on women's issues. This is a deliberate move on the part of the project to empower women but also support the capacities of such women led organisations to continue providing platforms where women leaders from South Sudan can engage local women and young people on such important matters. More importantly, the engagement of these women led organisations with the Government at the Central level as well as the local levels continues to grow and is giving more women the power and opportunity to air and add their voices to the need for the establishment of the TJ mechanisms as well as the urgency for the need for transitional justice in South Sudan. Sensitive issues around psychosocial support, rape, children born out of rape and other related matters can discussed in confidence between women and this helps in the healing and opening up of victims and survivors. It is no longer just business as usual and a MEN only affair, a process that has largely defined South Sudan politics, civil society circles and government for a long time

In a recent discussion on Transitional Justice, the project supported the Director of Women and Justice Empowerment, Ms. Zabib Loro to make a presentation on the needs of women and youth in Transitional Justice with a local radio station wherein the voices continue to be championed. Within the current deliberations with the NLA's Peace and Reconciliation Committee, Ms. Zabib Loro has been providing guidance to the women parliamentarians giving them advice on the contents of the Bills from a legal perspective.

At policy level, the major achievement, following the hosting of the National Transition Justice Conference in 2023, has been the presentation of the two draft Bills of the Commission for Truth, Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) and Compensation and Reparation Authority (CRA) for the First Reading to the Speaker of the National Legislative Assembly in November 2023 by the Hon. Minister of Justice and institutional Affairs. Once the Committee on Peace and Reconciliation reviews the bills, they will be tabled in the parliament for debate through the second and third readings and passage before being assented into law by the President. This will pave way for the actual formation of the two of the transitional justice mechanisms in South Sudan. While the two processes with the executive and legislature have taken long, the support provided by the project has strengthened the Government institutions and created platforms for more dialogue on the issue of Transitional Justice in South Sudan. An issue that had remained sensitive and taboo among political elites is now discussed openly and officially in Government circles.

A Victim Support Group member, a male from Kuajok Warrap State appreciated the CSO Invisible Women Network, UNDP and the Peacebuilding Fund for bringing up the transitional justice initiative as it has led to the reduction of preventable intercommunal violence in their small area and enhanced peace in their homes. She said. "Ever since I-WIN started this awareness in our community, our houses and the whole communities are now in peace because of the message of peace that we get, mostly from our hearts we feel happy for such a productive organization that focuses more on poor people and more especially women". The VSG member further noted that because of the meetings they have been having on transitional justice, their community has started engaging on how they can implement income generating projects as well continue to talk about peace within the communities. More interestingly, the community has tasked young men in their area to be the peace champions. Young men in the area have now started even though with limited resources repairing leaking roofs for women headed households as well as pledging not to engage in domestic violence against women.

The project is being implemented in close collaboration with national and local state and non-state actors, including the Government, media, and civil society stakeholders whose transitional justice knowledge and capacity strengthened in the long term as part of the project. As such the project fosters local ownership at national, state, county and community levels, which will encourage sustainability of the results of project interventions. For example, community-based victim and survivor networks encourage local ownership by mobilizing local communities in a socially inclusive, participatory, and transparent manner. The aim is to increase the knowledge and capacity of victims, survivors and affected communities to formulate their needs, demand their rights and engage in transitional justice processes beyond the life of this project. Such structures can later be used to engage with other transitional justice mechanisms that are yet to be established such as the Compensation and Reparations authority.

The support provided under this project seeks not to replace but to complement the resources that the Government of South Sudan is obliged to invest in the establishment and running of transitional justice mechanisms as outlined in the Revitalized Peace Agreement. Since some of the implementing partners, such as MOJCA, are state institutions, it is anticipated that they will continue to receive support from the national budget to support the transitional justice process even after the end of the project. Once the CTRH and CRA have been created, the cost of implementing its mandate will be considerably less than the resources required for its establishment. UNDP continued partnering with the UNV office and sought the services of eight Online UNVs to assist the CSOs partnering with UNDP in enhancing their media strategies and outlook. This unpaid partnership is valid for 12 weeks. Thus far three (3) international media practitioners (1 Male/2 Female) are working with the three CSOs. South Sudan has huge potential to implement such projects but the cost of hiring experts working on the media can be prohibitive. Thus, the opportunity to engage independent experts who can assist the CSOs with capacity building on media engagement/enhancement until they can stand on their own.

Additionally, the project was granted One Year long - No Cost Extension (NCE) for the current project. The NCE request was necessitated by several factors related to slow government processes and competing political interests in South Sudan. For instance, the project had anticipated that the laws required to set up the three Transitional Justice mechanisms under the R-ARCSS would have been approved by the Legislative Assembly leading to the Executive setting up the Commission for Truth Reconciliation and Healing (CTRH) as well as the Compensation and Reparations Authority (CRA). As of end of October 2023, the project had managed to support the drafting of the two laws and having them approved by the Council of Ministers. The project is now awaiting the Minister of Justice to present the two laws to the RTNLA before the end of 2023. Even after the provision of the current NCE to January 2025, except for the presentation of the two bills in parliament (through the parliamentary committee), the situation remains unchanged and would significantly affect the implementation of the project if not extended beyond 2025.

As the project approaches the end of 2024 and simultaneously the end of the project in January 2025, discussions will be initiated with the Resident Coordinator to explore the possibility of a no cost extension for project activities supporting the establishment of the two mechanisms to be exceptionally extended for another 6-12 months into 2025. Through the implementation, the project has proactively advocated for the Government of South Sudan at the executive and legislative levels to ensure these mechanisms are set up, but this has not gone as anticipated. The rest of the other deliverables have been well executed showing favorable results. The political situation in South Sudan is quite complex and requires flexibility in several ways. As has been documented in the other PBF projects for example, the Constitution making Project, the establishment of statutory mechanisms takes time and even when done, the composition of such bodies and their funding takes even longer. Therefore, the project makes a case for the exceptional extension of the project in 2025.
