The IMC is leading the development of the national child protection (CP) referral and case management system. During the reported period, IMC leaded and coordinated the training of trainers (ToT) on case management, with the participation of key CP stakeholders. Twelve elements of the national task force, who have been trained to become the IMC resource experts implementing the next phase of the CP capacity building action plan are now able to deliver trainings.
The Institute has also organized a working and advocacy session to present statistical data on violence against children, reported nationwide using digital tools. These data covered all forms of violence, abuse, and exploitation of children from 2022 to 2024 and is disaggregated by gender, age, type of violence and profile of perpetrator, among others

Briefly describe the main activities carried out by the Implementing Partner Please limit your response to 1500 characters In the first half of 2024, the Center for Access to Justice has conducted the second part of djumbais on human rights (awareness campaign for the local population based on talks and discussions) in the regions. There were 26 djumbais organized and they have reached more than 2,213 (1,250 Men, 962 women) people living in remote areas of the country.
The Ministry of Justice and Human Rights has ensured the dissemination of child rights issues covered by the Child Protection Code in the International Conference on the Challenges for the Justice System, in May 2024.
The Ministry of Justice is also working on new child protection structures to be put in place while the Child Protection Code is not approved. A National Commission and regional teams have been created. The Ministry of Justice is working towards having a Decree-Law approved by the Government to develop transitional rules that can be used while the Code is not approved, developing a protection system based on the norms of the Code. The project of Decree-Law was technically appoved on 6 November 2024.

For the case management system, the project team engaged with the President of the Institute for Women and Children (IMC, in the Portuguese acronym) and technical staff from the IMC.

The project also involved the National Human Rights Commission, both its President and its technical staff in various activities to promote human rights.

The project is now in its final year of implementation; however, progress has been slower than anticipated. While all preliminary preparations are complete and the project team has made significant efforts to accelerate activity execution, overall delivery rates remain below target. There is still one tranche of the project that needs to be implemented. All project partners and beneficiaries have been identified, and most contracts and fund transfer agreements are in place.

Despite these efforts, the project has encountered substantial challenges in recent months due to funding constraints. Project staff have been working diligently to improve implementation rates and expedite disbursements. However, with delays in the payment of the third tranche, several activities have come to a standstill. The request for the payment of the third tranche was sent on 4 September 2024, and until 15 November 2024, the funds had not been received. Although meetings and preparatory work for upcoming activities are ongoing, many initiatives have been postponed due to insufficient funds.

As the project team works as a real team, some activities were covered from funds that were originally allocated to a specific agency. In this sense, UNICEF has supported OHCHR with activities connected to the rights of persons with disabilities, as they also touch upon the rights of children with disabilities, and UNDP has used "other" sources of funding to conclude other activities. OHCHR's PAPEV project (regional project on the rights of children) has also financed some activities of the PBF project that were aligned with their goals.

The project team has faced significant challenges during implementation due to major political crises that have led to the frequent turnover of national counterparts. This turnover has required additional time and effort to engage with new national partners and build relationships with state actors. The dissolution of the National Popular Assembly in December 2023 severely impacted the effective implementation of some activities at the beginning of 2024.

The second half of 2024 has been marked by uncertainty surrounding the parliamentary elections, originally scheduled for 24 November 2024 but now postponed indefinitely. State actors have been reluctant to plan activities due to the possibility of upcoming elections. This scenario has made it challenging for the project staff to advance with activities and plan for change.

These political issues, along with pre-existing challenges such as limited capacities and political will, have heavily impacted the project's progress toward its results.

Coordination with partners has improved but is still a challenge, because of the changes of staff and the lack of internal coordination among some state actors. The Minister of Justice and Human Rights has been absent from the country for large periods of time, making it more difficult to get her approval and signature in documents that are needed to advance with the work.

Similar uncertainties have also affected the project's civil society organization (CSO) partners, as many individuals working for CSOs do so without a stable salary. Additionally, since many CSO workers are also employed by the State, the prevailing sense of insecurity has spread to them as well.

The convening agency, UNDP, had its audit in November 2023. One of the recommendations presented in the final audit report was to rethink the grants modality of contracting partners. Many partnerships of the project were completed by signing grants with civil society. However, this change in operations, has represented a new challenge for the project team as a new contractual modality had to be identified to be used with CSOs that often lack accounting procedures, for example.

As pointed out previously, the delay in payment of the third tranche of the project funds has also limited the staff's capacity to accelerate the implementation of the project. While it was possible to use other sources of funding to implement some activities, several others are on hold, awaiting the arrival of the funds for their implementation. Furthermore, the delay in payment has put the project staff in difficult situations, as some suppliers have not received their funds yet.

Despite several political and technical challenges experienced, the project is contributing significantly to promote and protect human rights in Guinea- Bissau.

The National Human Rights Commission (CNDH) achieved a significant milestone by independently producing and submitting its first-ever report on the human rights situation in Guinea-Bissau for the Universal Periodic review (UPR). This accomplishment reflects a strong step towards the CNDH's understanding the importance of being independent.

Challenges remain, nonetheless. The Commission's Board was not appointed, as per Decree-Law that creates the CNDH. The President of the CNDH has not yet fully embraced the implication of a truly independent institution, despite the presentation of the UPR report, and the proposed revised statute for the Commission is still awaiting review by the Council of Ministers.

Several action points of the National Human Rights Action Plan have been implemented with the project's support. Even though, there have been issues of coordination, and the project team has supported activities in a diffused way, many have been completed during the project implementation. Through the trainings for state actors on human rights obligations and treaty bodies, approximately 60 state officials have increased their knowledge on human rights issues, for example.

In May 2024, the project assisted the Ministry of Justice and Human Rights in organizing an International Conference on Access to Justice and Contemporary Challenges. As a follow up activity of the Conference, the project team organized a meeting on access to justice with the Brazilian Public Defence Office on one side and the CAJ and the Bar Association of Guinea-Bissau on the other. After this meeting, the Ministry of Justice and Human Rights and the Public Defence Office of Brazil signed a Terms of Reference for joint work in rethinking the CAJ as public defence in November 2024.

The project advocated and supported the government and partners to find a temporary solution to move forward with important administrative measures that are covered by the Child Protection Code and that are within the government's mandate, in the absence of a parliament. Thus, the government drafted and approved a Decree-Law on child protection.

The child protection case management system is being developed under the leadership of the Institute for Women and Children and is at an advanced stage. Five training modules (including the procedure manuals for each module) on the case management system have been completed and delivered: 1) Fundamentals of child protection; 2) Fundamentals of case management; 3) Case management process; 4) Information management; and 5) Ethics and self-care.

The training of trainers of the 12 members of the task force (8 men and 4 women), in October 2024, strengthened theoretical and practical skills related to the management of child protection cases and strengthened the capacity of 18 participants (9 men and 9 women) from Civil Society Organizations and child protection service providers in the health, judicial and law enforcement sectors.

During the reporting period, 126 cases (50 boys and 76 girls) of violence against children were reported, treated, and followed-up on by IMC and the main CP protection services using the Kobo collect data management platform. Incident reporting on sexual abuse and physical violence are the most frequent of the reported cases. In addition, statistical information was presented in October 2024 by the IMC to all national CP stakeholders.

The report on the Convention on the Rights of Child was submitted in June 2024. The State submitted the reports to the Human Rights Committee (monitoring the implementation of the International Covenant on Civic and Political Rights) and the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights in October 2024. The report on the implementation of the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities is translated and ready to be submitted

*

in 2024. The consultation with civil society on the contents of the report on the implementation of the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination against Women is scheduled for 10 December 2024.

With the project's support, civil society has presented a record number of reports to the UPR process in 2024. For the third cycle of the UPR in 2020 there were two joint reports presented by civil society organizations. This year, 18 reports were submitted with the project's support. Additionally, the Ministry of Justice and Human Rights has created an ad hoc group to draft the state report for the UPR.

A collaborative team of 16 people, comprising the Network of Human Rights Defenders, CAJ staff, and technical experts from the National Office of Statistics, successfully gathered quantitative and qualitative data to assess the implementation of SDG 16.10.1 in the country. This effort, in partnership with The Danish Institute for Human Rights, culminated in a comprehensive report detailing the status of human rights defenders and the state of civic space.

The human rights project trained the members of Voz di Paz's "Regional Dialogue Spaces" (alternative dispute resolution spaces for community grievances – ERDs in the Portuguese acronym) on human rights monitoring and reporting, so that the work they are already doing can have a human rights early warning element. All ERDs were trained by the project.

The project continued strengthening the prevention of violence against children, especially gender-based violence. The support provided to the NGO AMIC has allowed the reinforcement of institutional capacity of this organization, that runs shelters in Bissau and Gabu, and the implementation of prevention interventions in these areas. Supply materials, including computers, were provided to improve their working capacities.

The project is actively involved in enhancing access to justice for women and in developing the capacity women lawyers to support women victims and survivors of violence. Thus, contributing to the lawyers' professional growth and increasing their representation in the legal field. This, in turn, ensures that women victims and survivors of SGBV receive more effective and empathetic legal assistance.

The project also supported the National Network for Combating Gender-Based Violence and Child Abuse in Guinea-Bissau (RENLUV, in its Portuguese acronym), a national NGO working on prevention of SGBV and support to victims and survivors. RENLUV has received a grant from the project to develop its activities and the project has connected RENLUV with the CAJ and the Bar Association to align efforts in the same direction. The grant's implementation has had a profound impact on RENLUV's ability to address SGBV cases. By enhancing its intervention strategies, expanding its services, and fostering crucial partnerships, RENLUV has significantly improved its support for survivors and contributed to creating a safer and more just environment for all. The collaboration with the CAJ and the Bar Association has not only aligned efforts but also ensured a more coordinated and comprehensive responses to SGBV, ultimately leading to more effective and sustainable outcomes in the fight against gender-based violence.

The project is working with the Child Friend's Association, AMIC to address gender-based violence by using AMIC's shelters. During the reporting period 114 cases of violence against children were reported, including 106 cases of sexual violence and child marriage. These cases were managed in coordination with other child protection services (judicial law enforcement and IMC).

The project also worked with three youth organizations working on human rights. The organizations are developed activities on human rights education, conflict prevention, and menstrual dignity. The project team has been able to create synergies between them increasing their capacity to deliver and creating impactful results in the regions.

The project is also supporting Pro Activo, a local NGO working in the regions of Quinara and Tombali, to create a mechanism for inter-community dialogue, involving various local and community entities, focusing on topics such as human rights and gender-based violence.

The National Human Rights Commission, the institution in Guinea-Bissau, which aims at becoming its National Human Rights Institution, submitted an independent report on human rights to the Human Rights Council in the context of the universal periodic review. This demonstrates that the CNDH has started to understand the importance of its independence for the country's human rights infrastructure.

The implementation of digital technologies, specifically the Kobo Collect System, has enabled CP actors to gather and process data on violence against children in a consistent and coordinated manner. This has fostered synergies among stakeholders and ensured the reliability of data, which is disaggregated by region, gender, age, type of violence, profile of the perpetrators, and case management details.

As previously mentioned, the national workshop that presented the incident reporting data on violence, abuse, and exploitation against children facilitated a collective discussion. Key recommendations were made by major child protection stakeholders, including religious and children's organizations, and suggestions for actions to enhance collaboration and coordination in case management were shared.

There are 82 protection service providers actively connected through a WhatsApp group. This platform allows them to share challenges related to the use of the incident monitoring tool, as well as issues concerning case management and allows for coordinated responses across services. Complex cases are discussed within the group, and support is provided among different services at both national and decentralized levels.

The Ministry of Woman Family and social Solidarity, through the IMC, has designated two trained and equipped staff members to monitor and support Kobo users and manage case referrals.

Guinea-Bissau's efforts to engage with the UN human rights mechanisms, in particular treaty bodies, should not be underestimated as they introduce a measure of scrutiny and accountability at the international level – both of which are also key for peacebuilding. It is important to bear in mind that it is the first time that Guinea-Bissau reported to the Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights and the Human Rights Committee. Further, the active involvement of civil society organizations with the UPR process demonstrates both their engagement with human rights mechanisms and the recognition of the importance of these mechanisms for accountability.

The Network of Human Rights Defenders has developed, with the support of The Danish Institute for Human Rights, a report on the situation of civic space and human rights defenders in the country. This report demonstrates the growth of the Network as the key actor working on the protection of human rights in the country (as it plays a key role in pushing back to civic space restrictions, an issue identified as critical for sustainable peace). It also points to the understanding of the importance of data for human rights protection and promotion. This is the first report on SDG 16.10.1 developed in the country and it is a step towards more structured and sustainable work by the Network.

Overall, state actors involved in the project have shown improved capacities and skills to work on human rights. Within the Institute for Women and Children (IMC) there is a clear understanding of what constitutes violence against children and how it can be addressed. The IMC has also shown its capacity to work with data that is sensitive while at the same time protecting the rights of victims. Additionally, across several ministries there are staff who have understood Guinea-Bissau's human rights obligations under international law as well the State's obligation to report periodically on efforts made to implement the various treaties it has ratified and are capable of contributing inputs and/or drafting reports to treaty bodies. The project has developed an infographic on the right to health together with WHO, a product for creating more awareness on the content of the right to health and decreasing conflicts within the health system. Further, the project team liaised with WHO to support CSOs working on the health sector produce reports to the UPR process. This effort resulted in the submission of two joint reports on the right to health in Guinea-Bissau.

The project team has also joined efforts with the PBF- CDTOC project to fund the international conference on the status of justice, a process that has allowed for the development of initiatives on legal aid in Guinea-Bissau. As a result of this work, the CAJ signed an agreement with the Brazilian Public Defence Office in November 2024 to work on legal aid in Guinea-Bissau.

Additionally, the work with the treaty bodies has developed the State's capacity to work with reporting. Nevertheless, seeing a gap in the government of a functioning mechanism for reporting, the State has asked for more support for the development of an NMIRF. This was done at a Human Rights Council session in Geneva by a fellow sponsored by OHCHR to participate in a Human Rights Council session.

The project has supported the Network of Human Rights Defenders in creating a partnership with the Danish Institute for Human Rights, a process that will easily be able to continue beyond the lifespan of the project. The Network has also established a partnership with the West African Network of Human Rights Defenders and Front-Line Defenders, partnerships that can be used beyond the lifespan of the project.

Another aspect of the project engagement for sustainability has been the work on the early warning system, which relies on existing institutions (with Voz di Paz and Interpeace) and processes that are only gaining a human rights lens. Conflict analysis and responses to these conflicts are already a part of the work being developed by other organizations; the project is only collaborating to improve these and make them better aligned with international human rights law.

The project's efforts to support the state in the creation of a NMIRF are closely connected to sustainability. With a functioning NMIRF the state will be better equipped to write its reports and follow up on the recommendations received from the treaty bodies and other human rights mechanisms, both from the UN and the African Human Rights System.

As mentioned in the non-cost extension request, given that OHCHR does not have a country office in Guinea-Bissau, implementation of the project requires that OHCHR project staff – including the human rights officer (P4) that acts as the project manager, as per the project document – work until the end of the non-cost extension. Given the arrangements made for the project to support 50% of the SHRA – who provides guidance to the project – in 2025, the remaining funds allocated to OHCHR are currently not enough to cover the salaries of the two-project staff (P4 and NOB). There is therefore the need to secure funds to ensure that the project staff remain until the end of the project in 2025.
